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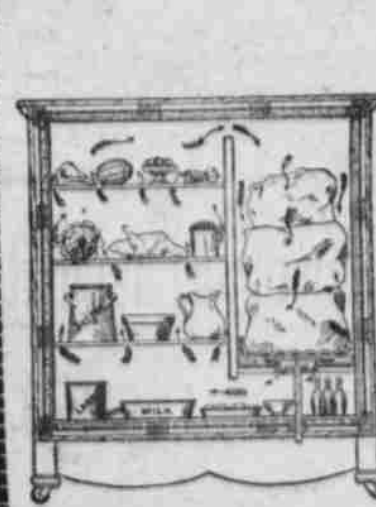

## SURRENDER DEMANDED

General Botha Concentrating About Hatherly.

GENERAL ROBERTS' ARMY IS RESTING AT PRETORIA

The Next Move Will Be in the Direction of Lydenburg--Natal Boers on the Point of Surrendering.

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, June 7.—In the absence of anything from British sources enlightening the Boer statement that Buller requested an armistice, military experts believe that the revised version of the story will show that Buller summoned the Boers to surrender or evacuate their positions within three days.

A dispatch from Lourenco Marques says the Boers under General Botha are concentrating in the neighborhood of Hatherly, 12 miles east of Pretoria.

'Roberts Operation'.

LONDON, June 7, 4:35 a. m.—Military operations in South Africa are apparently at a standstill. For a day or two the tired troops of Lord Roberts are resting and he is filling the magazines and warehouses at his new base, Pretoria, preparatory to a long chase after the retreating Boers in the direction of Lydenburg. His cavalry is probably seeking to intercept Commandant-General Botha.

Some dispatches are to hand, which left Pretoria Monday, while the fighting was going on outside the city. They came by way of Lourenco Marques. One of them says:

"Toward the end of the day, when the British naval guns were shelling the southern forts, a number of projectiles burst, damaging the suburbs. All day armed burghers have been leaving Pretoria, going east. The greater part of the railway rolling stock has been removed. General Botha was fighting an essential rear-guard action, his object being not to defend Pretoria, but to delay Lord Roberts until the railway switch had been cleared and the main part of the Boer army had started to withdraw. The British advance appears to have left open to the Boers the best line of retreat along the railway."

Possibly Lord Roberts has been able to cut the railway before a full retirement was effected. That Pretoria would be defended was apparently given out after the council of war with a view of misleading the British.

Lydenburg, the district to which the provisions originally destined for Pretoria have been diverted, and where a cartridge factory has been erected and reserve supplies of all sorts are stored, is a volcanic region of fertile valleys, enclosed by great ramparts of precipitous rocks, penetrated by narrow, winding passes. There are herds of cattle in the valleys, and there is much native labor available for fortifying.

The Boers used both heavy and light artillery at Pretoria. What is supposed to have been the last train that left Pretoria arrived at Lourenco Marques Sunday evening. The passengers included a number of foreign volunteers, who were leaving the Boers, and also the wives and children of Hollanders. They described Pretoria as destitute of food and clothing. What the Boer officials could not take, the natives and townspeople did.

Probably the most important Boer

army is at Laing's Nek, where both sides are passive. General Buller and General Brabant have withdrawn a little southward. General Baden-Powell has extended martial law to the Marico and North Lichtenburg districts. Shots were exchanged between the Boer and British patrols, 18 miles west of Mafeking, May 28. Part of the forces lately at Pretoria are reported to have gone westward to meet Baden-Powell, and to make a show of holding the country through which he and General Hunter are moving.

A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Newcastle, dated Tuesday, described the Boers there as an unorganized rabble, without flour, meat or sugar. Their surrender is only a question of time. Nevertheless, the correspondent avers, they hold strong positions, with a prospect of a safe retreat toward Lydenburg. It is understood at Newcastle that the British Government has approached the Natal Government with a proposition that Natal shall voluntarily renounce local self-government for a time in order that a good system of crown government may be instituted for all South Africa, leading in the course of time to federation and the subsequent autonomy of the various states simultaneously. Lourenco Marques correspondents attach significance to the number of British warships in Delagoa Bay, suggesting that they are there possibly in anticipation of aiding the Portuguese in the event of disturbances on the Transvaal border.

It-Fated Yeomen.

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, June 7.—A list of the casualties is now coming through. It indicates that there was severe fighting before the 13th. The Yeomanry have surrendered. The killed includes Sir John Elliott, Cecil Power and Baronet; and among the wounded is Earl Longford.

## CONGRESS IS EXPIRING

But it Has Made Tremendous Large Appropriations.

EFFECT OF TALK ABOUT REPEALING THE FIFTEENTH AMENDMENT

Cleveland Democrats Orphans and Looking for a Moses to Lead Them in Battle

By Associated Press to the Journal. WASHINGTON, June 7.—When the house re-convened this morning many members had already left for their homes and there was danger of quorum failing. Leaders of both sides could with difficulty persuade members to remain at their posts.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The appropriation made by the first session of the fifty-sixth congress amount to \$709,709,450. This includes \$137,247,155 estimated to be on account of the war with Spain. The remaining amount represents the ordinary appropriations for the government.

Boston, June 7.—Former Judge Walker, who was mentioned as a presidential possibility at the meeting of the national Negro party, says: "This action of the colored people seeking a new party is inspired by the recent talk about repealing the fifteenth amendment."

"There is a feeling among colored people against the Republican party, if President McKinley is the standard bearer. 'McKinley has no sympathy for the negro.'"

New Haven, Conn., June 7.—E. C. Benedict, who recently returned from a trip with Ex-President Cleveland, says:

"The Cross outrages perpetrated in the good name of the Democratic party by the present managers of the party by that name, makes me and many others political orphans. But opportunity will come for the formation of a great party, based on a platform similar to that of the national Democratic party of 1892 and a Moses to lead it will be forthcoming when the proper time arrives."

WASHINGTON, June 7.—When the senate convened today, the conference on the naval appropriation bill, were still in session. The senate began the consideration of private pension bills. In the house fifty-eight pension bills were passed.

AFTER THE CHASE

Terrible Condition of March's Men--Aguinaldo May Be Alive.

By Associated Press to the Journal. MANILA, June 6.—A dispatch from Candon, dated June 4, says Major P. C. March's men of the Thirty-Third Regiment returned to Candon that day by steamer from Aparri. The majority of the men were ready for the hospital. They are thin and weak, having travelled 250 miles in the mountains, during which they suffered greatly from hunger. Of the 50 horses which started with the battalion 13 survived. The remainder died on the march or fell into the canyons.

The battalion collapsed at Pinal, 30 miles from Tuguearao, as the result of fevers and exhaustion. Eighty-seven of the men were conveyed from Pinal to Tuguearao in bulcarts, and those who fell by the way were carried on litters. The officers accompanying Major March were Captains Henry L. Jenkinson and Edward Davis; Lieutenants Carroll Power and Frank L. Case and Dr. John O. Greenwall, assistant surgeon.

They say it is all guesswork as to whether Aguinaldo was shot. Before the Americans struck Sagasta, the insurgent chief divided his forces into parties of 10, following different trails. The report among the natives is that Aguinaldo was wounded in the shoulder. Papers show that nearly all the presidents installed by the Americans in General Young's territory are treacherous, and have been making regular reports to Aguinaldo as to the disposition and movements of American troops, and they have been collecting and forwarding taxes. The captured papers also prove the disloyalty of the native telegraph operators, whom the Americans retained on the Cayagan Valley line.

When Tirona surrendered, the Filipino forces in that section those operators professed loyalty and took the oath of allegiance, but it is now shown that they have been sending Aguinaldo copies of important telegrams exchanged between the American officials. Letters were also found relating to large contributions forwarded to Aguinaldo from Spanish and other foreign business men.

## MAY WE SPRINKLE.

CITIZENS MOVING TO SECURE A LITTLE HELPFUL CO-OPERATION.

The State, the County and the City Authorities May Join in a Watering Movement.

Citizens are asking the state officials the county officials and the city officials to unite in a movement to sprinkle the streets along public property. Secretary Dunbar and Gov. Geer were seen today by Salem citizens and asked to co-operate in a movement to secure the daily sprinkling of those parts of Court and State streets between Twelfth and High.

The state is now sprinkling part of the streets around the capitol. The county is sprinkling part of the streets around the court house. The city is doing nothing in the sprinkling line.

City Recorder Judah was seen and said he would consult with the mayor and committee on streets. He thought an agreement should be reached to sprinkle the two principle streets along the county, city and state property, as it was too much to ask the citizens on those streets to keep those wide and dusty public thoroughfares wet down at their private expense.

Secretary Dunbar said the state would cheerfully co-operate. Governor Geer said the street should be sprinkled from the Southern Pacific depot to the business part of the city. He expected 1200 troops here to the military encampment, and there ought to be one street where they would not march in a cloud of dust.

The county court was in session, and Judge Terrell said he would rather defer action until his predecessor went into Office July 5th. But they would be glad to see figures on the probable expense. The county was spending some money on keeping up the grounds and much more could be done by a little co-operation other otherwise.

A number of men engaged in raising heavy timbers in the erection of a barn noticed that the child was being beheaded, became panic stricken, and in the confusion heavy timber fell, killing 8 men.

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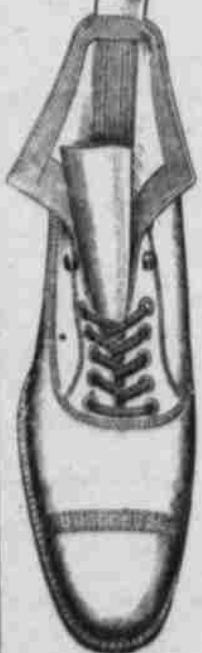
