SAY IT IS JUSTICE OF THE PEACE O'DONALD BY ONE MAJORITY.

Hon. John Lewis Defeats the Hon. Douglas Minto by 262 Votes--Official Canvass.

County Clerk Hall, assisted by Justices Hilleary, of Turner, and Clark, of Gates, as a county canvassing board, this forenoon completed the canvass of the ten Salem precincts. Following is the official vote on justice and constable:

#### STATE RETURNS.

Republican Majority on Joint Ballot Will Be Twenty-four.

Few of the counties have made full returns of the votes cast on Monday's election. The official canvass has been made in most of them, and the result confirms the reports previously given out. The state gives a Republican victory. The story as it appears from the reports at hand, is told in the following:

Tongue's plurality in the first congressional district, according to the incomplete returns, 2947, and Moody's in the second, 8405.

The next Oregon legislature will have 24 Republican majority. Later returns make a few changes in the list as published yesterday. One Fusionist was elected in Clackamas county, and a Republican in Harney and Malheur. W. L. Wells, Rep., appears to have been defeated for joint representative for Polk and Lincoln, and L. M. Simpson, Fusion, elected. B. F. Allen, Fusion, won in Clatsop county. Elmer E. Malory is the second Republican elected in Multnomah. The standing of the legislature will be:

#### MILITIA MATTERS.

Armory Improvements--Anxiety About the New Encampment.

This is the last day for receiving into the Oregon National Guard recruits that will be entitled to privileges of encampment that will open one month from today.

Company F, of Salem now has nearly sixty men. A number of applicants are pending and at a meeting to be held this evening will be acted upon. The school of guard mount will also be gone through this evening. The company has accepted an invitation to attend services at the United Evangelical church next Sunday which will be its first time to attend divine services in a body.

It is expected a day for meeting Captain Finzer's company from Woodburn, will be set for the near future. It is proposed that the two companies meet midway between Salem and Woodburn pitch tents, and camp over one night which will give them opportunity for drill exercises, preparatory to the coming encampment.

A stage has been put in the large armory in the city hall building and chairs for seating the auditorium have been advertised for by the city so that the hall may be used for public meetings when not in use by the militia. As the time of encampment approaches, meets of soldiers at the armory headquarters are now frequent and soldiers may be seen going and coming any evening.

Some anxiety is felt as to the encampment. The date has been fixed July 7 to 15 with the understanding that it be held on the state fair grounds, but no definite arrangements have yet been made. Adjutant-General Gantenbein and Brigadier-General Beebe are expected at the capital within a day or two when definite announcement can be made.

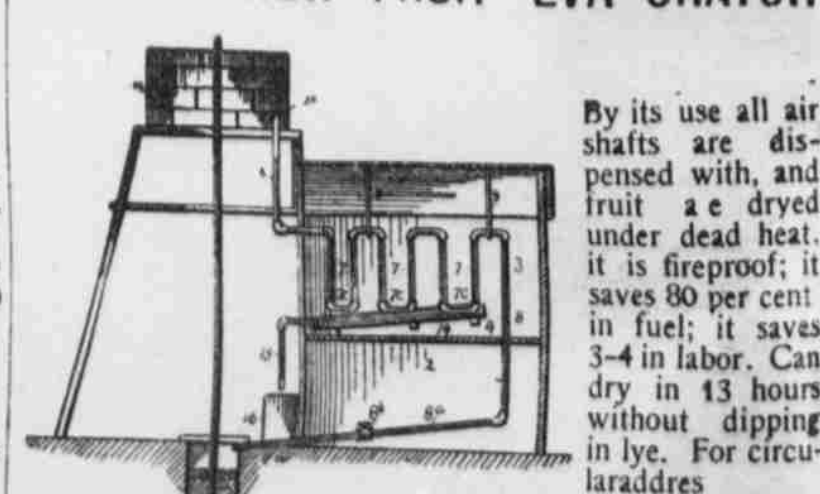
