JESSE APPLIGATE.

How He Lost His Property Because of Another Man's Crime.

From the Daily Eugene Guard.
The name of Jesse Appligate was a very familiar one to the pioneers of Oregon. The Dr. Watchman has published a sketch of his life, "Something about the Sage of Yoncalla," running through several issues of the paper, which is very interesting. We give a couple of extracts, one of which relates to his financial ruin and the dishonesty of a state official, and the other regarding the closing days of his eventful life.
"About this time (1865), Appligate signed a surety bond for a large sum, for Samuel E. May, the secretary of state. May proved to be a thief and his bondsmen were compelled to pay the deficiency of which he was guilty. Appligate turned over to the state all his money, notes and accounts, and about 1,000 acres of land, retaining only his old papers, the implement and symbol of his prosperous years. He and his wife then went to California, and he at making fence and she as cook for a household of workmen, fourteen in all. Both worked beyond their strength and the woman broke down first, being compelled to abandon the task.

"He gave minute instructions in regard to his funeral—wished it to be very plain, no display or ornamentation about his dress or the box in which he should be laid to rest; gave directions that no costly foreign stone should mark the spot, but that his son, in planning a piece of native sandstone, which he wished that son to prepare with his own hands—a plain, smooth slab with, on one side, the name of her who had been his life's companion. 'Nothing else,' he said. 'If anyone wants to know more let him consult the records.' His wishes have been carried out."
The state of Oregon did Jesse Appligate a great wrong when they stripped him of the fruits of a lifetime of toil and honorable endeavor. In all equity they should Jesse Appligate have been compelled to make good the stealings of an official whom the people of Oregon had selected to handle their funds and attend to their business.

The bond did not make Samuel E. May honest. It did not keep him from stealing public money entrusted to his keeping. Yet the thief was allowed to go unwhipped of justice while an innocent man was stripped of his possessions and torn out of his home, dependent upon his children.

All this was done in the name of justice the letter of the law might be observed, not that the people of Oregon had the least desire to rob old Jesse Appligate of his property! It was a grievous wrong.

EDUCATIONAL OFFICES.

To Be Filled in Various Institutions by the State Board.

The State Board of Education went to Drain today, to elect a new president, and officers and faculty for the State Normal school at that point. President Walker is not an applicant for reelection.

At the next meeting of the State Board of Education, superintendents and faculties will be selected for the Reform School, Mute School and Blind school. A special meeting will be held early next week for this purpose. If a special meeting will take place at the regular meeting on the first Monday in July. Mr. Prescott says in a Salem dispatch: Under the system now prevailing, every position becomes vacant by the expiration of the year for which the incumbent was elected. There are therefore, vacancies in all the faculty positions in all the schools.

It has been the custom of the Board of Education to elect the subordinate officials without any special consultation with the superintendent. As a result of this method there has been almost constant friction in some of the institutions, the superintendent and faculty failing to agree. This has been particularly true at the blind school. A year ago Superintendent Carter, of the blind school, assured the board that if they would select a faculty satisfactory to him he would conduct the school without friction. The board took him at his word, and after giving him another year in which to demonstrate his ability to run the school smoothly, they elected a faculty approved by him. A member of the board said today that the experiment has proved satisfactory, as there has been harmony at the blind school all the year.

Interest in the Clatsop county election centers in the result of the legislative fight. John Hahn is elected by a safe majority. The following is the official count: For Representative—B. F. Allen, Citizens, 923; John Hahn, Citizens, 1117; Frank R. Stokes, Republican, 890; John E. Young, Republican, 915 Hahn and Allen are elected on a Citizen's ticket. Hahn was a member of the house in 1899 and is recalled as the member who at a very critical time blocked the Portland water bond bill.

Thurman Will Probated.
The will of E. J. Thurman, who died in Marion county on May 15th, has been admitted to probate, on petition of Elizabeth Thurman, the widow, and Albert Whitlock, the latter being named in the will and appointed by the court as executor. The estate consists of property in Marion county valued at \$9,000, in Multnomah county \$1,000.

The heir-at-law are named as follows: Elizabeth Thurman, widow of deceased, Lydia H. Mores, Elizabeth Whitlock, Ametia I. Whitlock, Maudie L. Thurman, Kate Porter and E. J. Thurman, all of Silverton, Mary J. Webb, of Gervais, Sum. M. Remington, of Whiteson, Barryman, Wash. The will was signed on Jan. 31, 1900 in the presence of George Custer, F. E. Wey and Chas. H. Brewer. The appraisers appointed are, for Marion County, C. Ramsby, S. T. Hobart and Philip Hicks; for Multnomah, Samson Jones, W. J. McKinney and A. C. Brush.

Big Day's Collection.
Sheriff Durbin Thursday collected \$8,224.95 tax money, which is one of the biggest day's collections on record, \$7,374.75 of this was however, a lump sum from the Southern Pacific. This was for 1899 taxes; and the prompt payment of so large a sum shows the value and importance of Sheriff Durbin's methods of pushing all tax collections. Under the old system this sum of over seven thousand dollars might have dragged along for a year or two, costing Marion county (or rather the smaller tax payers, who as a rule pay promptly) about \$500 a year interest. Let the good work go on.

Circuit Court.
Judge Burnett held a short session of Dept. No. 1 of the circuit court this morning. In the mining case of W. H. Fletcher vs. Geo. Appleard, a motion to retax costs was allowed, and the costs were relaxed in favor of Geo. Appleard and J. L. Freeland at \$56.30. The following cases were continued until the October term.

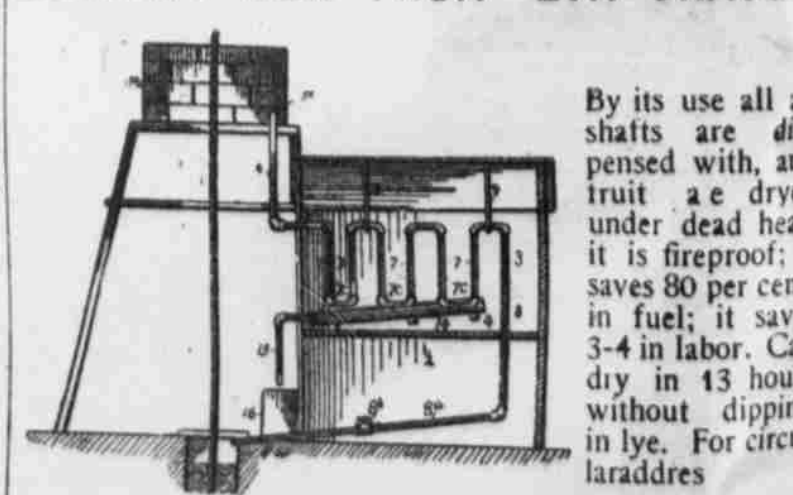
