IN CASES OF TIE, between candidates for county offices the two having the same vote are to decide by lot, which is usually done by letting a third party draw one of two straws, the candidate getting the longer straw holding the office. This law is made for county offices, but applies equally well to constables and justices and the tie in Mehama and Turner will be decided in that way.

The county canvassing board will not complete the footings of the official count before late Friday night. The figures published above are not final official totals but are nearly correct.
