custom and therefore necessary. He had obtained his political education in the Grange and Farmer's Alliance. On 40-cent wheat, 3-cent hops and a 23 1/2-cent tax was a hard combination for the farmer to buck up against.

J. B. Dimick said that for 53 years he had lived here and would leave it to his neighbors to tell what their estimate was of himself. E. W. Finzer, clerk J. J. King and T. V. McClellan, for assessor, were introduced. The latter said that he had not been able to appear often on the canvass. He said he hoped to prove that he was competent for that office.

F. W. Durbin refuted the statement of the Aurora Borealis that he was such an anti-expansionist that he hated any soldier who had been at Manila. He had been among the first to greet the boys on their return from the Philippines. No American could do otherwise than to feel proud of their record as soldiers, or feel otherwise than kindly toward them as citizens. If they all voted for Capt. Poorman, Lieut. Finzer and Chas. Murphy, he would still be their friend. (Applause.) He again dissected the accusations against his record as sheriff in his usual vigorous manner.

J. A. Jeffrey spoke for 25 minutes and made a strong plea for clean politics and better methods. He presented, on behalf of the opposition, the claims of Dr. B. Daly for congress, and paid a high tribute to Hon. J. B. Dimick to his home audience—and it was a fine one. The splendid array, decorated with the national colors and the pictures of the officers and fallen heroes of the Philippines, was filed, and the audience was very attentive. Grant Matlock was introduced for treasurer and made a pleasant impression.

W. W. Hall opened the debate for the Republicans. Scott said that if elected or defeated he would seek to become better acquainted with the North and of the country. He was brought up on a farm, had worked the roads, had taught school and studied law.

He renewed his pledges of economy and explained why taxes were higher. There would be \$33,000 taxes this year to pay off debt. If all present taxes were paid all the debt would be paid and \$13,000 would be left cash on hand. But, of course, another year's expenses would be run up and there would be a new debt. He dwelt at length on the advantage of having an attorney in the county court. He made a plea for the selection of honest jurors, regardless of politics. Many things had been done in the past that he did not approve of.

Mr. Pearce said that there was practically no partisan proposition involved in this county campaign. They nevertheless owed allegiance to their party. He claimed to be on a ticket that was just as good and as true a Citizens' ticket as the gentlemen on the other ticket.

He recited the platform they had agreed on relating to changes in the election laws. They were opposed to appropriations for Normal schools by their large or small. They would put themselves on the right side of this matter and would oppose the Normal school lobby. He desired to challenge some statements of the present sheriff. He deserved no credit for promptly collecting the taxes. The county court orders collection of taxes and controls publication—not the sheriff. He eulogized Lieut. Murphy, and when that gentleman next appeared, he was greeted with applause. He read the Dinwiddie affidavit, which has not been published and it is understood will not be given to the press. He denied the charge that was being used against him.

J. M. Poorman came next and eulogized the heroes of the Philippines. The opposition had uniformly spoken well of the Republican ticket and there was no good reason why any Republican should not vote his party ticket. He eulogized Congressman Tongue very highly and got a good round of applause. Chas. Leubke promised to conduct the office with fairness and impartiality. Henry Keene intimated that what a man did, or was doing, was frequently of as much consequence as what he said. He said a man could make property or hard times. Forty cents for wheat was due to forty shillings a ton for charters of vessels. The freight was formerly ten shillings a ton. The government was not to blame for this.

Smith as usual could not keep his intellect from dwelling continuously on the Journal and the editor who is a candidate for the legislature. His time was put largely in an attack on the Normal schools. He paraded his stock—the legislature of 1890 appropriated more money than any that ever sat and was called down hard with an official statement signed by the secretary of state. As Jos. Calvert was a member of that body the rejoinder was the hottest Smith has received and his feathers were not a little ruffled.

AGAINST NORMAL SCHOOLS.
Dr. Smith and Lot Pearce took strong ground here as usual against all normal schools appropriations and for taxing the telephone, telephone and express companies. Dr. Smith made a strong argument to show that all buildings and state institutions located away from Salem were entirely contrary to the constitution of the state and as he is a strict man about all questions of constitutional law he as much as said not a dollar should go to anything located away from Salem if he were in the legislature. The Aurora band was out and gave the candidates some of their best efforts.

AT AURORA
was assembled one of the largest crowds ever turned out to a political meeting, even surpassing some crowds in a national campaign.
Mr. Snyder presided, and the Republicans had the opening and closing. They left 35 minutes of their hour to Dr. J. N. Smith, the burden of whose speech was that he was not a reformer. He was this, and he was that. Prior to his advent there was not an unkind word

said, but he objected to the conduct of the Journal, which he charged was edited entirely from a personal standpoint. Mr. Hofer spoke only fifteen minutes at the opening, and took ten minutes of that to explain in a German speech the meaning of the constitutional amendments.

He said the Republican candidates for county offices were sincere, earnest young men, just as anxious for good government as the opposition.
On the way to Butteville we stopped at the Francis Xavier Matthiessen place and saw the old pioneer, who was one of the two French Canadians who decided the fate of the Oregon territory in favor of the stars and stripes when Jo Meek called for a showing of hands in 1843. He is a hale and hearty old pioneer, and his son was at our political meeting.
At Butteville the best of good feeling prevailed in the audience, the opposition getting about as much applause as the Republicans.

TWO SUITS.
Allen & Lewis, of Portland, have commenced action in Dept. No. 1, of the circuit court against Sheriff Durbin for the sum of \$198.48. The alleged basis for the action is that certain personal property of James Maguire, attached by the sheriff in an unpaid suit, was covered by a chattel mortgage given by Maguire to plaintiff and Wadhams & Kerr, the claim of the latter having been assigned to plaintiff, Ramsey & Bingham are attorneys for plaintiff.
An attachment suit also has been filed in Dept. 1, by Bonham & Holmes against Mary E. Hoen, Bertha Hoen, Ernest M. Hoen and Carl Hoen, for the sum of \$60 and interest from June 12, 1891, alleged to be due for legal services rendered. Carey F. Martin is attorney for plaintiff.

JOURNAL X-RAYS.

SATURDAY'S FIELD MEET

INTERCOLLEGIATE ASSOCIATION AT THE FAIR GROUNDS.

All indications point to a Great Contest of Trained Athletes of Six Colleges of Our State.

As originally planned, the county candidates were to meet in joint canvass in this city at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, but the management of the athletic meet is endeavoring to secure a postponement of the political meeting until evening. Leon Kenworthy, of Pacific College, chairman of the general committee on arrangements and manager of the meet, arrived in the city last evening and will remain until after the meet. He last evening interviewed Dr. W. S. Mott, chairman of the Democratic-Citizen's county organization, and that gentleman readily expressed himself favorable to the proposition of postponing until evening the political meeting. Mr. Kenworthy also communicated by telephone with Chairman Wrightman, who assured him that he would consult with the judges with a view to deferring the meeting until evening so as not to conflict with the athletic meet.

The athletic meet tomorrow afternoon promises to be a contest of the ordinary. The arrangements are about completed and the first event will come off at promptly 2 o'clock.
The track will be sprinkled and rolled from the 120 yard start and also lined so that each man will keep his place. The band from the Chenawee Indian school and Union Cornett band of Newberg will furnish the music for the occasion. Excursions will be run from Eugene, Corvallis, and Newberg. The athletes are all in the city and resting for tomorrow's exertions.

The brass from the various colleges in the state are arriving in the city this afternoon. University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college teams came in on the 4 o'clock local. The Pacific college team is to be in on the 1 o'clock boat. The other teams will arrive either this evening or early tomorrow morning.
The meet promises to be the best on record. The event are painfully uncertain. In the half-mile races the chances are about even between Wilkins, Burnett, O. A. C., Payne U. O., and Kenworthy P. C. The odds seem to be

The 100-yard dash lays between Bishop U. O., and Colvig and Redd O. A. C. Mile walk will go to O. A. C. The 200-yard hurdle will be an exciting race between Heater P. C., Palmer U. O., and Williams U. O., with chances in favor of Heater; Bonham U. U. will also be in the running and may be a surprise.
The 440 yard dash lays between Redmond U. O., and Redd O. A. C. Redmond has been ill for a few days, but is in form again now. His friends are confident of his winning.

The 120 yard dash is as uncertain as the 100. Probably will go the same way. In the two mile bicycle race there will be no old men. Beaty of U. U. is in good form but Riddle of O. S. N. S., will more than make him a hard run.
The mile run lays between Wilkins U. U., Stimpson O. A. C. and Payne U. O. Probably Stimpson first, Payne second, Wilkins third. There is no security on this, though. Weed P. C. is good for 4:50 or better while Baker O. S. N. S. is going well. It is possible that the mile will develop some surprises.

The 120 yard hurdle will probably go, Heater P. C. first, Palmer U. O. second, and Williams U. O. third.
The field events are no more certain. In the broad jump U. U. has three men who are doing more than 20 feet. Heater P. C. has gone 21 feet already this year in practice and will probably take the event, with the other two places to U. O. In the shot put Saunders U. U. will score first, Smith U. O. second.

The pole vault will go to Heater, P. C. Second place lays between Daily, P. C., and Milles, P. U., with a U. O. man in the running.
Smith U. O. will take the hammer throw with second place to O. A. C. The high jump lays between Bonkingham U. U. and O. A. C. Probably U. O. will win on account of better form. In the final line up U. O. stands the best show for the cup but O. A. C. is by no means out of it. The U. O. men must do all that is expected of them if they win while O. A. C. should develop some extraordinary and unexpected speed they will be victorious. W. U. and P. U. will put up a hard race for third place or if one of the big schools should fall down may do something better.

Leon Kenworthy has been in the city for several days making the final arrangements for the meet, and it is his indomitable exertions that much of the success of tomorrow's affair will be due.
Mr. Kenworthy makes the request that all persons having bills against the Association will present them to him by 7:30 Saturday evening.

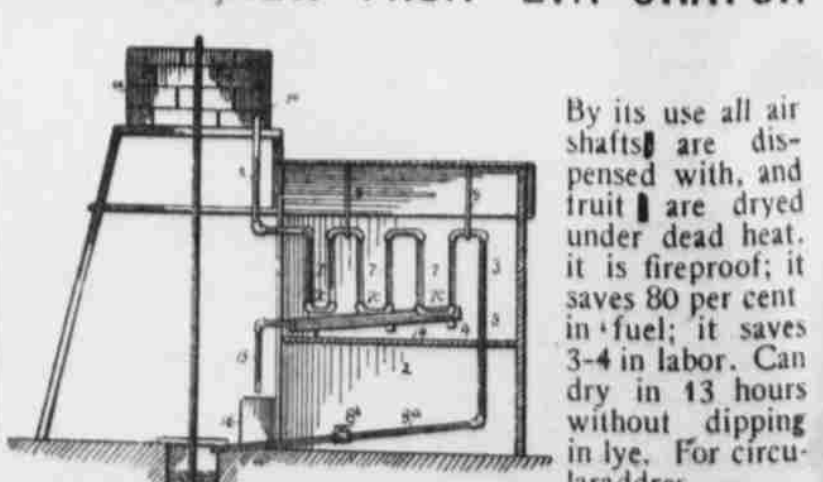
