EXPANSION POLICY

MISSOURIANS HAVE NO DESIRE TO GROW BIGGER.

Frauds Recently Unearthed in Cuba Are the First Fruits of a Colonial Policy.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 7.—Four thousand Missouri Democrats met in a huge tent in Shelley Park at a state convention to name a full state ticket and adopt a platform. There are no serious conflicts in sight and a harmonious gathering is predicted. The convention is made up of 123 delegates and a like number of alternates. The convention was called to order shortly before noon by S. B. Cook, the state chairman, who introduced Congressman Cowherd, of Kansas City, as temporary chairman. He arraigned the expansion policy of the Republican party in the most scathing terms. He said:

"We began the war with Spain with the solemn pledge to all the world that we disclaimed any disposition to exercise sovereignty or control over the island of Cuba except for its pacification, and that we would leave the government and control of the island to its own people. For two years now we have held it under military rule, we have levied and collected taxes and spent the money as we pleased. During 1899 we collected in taxes from the impoverished and war-ridden people of that little island more than \$16,000,000, and spent, aside from expenses charged to municipalities, more than \$12,000,000."

"If you would judge how economical such an administration has been, you have but to remember that Cuba is hardly as large as an average congressional district in Missouri and that the total expenses of our state government last year was less than \$2,000,000."

He then went on to show what he called unnecessary extravagance in the matter of salaries for Cuban office-holders, adding:

"But, as though this was not shame enough, we find a useful and practical politician exported from Indiana who, it is admitted, has stolen \$105,000 in the last eighteen months, and probably when the sale of stamps unaccounted for is added, has pocketed a cool half million. It is the first and legitimate fruit of a colonial policy and a subject people."

PHILIPPINE LETTER.

Graphic Description of Soldier Life in Our Latest Possessions.

Private Jack, 34th U. S. V., in Albany Democrat.

SANTA MARIA P. T's., April 18, 1900.

DEAR SIR:—Thinking that a few lines from this part of the world would be of interest to your readers, I will try and explain what the troops are doing today.

There is 65,000 troops on the island of Luzon and the largest part of them are doing nothing today, just simply garrisoning the towns, and hiking all the time.

There is always a detail going some where and at all hours of the day and night. The country is patrolled all the time and very seldom an insurrection is found. They are all Amigos as soon as you find them, and when you leave them they get their arms and start in robbing the peaceful natives, and occasionally attacking the outposts. They are getting over firing on an outpost for they have found out to their sorrow that the American soldiers do not run at every shot that is fired. The fighting in the northern part of the island is about over. All of the insurgents have gone to the south line, and a few Ladrone are left, and they are coming in and surrendering every day. There is only a few skirmishes now and then and that does not amount to nothing.

I will give you an outline as to what the 35th U. S. volunteers have been doing since they landed. We left Portland Oct. 4th and arrived at Honolulu 8 days later. We stayed long enough to coal up and then started for the Philippine islands. We arrived all right save for an accident on board three days out from Honolulu. We were given spoiled beef for dinner and in four hours time 425 boys were attacked with cramps and pains in the stomach. Only one man died, and he was sick just five hours. His name was Clara, and was from Spokane. It was a bad beginning for my company. Today we have 100 men for duty out of 100.

We arrived in Manila on the morning of the 32nd day. We landed two days later and was sent at once up north to San Fernando, 60 miles from Manila. Two days later we started for Cabaio. We reached the place after two days hard marching in mud up to our knees. We stayed at that place (Co. G, and C.) for three weeks and then moved six miles to the north to San Isidro. Our regiment got together there again, we only stayed fifteen days and was getting ready to take San Miguel.

By this time Gen. Landon with the 34th volunteers and the 4th Cavalry had arrived from Dagupan. The plan was to go around in behind the place and keep them from getting away into the mountains. A part of the 16th infantry to keep them busy on the south side and

7 pieces of artillery and the 35th to attack them on the north side which was supposed to be strongly fortified. There was supposed to be 300 troops under Gen. Rio de Pilar.

Well to make a long story short we only fired about 2000 rounds and took the town, killing about half a dozen who was left behind. They got away as easy as could be expected. They went from there to San Mateo on the south line keeping in the mountains all the way.

We stayed there (Co. G, and H.) only 2 days and went to Nozangari and stayed there 5 weeks and then moved to Quingua 6 miles from Baling and 2 miles from Malos.

We are at present quartered in our Libby tents at Santa Maria, 2 miles from the railroad and 12 miles from Manila. We are just garrisoning this place, doing nothing at all in the way of fighting.

The weather is very hot at present. It has rained about a dozen times since December. The rivers are all dried up and the heat is almost unbearable at times.

We are all waiting to see what the peace commissioners are going to do. I don't think they will do any thing toward getting the troops home this year.

I can't see myself what the United States wants with these islands. They are worth nothing and what I have seen of the island is good for nothing. There is a telegraph line all over the island and an operator at every place where there is any troops stationed.

At first the line was cut every day, a few natives hung and their houses burned and it was soon stopped. The supplies are hauled in by four mules to a big wagon. A guard of 5 men accompany every wagon. I will close hoping this will be of interest to your readers.
