GOOD DRIVING STREETS.

An Imperative Necessity to Get Rid of Back Piles Called Streets.

The Governor and other state officials have been out of town the past few days, and no progress has been made toward sprinkling State and Court streets. Secretary Dunbar is very much interested and willing to do all in his power to bring it about.

Mayor Bishop and Recorder Judah are interested in securing the sprinkling of those two streets, so as to have at least one or two sections of decent driving streets where a horse owner can take his family out without ruining every stitch of clothing on their backs.

A prominent Salem businessman, who keeps a fine driving horse, was seen by a JOURNAL writer this morning, and he was hot. He said, in substance:

"There has been a great amount of talk about good roads, sprinkling the streets and etc., and nothing being done, only talk, and poor work. That is more of detriment than good."

Sprinkling the street to depot is all right, so far as it goes. But wouldn't it be a good idea to get a passable street to the depot first? There is no earthly use of sprinkling a lot of rocks and boulders, such as it is along by the nursery, hospital and cany. There is not a rod of decent road between Commercial street and the depot and there is no excuse for it. The cost would be comparatively small to put that street in good shape, and even all the streets in Salem, in the summer season would be nice drives, by adopting a simple and inexpensive rule, and that rule is this: Haul all the rocks OUT OF THE TOWN instead of HAULING THEM IN, and NEVER ALLOW a load of gravel on the street or county road, without it being screened. California is advertising by having good roads, and they claim the advertisement of good roads is better than all the other advantages of the state combined. Santa Clara county sprinkles every public highway in the county, and advertises that every mile in the county will do to speed a horse on. Marion county has not got a quarter of a mile within its borders you can speed a horse on. Naturally we have the finest soil and material in the world for making good roads. There is no excuse for not having them, in summer. It looks like Oregon ought to benefit by California's experience. They work the roads in the winter, and level them in spring. There spring work is all done by one man with a team and harrow, and one man with a shovel and rake. They say that outfit will go as much work in one day towards putting roads and in condition, as 30 men will under the old way, or the way Marion county is doing now. They are doing work now in North Salem, that the parties that are doing acknowledge it is a detriment for this summer. They are hauling rock there that any quality of them is 4 to 6 inches in diameter and 1/2 of each load would pack in forty years. Now in regard to sprinkling streets: In first place, the streets want to be put in shape to sprinkle, and sufficiently long for a drive.

If they would commence and go up Center (from Commercial) to Winter street, and Winter to the carline, and to the fair grounds. That would make nice drive and could be easily put in shape, for very little money. Harrow a portion of Winter street, put in some wider curbs, and have county stop those teams hauling the rocks on there. And if the county and town will clean up those streets, put them in proper shape, I think there will be no trouble in getting them sprinkled from now till after the State fair. I have no property in Salem, but will give \$5 per month and double it if necessary to have that road sprinkled. What say the town and county?"

THE JOURNAL believes that by a wise co-operation of the state, and county officials, and citizens, like the gentleman quoted above, some beautiful streets for driving and wheeling could be secured. The question recurs, have we the enterprise and intelligence to put things together and secure results?

DIED.

HUCKLESTEIN.—On Saturday, June 9, 1900, at 8 p. m., at the family home in South Salem, Alonzo, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. August Hucklestein, aged 15 years, 7 months and 6 days.

This death is an unexpected and heavy blow to the parents and family of the boy. Up to last Tuesday, he was in good health, a strong, vigorous young man. On Tuesday he had a light attack of some trouble in his stomach and digestive organs. What it was is not clear, but it made steady inroads upon his strength, in spite of all the physician could do, until the end came. Alonzo was a bright, ambitious boy, of exemplary habits. He had attended Mt. Angel college three terms, where he was an excellent student, and his prospects were bright. This bereavement is a peculiarly sad one, as, only last year Mr. and Mrs. Hucklestein lost an unusually bright and lovable little girl, after an extremely short illness. They have the deep sympathy of the entire community.

An autopsy was held Sunday by Drs. Byrd and Smith, which revealed conditions proving that death was caused by appendicitis of long standing, and

Rev. Daly spoke impressively. Sunday the altar was dressed in flowers and gay with white-robed children. Today it was decked in mourning, and sorrow was an every countenance. He paid a tribute to the noble character of the dead young man. He recommended his example to all the young men of the community. He had lived a life of piety and innocence. He expressed a life of joyousness and hope to all others. He asked that all unite in prayers of justice, hope and confidence for the repose of his soul in the boundless love of God.
