VALUE OF AN OPPOSITION PARTY. The battle that has been fought by the Democratic-Citizen's party in Marion county will prove of the greatest value to the taxpayers of this city and the county and the state at large. THE DAY'S EVENTS.

June 7, 1900.

Five different Sunday school parades occurred in different parts of Brooklyn, the number aggregating approximately sixty thousand children and teachers.

The village of Barlow, Ohio is celebrating her Centennial anniversary.

The Architectural League of America opened their second annual convention at the clubrooms of the Chicago Architectural Club, Art Institute.

The Connecticut Democratic State Convention was called this morning, Mayor Kilduff being temporary Chairman. Four district and eight county delegates are to be chosen for the Kansas City Convention. This is only the second time in the history of the Democratic party of Connecticut that its convention has been held elsewhere than Hartford or New Haven.

Rabbi Friedman, of Emanuel Temple, which has the largest congregation of the Jewish synagogues between Chicago and San Francisco, will this evening deliver a lecture before the students of the State Agricultural College, of Colorado.

The Beer Envoys arrived at St. Paul this evening they will attend a mass meeting arranged by a citizens committee. Dr. Fischer exhibited specimen dum dum and explosive bullets which, he says, had been taken from the British after the battle of Spion Kop.

The Fourth annual convention of the League of Wisconsin Municipalities opens at Janesville with an address of welcome by Mayor Richardson. President Douglas will then deliver his annual address. The evening programme will conclude with a paper on "The Responsibilities of Citizenship" by Governor Scott. Stephen W. Gilman, of Madison, will read a paper on "The Relation of Uniform State Accounting to Wisconsin Municipalities." A patent voting machine will be inspected.

Mrs. Etta Warner, of New York, appeared before Magistrate Mayo for the third time, charged with throwing a tomato into the face of the wife of Dr. John T. Cronin. Mrs. Warner strenuously denies her guilt and claims to be able to prove a circumstantial alibi.

The Old Fellows of Rhode Island are celebrating the eighty-first anniversary of their order by a big demonstration at Providence today. Large delegations from Massachusetts and Connecticut are in attendance.

Miss Mary Crocker, daughter of the late Charles F. Crocker, of California, and Francis Burton Harrison, of New York, were married at Tuxedo shortly after noon today. The wedding was the most brilliant affair ever solemnized at Tuxedo. Miss Crocker has an independent fortune of about \$50,000.

Recently she planned a trip around the world and asked Miss Mary Scott, daughter of Henry T. Scott, of the celebrated Union Iron Works, the great western shipbuilding concern, to accompany her. Miss Scott accepted the invitation and Miss Scott bade her friends in California adieu. A year's travel was arranged when Cupid stepped the plans, and Miss Scott was today a bridesmaid instead of a traveling companion. The ceremony was followed by a reception at Mrs. Alexander's Tuxedo residence. The large bay window in Mrs. Alexander's house that overlooks the lake was turned into a bower of Spring flowers, and there the young couple stood and received the congratulations of their friends. They will make an extended foreign bride tour.

The annual business meeting of Congressional Home Missionary Society was held at Detroit, Michigan, today. The business consisted mainly in the reading of the reports and the election of officers. In behalf of the Congressional Church Building Society, addresses were delivered by Secretary L. H. Cobb, D. D., of New York, the Rev. James H. Hays, of Charleston, Mich., and the Rev. G. J. Powell, Fargo, N. D.

Two Business Houses Burned—Serious Conflagration. Averted by An Able Local Bucket Brigade.

At a few minutes past midnight (Wednesday) fire was discovered in the rendering room back of McGillivray's meat market. Before it could be stopped the fire had spread to Dr. Ransom's drugstore and both were destroyed. The meat market was owned by Jacob Detweiler and the loss includes a windmill and water tank. Total loss about \$4000. No insurance.

Dr. J. W. Ransom's drug store and contents are a total loss, in all estimated at \$6000. No insurance. "I was talking with an agent about insuring it yesterday," said the doctor. But he didn't. A very efficient bucket brigade composed of all the able-bodied male population of Turner was formed and protected property on all sides. Mrs. Potter's residence caught fire twice, as did Small's hotel. There was a stiff wind and burning shingles were carried all over the town. Men climbed onto the burning buildings and in a really heroic manner fought the fire hand-to-hand and without any apparatus whatever.

The Southern Pacific telegraphed for help to Albany and Salem. Before any fire engines could have been sent from Salem by train a switch engine would have had to be brought from Albany. So John Duncan, the efficient Salem Fire Chief got his men ready for any emergency and at once decided to drive an engine with four horses to Turner.

SALEM RESPONSES. Mayor Bishop was out of town, and upon receiving orders from City Recorder Judah acting as mayor, the Salem Fire Department was ready to take

a light flinty engine with four horses to Turner. A wagon load of hose was ready and would have started in a few minutes and would have reached Turner by 1:30, but word came that the fire was under control.

The beautiful little city of Turner has had a narrow escape and its people can consider themselves very fortunate that all things considered. This close call should result in the organization of a good fire company, with at least a hook and ladder apparatus.
