THE NORMAL SCHOOLS

Marion county has sent in ten years 220 students to the Normal training school. If the total expense had been \$30,000 a year for Normal schools, our county's share would have cost just \$4.00 a teacher. If it cost \$8.00 a teacher to give them a Normal course would it not be a good investment?

Hugo Munsterberg in an article in the Atlantic Monthly shows that it is simply shocking the way we waste money and good raw material through miserably incompetent teaching in our public schools. Our investment ought to yield a hundred per cent better return than it does.

We are spending annually in Oregon a million of public taxes to pay teachers in our public schools, and the value of that investment depends wholly on the quality of the teachers. Does Oregon need to cut off a few small appropriations for normal schools. It is hardly the thing we should cut off.

The one thing that has been harped upon by the Republican candidates in the Marion county canvass has been to cut off the normal school appropriations. It was represented that not a dollar could be spent under the constitution to educate teachers, any more than lawyers or doctors. Later it was modified and the Republicans said too much was spent, that Oregon had too many normal schools.

The state grants and farmers alliance consider favorably the appropriation of money for Normal schools. They are the only means of getting a little higher education for the sons and daughters of the poorer and middle class who do not want to attend church schools or an university. Those appropriations should not be cut off. They might be reduced. We might have less schools. But men who are opposed to appropriations for Normal schools as a matter of principle ought not to expect to receive any support from friends of the public schools, because they are either misinformed or they are enemies of public education.

HART NO LAWYER.

FACTS SHOWN UP BY A PROMINENT POLK COUNTY REPUBLICAN.

The Record Shows That He Has Never Had Six Cases in the Circuit Court of His Own County.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—I desire to call your attention to an article which appeared in yesterday's issue of the "Journal," in which it was stated that Hart had been successful in giving a law practice, and you may not be aware with all confidence of truth, that Hart has never had a half a dozen cases in the circuit court of this county, and has never won in a single trial. He has never had a criminal case in the circuit court. The "Statesman" would leave the impression that he has conducted a successful law practice. This is not true. People of Polk county do not look upon him as a lawyer, for he is not, but as a school teacher. It would be the greatest calamity that ever befell the people of the third judicial district if he were elected, and they will find it out if he is elected. Paine have also been taken to court abroad in Marion county the impression that the duties of school superintendent in Polk county are light, and not enough to interfere with a law practice; and, indeed, Hart, in his letter to your paper, of some time back, said as much. This, again, is a campaign lie. If the duties of the office of school superintendent of this county were as light as he would have there is no time for anything else. Polk is not a backwoods county. Hart could have said with better show of truth that his duties as an officer should not have been interfered with by what little practice he picked up by pettyfogging. Since the first of January, Hart has been working for this nomination, and to further his schemes and place himself in the light of a lawyer he entered into this partnership he practically deserted the office of superintendent and placed a half-baked school teacher in charge of it. There has been much kicking among school directors and clerks on account of his neglect. He has evaded the duties of his office. In the campaign in your county he stated that he was a member of the leading firm of the district. This may be true, for there are no other attorneys in partnership in Polk county. Every other admitted attorney is practicing alone. The attorneys of the district are the best judges as to whether one of the leading firms of the district.

Another important thing which ought to do Hart no good: At the last session of the legislature he lobbied for the passage of S. B. 3, which became a law, and which gave him a salary of \$200. By this bill the salary of the office he held in Polk county was raised to \$1,000 per annum—an increase of about \$800. It was not intended that the provisions of that act should take effect until after the election of June, 1900, and of course, that the salaries the respective offices of the different counties would remain the same until that time. Section 15 of the act expressly provides that "the present office of the County Superintendent of Schools is not effected by this section until the election in the year 1900." In the face of this express provision of the act, and Hart, too, claiming to be a lawyer, has drawn his salary, at the rate of \$1,000 per year, instead of the \$200 salary which was all he was entitled to receive. I am glad to be able to say that this graft was allowed to a Republican officer by a Republican court. This matter has never been explained before, and I should never have mentioned it if Hart had confined his campaign within the boundaries of decency and truth.

AN UNWISE POLICY

Republican Legislative Candidates Antagonize Marion County Interests.

LEGISLATURE WILL BE ORGANIZED

IN AN UNFRIENDLY MANNER

IF THEIR POLICIES PREVAIL

Can the City of Salem Afford to Array Itself Against Higher Education and all the Rest of the State?

A very unwise policy has been pursued by the candidates on the Republican ticket, a policy fraught with dangerous and reactionary policies to the city of Salem and all the institutions in Marion county if it shall be endorsed by the voters at the polls Monday. Dr. Smith, Lot L. Pearce, and J. M. Poorman have at all places in the county declared against appropriations for Normal schools. At some places they have declared that they opposed appropriating a dollar for any educational institution above the common branches.

Dr. Smith at Aurora Thursday night declared that this was a matter the entire delegation had agreed upon, but it is not believed that any such agreement has been entered into in writing. But he went further and in assailing the editor of THE JOURNAL for voting for Normal school appropriations he said: "THE WORST THING THAT EVER HAPPENED TO THIS STATE WAS WHEN ANY PUBLIC BUILDING EVER WENT AWAY FROM THE CAPITAL." He went further and pointed out the danger Marion county has to face in this matter when he said:

"EVERY MEMBER FROM THOSE COUNTIES (HAVING SUCH INSTITUTIONS) IS AT THE LEGISLATURE TO SECURE HIS LOCAL APPROPRIATION."

For Marion county to elect a solid delegation pledged against Normal schools, or in any way unfriendly to higher education, means that all the counties having such interest to protect will organize the legislature against Marion county, and who can blame them? The Republican party has built up the Normal schools and institutions of learning in Oregon. It has not declared against such appropriations in its state or local platforms and these Republican candidates represent the party that they ask election and danger our local interests.

What are the facts? All states in the Union maintain Normal schools and support higher education. The plea that no money shall be appropriated to educate teachers any more than lawyers or doctors is a false premise, because the State University educates lawyers and doctors. Normal schools are a part of the American educational system, and if this legislature abolished them, there would be such a reaction that the next legislature would restore them. Oregon cannot take the step of abolishing Normal schools any more than she can deliberately propose to take herself out of the great union of states. She takes no steps backward.

Oregon appropriates less for Normal schools and higher education than any western state. If Messrs. Pearce, Smith et al. were proposing to raise the grades of the common schools, or to give the cities and towns a high school system to take the place of Normal schools they would be more consistent. But they are not. They would remove the only intermediate institutions where young men and women could get a little more education than is afforded in the common schools, without being forced to go to the State University, or to some sectarian institution.

If the state outside of Salem sends up a legislature against Normal schools, well and good. But it is unfortunate and suicidal for this city to join in the fight. The city of Salem will be raised, at least six counties will array themselves against Marion county. Portland and Eastern Oregon are always ready to put the state capital, the state fair and our other state institutions on the chopping block. As a business proposition, as men, these Republican candidates ought not to put Marion county interests in jeopardy on this point. We cannot afford to do as any county in the state.

It is unwise, unjust and unnecessary to put the city of Salem and Marion county in this attitude. If there are too many Normal schools, if they cost too much money reduce the amount. There are worse grafts than Normal schools. The legislature can be run economically without making war on any educational institution as following facts will show:

All these legislative sessions have appropriated less money than any session since or for four years before.

RECORDS CONTRADICT.

STATESMAN'S WILFUL EDITORIAL LIE SHOWN UP.

All Abusive Attempts to Vilify Sheriff Durbin Fall Flat When Put to the Test of Fact.

The Statesman under its present management never received more than \$150 to \$200 for publishing a sheriff's delinquent tax notice of sale, which can be proved by all the sheriff's for sixteen years back, up to John Knight. And the payment was always made from the sales and delinquent payments, and never drawn from the county treasury. The Statesman does not pose as a "reformer," but it would not have the nerve to charge \$730 for about \$150 worth of work, nor would we want to put a sheriff in such a "hole," if he thought anything of him or his future. The above would seem to be very plain, but it is a jugged statement. The saving clause "up to John Knight" is a good one, but smooth subterfuges don't pass for the truth. Under Wrightman, who succeeded John Knight, the Statesman received \$500 in one lump for advertising delinquent taxes.

The statement "and payment was always made from the sales," NEVER DRAWN FROM THE COUNTY TREASURY," is however, a whole lie and a flat one, for the above bill of five hundred dollars was paid by county warrant No. 35942, dated Dec. 10th, 1895, and the warrant was received for by O. B. Irvine, the present publisher of the Statesman who is now busy howling about reform and economy.

This bill was filed May 10th, by John B. Giesey, deputy clerk, allowed May 11th, according to the court record, and the warrant issued December 10th, one day before the bill was allowed. This may be a clerical error, but it is evident that no time was lost between the time of filing the bill and the drawing of the warrant.

Fifteen facts from the record show two point black lies, viz, that it never charged over \$150 or \$200 for a tax bill; and that the pay for the same was "never drawn from the county treasury."

In addition to the above it can be said that the tax lists published by THE JOURNAL were done at about half the rate charged by the Statesman in this \$500 claim. Ever since Sheriff Durbin has been in office sheriff sale notices have been published at \$2.00 per inch, instead of \$4.00 the price formerly paid. He has given litigants the choice of several papers, and has saved them all. He has not been treated as a "reformer," and that is what the papers who are fighting him can't endure.
