WILL TRY TO DODGE

Republican Legislative Candidates Will Try to Get Right.

THEIR DECLARED HOSTILITY TO NORMAL SCHOOLS ALL OVER THE COUNTY IS WELL ESTABLISHED

It Means to Put Marion County Interests on the Auction Block and Sell Them to the Highest Bidder.

THEY WILL TRY TO DODGE.

Dr. J. N. Smith will claim at Salem that he has been misrepresented, that he has never said that he was opposed to all Normal schools. He has made statements at different times that one Normal school was enough, and has denounced the Journal editor for voting for all Normal schools.

At the opening meeting of the county canvass it was announced that the Republican legislative candidates had agreed on five propositions, amend registration and election laws, to bond warehouses, create a state board of equalization, enact a primary reform law, and OPPOSE APPROPRIATIONS FOR NORMAL SCHOOLS.

This agreement was repeated at so many places and published in nearly every report of the meetings in the DAILY JOURNAL. Opposition to Normal schools was repeated at every place as part of the set speech by Pearce and Poomman. At Hubbard, Pearce said they opposed such appropriations, "BE THEY LARGE OR SMALL." They related how they would defy the dangerous and powerful Normal school lobby. At Brooks they were "opposed to the education of any professional class, especially NORMAL SCHOOLS." At Mt. Angel it was proclaimed louder than ever and won them some applause, that they were "OPPOSED TO ALL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NORMAL SCHOOLS AND ALL ABOVE THE COMMON BRANCHES." Capt. Poomman, at Scotts Mills, made the usual pledge, "THAT IF ELECTED ALL THE REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES FOR THE LEGISLATURE WOULD OPPOSE ALL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NORMAL SCHOOLS—NOT A DOLLAR ABOVE THE COMMON BRANCHES."

WHAT THEIR ELECTION MEANS.

Can Salem and Marion county afford to send a Republican delegation to the legislature who will compel a hostile organization of the legislature? Will not that be the inevitable result if a Republican delegation is sent to a Republican legislature from Marion county pledged to oppose appropriations for Normal schools?

Can this city and county, (which gets three-fourths all state appropriations,) put itself into an attitude of arousing the ill-will of the four counties having Normal schools (Lane and Benton county thrown in,) by beginning a warfare on a few small appropriations for Normal schools? It would be a policy fraught with danger.

These Republican candidates for the legislature who oppose Normal schools and higher education in any form do not represent the Republican party or any party. They are parading their own personal opinions, ignorant of the great broad facts, and ignorant of the forces that come together and struggle for control in a state legislature.

Is it good policy for Salem and Marion county to invite a fight from any part of the state? Are not Portland and Eastern Oregon ready to crucify this city at all times and on the slightest pretext and under the least provocation? One hostile legislature will give Salem a black eye from which it will not recover in years. A legislature that is organized against this city will cut all appropriations down to the bare expense of keeping the inmates, will make no needed improvements, repairs or additions to any institution. It may take the State Fair or some other institutions away, or attempt to remove the Capital itself and cause the taxpayer enormous expense.

THE ELECTION OF THE REPUBLICAN DELEGATION, or that part of the election that is making war on the NORMAL SCHOOLS, means to force the election of a speaker, and to force the organization that WILL PUT THE INTERESTS OF MARION COUNTY ON THE AUCTION BLOCK AND SELL THEM TO THE HIGHEST BIDDER.

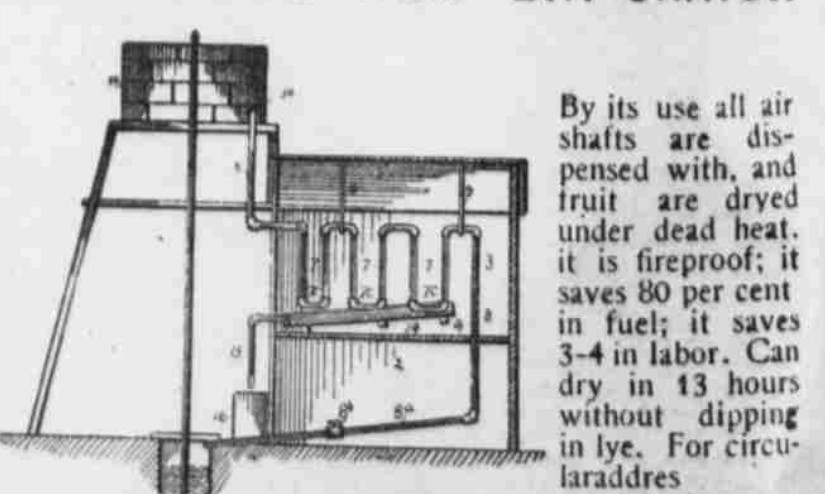
