CANVASSING THE RETURNS.

County Clerk Hall Forms 'His Board With Justice Clerk and Hillery.

County Clerk Hall has called to his assistance Justices of the Peace W. T. Clark, Democrat, of Gates, and W. M. Hillery, Republican, of Turner, to constitute with himself a canvassing board to canvass the returns from Monday's election.

Clerk Hall intended to call in Recorder N. J. Judah as one of the board, but four or five of the leading legal lights of the city gave it as their opinion that as the recorder's jurisdiction as justice of the peace was confined to the city, he would not be available.

This left Justice Clark, of Gates, as the only available justice of the peace of the opposition party.

Justices Clark and Hillery came in today, and the canvass will commence at 8 o'clock tomorrow, Thursday morning.

TO TAX SLOT MACHINES

ORDINANCE PASSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL

General Occupation Tax Suggested, and Other Important Legislation in Hand.

At a regular meeting of the council last evening all members were present except Geisner, Mayor Bishop in the chair.

Rolls ordered paid: J. O'Donald, \$50; Griewold & Chase, \$3.95; Griewold & Chase, \$28.55; N. J. Judah, \$2.00; Sam H. White, \$7.00.

The committee on ordinances reported "back to the council the ordinance licensing nicks in the slot machines in the city of Salem and do pass without amendment; we also ask further time in which to report upon the other ordinances heretofore referred to us." The ordinance was later passed.

Bids were received on 600 feet of fire hose, but action was indefinitely postponed.

The following resolution was offered and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, By the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, that whereas the city is in legitimate need of additional revenue, and that the same must be raised in such manner as to impose the lightest possible burden to the citizen, therefore this council favors a general occupation license, comprehending every line of business carried on here, and to this end, the mayor is hereby instructed to appoint a committee of eight from the body of this council, to frame and draft such an ordinance as shall meet the interests of the citizens by the lowest rate of license possible; and be it further

Resolved, That the committee herein provided for meet at the city hall, in

open session, at least twice a week, for the purpose of hearing the opinions and statements of the business men of Salem in this behalf, and that said committee conform as nearly as may be, in view of the best public service, to the estimates submitted by said business men in relation to the licenses proposed to be placed upon their particular lines of business; and that said committee report its findings to this council at the earliest practicable day."

Councilman Walker, who introduced the resolution, was made chairman of the committee by Mayor Bishop.

The application of A. Schreiber and Bach & Nadstank for liquor licenses, were referred to committee on licenses.

The petition of Hoover & Hide for permission to establish a sign advertising their business at their establishment on Commercial street, was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

An ordinance granting to Horst Bros. of San Francisco, permission to construct a private telephone line, was introduced, read two times and referred to the ordinance committee.

The following amendment to the bicycle ordinance was offered, and duly referred:

"It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride at any time any bicycle, tricycle, unicycle or tandem on the sidewalks of the city of Salem, within the following limits: On Commercial street from Trade to Center street; on the south side of State street between Commercial and Twelfth; on the east side of High street between State and Ferry streets; and on the west side of Commercial street between Center and Marion streets; on the south side of Ferry street between Commercial and Liberty streets."

Councilman Griewold also suggested amendments prohibiting wheelmen from the following sections of streets: North side of Court street between Capitol and High streets and the west side of Commercial street between South Mill creek and the southern boundary of the city. It will be seen that the territory to which wheelmen have access will be thus considerably reduced.

Bids were asked to be advertised for, for 400 chairs to seat the armory, and the council will meet next Monday evening to consider same.

At this point Alderman Allen arose to a question of information, asking "if the saloon men of the city had been given permission to keep their places of business open all day Sunday last?" To this Recorder Judah answered promptly, "No." The recorder then went on to state to the council that practically the same conditions existed here last Sunday as on "Conductors Picnic Sunday in June of last year. All saloons were kept open then, by agreement of the saloon men, who, rather than lose the commerce of a big day, would go into court and fight the ordinance. The same purpose prevail on last Sunday, and the recorder declared frankly, that he would not enter upon a series of prosecutions on this score unless the council fortified him with legal counsel to meet the talent the saloon men would certainly bring into court if any or all were arrested. He could not and would not act as judge and prosecuting attorney too, but said he was in possession of police reports covering all evasions of the ordinance on last Sunday and could and would put the law in operation if the city was properly represented in the contest that was soon to follow. He said this city was fortunate, in that, on neither event complained of, there been the slightest disorder, nor even a police call, and that the violation of the city laws relied, for its enforcement, in this particular relation, upon this disposition of the council to supply the police department with the necessary legal assistance to safely bolster the city's interest in the premises.

As happened last year, when a similar report was made nothing was done by the council at last.

Mayor Bishop stated that he was in receipt of a communication from Portland Insurance men notifying him that unless the residents of Salem very vigorously and effectively cleaned up their back yards, streets and alleys, and that in the very immediate future, there would be an advance in the local insurance rate. Upon motion of Griewold, Chief of police Gibson was instructed to notify property owners to clean their yards at once.
