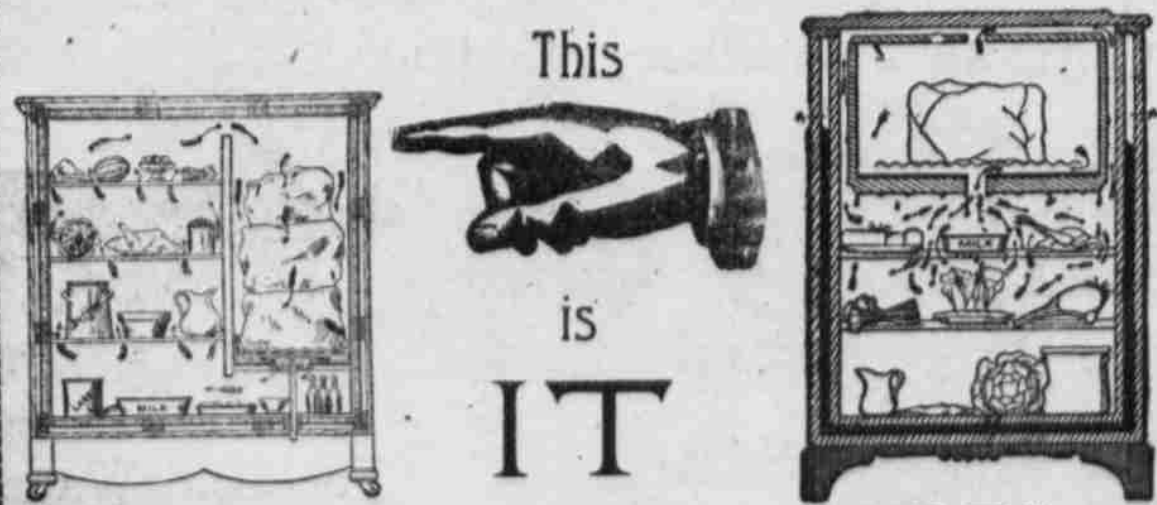

BOTH ESCAPES WITH HIS GUNS

Transvaal Forces Leave Pretoria But are Practically Intact.

ROBERT'S WILL ORGANIZE PURSUIT WITHIN ONE WEEK

British Will Occupy Malmonia -- Buller and Christian Have an Armistice at Laing's Nek.

As Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, June 6.—It appears evident that the Boer commander-in-chief, General Botha, with all his guns, withdrew in good order, probably along the Delagoa Bay railroad, with a view to joining President Kruger.

So the Transvaal forces remain practically intact, with Kruger and Steyn, General Botha and Secretary Reits all safe and in a position to continue the direction of affairs. It will probably take Roberts a week to organize a campaign of pursuit.

The military authorities anticipate that the next important news will come from Buller's direction. A dispatch from Mafeking announces the occupation of Malmonia, where 200 Boers have surrendered.

LONDON, June 6.—A dispatch from Lourenço Marques says: "Buller and Christian met at Laing's Nek. At Buller's request a three days armistice was agreed upon." The dispatch added that the British have evacuated Utrecht.

IRISH YEOMANRY REGIMENT TAKEN

LONDON, June 6.—Lord Roberts reports to the War Office that the Thirtieth Battalion of the Imperial Yeomanry (Irish) was "overwhelmed by the Boers at Lindley." Lord Methuen made a "magnificent march to their rescue," but was too late. Following is the text of the dispatch from Lord Roberts announcing the disaster:

"Pretoria Station, June 5, 12:55 p. m.—I regret to report that the Thirtieth Imperial Yeomanry had to surrender to a superior force of the enemy on May 31, near Lindley. On receiving information of the battalion being attacked, I ordered Methuen to proceed with all speed to its assistance. Methuen was then on the march, on the Heilbron side of Kroonstad, and half an hour after the receipt of my telegram on June 1 he started off. By 10 a. m. of the following day he had marched 44 miles in 25 hours, but he was too late to rescue Colonel Sprague's Yeomanry. Methuen attacked the Boers, who were between 2000 and 3000 strong, and after a running fight of five hours, completely routed the enemy.

"It is a very regrettable circumstance, but I trust it will not be very long before the Irish Yeomanry are released from captivity."

MARION COUNTY MIXED

NEARLY A THOUSAND VOTERS REGISTERED BUT DID NOT VOTE.

Populists Elect Hall—Elder Defeated for County Judge By Only 200. General Result On State and Legislature.

The ballots and tally sheets are in from all the precincts and generally the election judges and clerks did their work carefully. It is believed to have been one of the fairest elections ever held in this county. No one doubts that County Clerk Hall will safeguard the returns and give the people a canvassing board that is above even the suspicion of dishonesty.

For District Attorney Hart, is probably elected. Marion county will be fortunate if a good competent man is chosen for deputy.

For County Judge, Elder will be defeated by only two hundred. As he is in the prime of life it may still be County Judge Elder.

Portland park commission carries by a large vote.

Moody's plurality in the second district may be over 8000.

In the legislature the Republicans will have 58 on joint ballot, the Democratic Citizens 31, one doubtful.

In Portland the Citizens-Democrats elect four senators and ten representatives; Republicans two representatives.

Complete Polk county returns show the election of the Republican legislative ticket, but the defeat of Wells (Rep.) for joint representative for Polk and Lincoln; also the election by the Republicans of clerk, commissioner, superintendent and coroner. The Republican state and district ticket carried by 120 majority, local issues giving the fusionists a partial victory.

Frank Davey and Pete D'Arcy no longer carry the Catholic vote in their precinct.

The Democratic Citizens' ticket made the strongest gains in the German-American precincts.

Elkhorn is the banner Democratic Citizens' precinct. It shows a gain of more than a hundred per cent.

Congressman Tongue carries every county in the district but two.

Justice Wolverton runs away ahead of his ticket and of course is re-elected.

George Chamberlain is elected district attorney in Multnomah county on the Democratic-Citizen's ticket and is already talked of for governor in 1902.

The Union ticket made a clean sweep in Linn county. Palmer for county judge gets about 600 plurality. This is a splendid endorsement for Judge Barton's administration.

In Albany the editor of the Democrat got one majority for justice, and the Republican constable got in by one vote.

SMITH BROTHERS DISCHARGED. Other Orders Made in Department No. 1 of the Circuit Court.

An adjourned session of the February term of the state circuit, Department No. 1, was held yesterday by Judge Burnett.

The indictments against O. and W. Smith, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, committed upon their father in the mountains above Silverton last fall, was dismissed upon motion of the prosecuting attorney.

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BATTLE WITH BOXERS

Many Killed on Both Sides Not Far From Peking.

RUSSIA MAY ATTACK JAPANESE FLEET NOW BEING MOBILIZED

Russia Wants to Be Requested to Assist China to Restore Order--Dowager Empress Supporting the Boxers.

SHANGHAI, June 6.—The soldiers dispatched to attack the "Boxers," have fought an engagement quite close to Peking, many being killed on both sides. In consequence of the representations of Japan, the landing of a large Russian force at Taku is alleged to have been stopped. It is believed here that should Russia persist in sending a preponderant military force to the front, a collision with Japan will be the inevitable result.

Alarming reports are current of the hurried completion of the mobilization of the Japanese fleet.

The Russian minister, at Peking, has made another attempt to induce the Chinese foreign office to formally request Russian assistance to restore order, but the offer has not been accepted. Violent discussions are reported between the Chinese commander-in-chief and the forces of Jung-Lu and Prince Ching Tuan, who in accordance with the wishes of the dowager empress, are strongly supporting the "boxers."

The mobs who murdered the English missionaries, Robinson and Norman, mutilated and disemboweled the bodies. The station at Yan Tin, three miles from Peking, has been burned.

CLOSING SESSIONS OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A handful of members were on hand when the house reassembled this morning. A conference report on the general deficiency bill was agreed to.

Cannon submitted a conference report on the Sunday Civil Bill, showing an item covering the claims of Nevada, the only one in dispute. Among the items struck out were those for a light-house vessel for the Pacific coast and a branch soldiers' home in Idaho.

The Mississippi, Missouri and Columbia river items were retained.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—At 1 a. m., the senate reconvened to prepare for final adjournment. The usual routine of business was practically abandoned today, and a recess was taken to await the presentation of conference reports.

THERE ARE NO MORE CASES OF PLAGUE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 6.—The Board of Health reports no cases of plague reported within the past twenty-four hours.

The attorneys for the Chinese six companies have filed with the clerk of the United States circuit court an application for an injunction compelling the Board of Health, of this city, to abandon the quarantine, which it has imposed upon the Chinatown district.

The petition is filed in the name of Jew Ho, and recites the facts leading up to the quarantine. It sets forth that 10,000 persons are restrained of their liberty, but that residents of the district other than Chinese are not affected by the quarantine.

The petitioner denies that there is any plague within the quarantine quarter, or that there has been person in the district afflicted with the disease. Assuming that there may have been one or two isolated cases, the petitioners assert that the quarantine should apply only to those individual places where it may exist, and that it is unreasonable to quarantine the entire Chinatown district.

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STATE CONVENTIONS

DEMOCRATS OF INDIANA, MISSOURI AND IDAHO MEET.

All Endorse the Chicago Platform, are Unanimous for Bryan and are Harmonious in State Matters.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 6.—The Democratic State Convention met this morning. The platform reaffirms the allegiance of Indiana to principles of liberty enunciated by Jefferson, pledges allegiance to the principles of the Chicago platform of 1896 and commends Wm. J. Bryan to the people of the United States. The delegates at large elected were Samuel E. Morris, Hugh Dougherty, James Murdock, George B. Messier, John W. Kern was nominated for governor on the first ballot.

MISSOURI DEMOCRATS NOMINATE DOCKERY

KANSAS CITY, June 6.—The Democratic state convention reassembled this morning. The platform endorses the national platform adopted at Chicago in 1896, and declares continued fealty to the free coinage of silver and gold at a ratio of 16 to 1.

It denounces the tendency toward monopoly and the obstruction to competition. The platform reiterates adhesion to the Monroe doctrine and "deprecates the departure from its principles, which have been made by the Republican administration in its war for conquest." W. J. Bryan is endorsed. Ex-Congressman A. H. Dockery was nominated for governor by acclamation.

IDAHO DEMOCRATS ARE IN COVENTION

LEWISTON, June 6.—The Democratic convention met this morning. It developed that Governor Steunenberg is not a candidate for the Kansas City convention, and did not seek a specific endorsement of the Coeur d'Alene action. Committees were appointed, and the convention recessed. James Hamilton Lewis will probably receive the support of the Idaho delegation for the vice-presidential nomination.

A BRAKEMAN IS BADLY MANGLED

SOUTH BEND, Wash., June 6.—W. S. Bush, a brakeman, had one leg cut off and the other badly mangled by an engine last night.

G. J. Parker came down from Lyons this morning, and will be in the city a few days. He reports the hay crop, which is their chief product, in the finest shape ever known. The saw mills at Mill City and all above there are shut down for repairs, and may be closed some months. The annual G. A. R. reunion at Lyons, beginning July 3rd, promises to be a great success.
