FROM MARION. Death of a Marion County Pioneer at a Good Old Age. OSTERHOUDT.—At his home, near Marion, Oregon, June 8, 1900, H. D. Osterhoudt, aged 70 years, 6 months and 15 days.

Hiram D. Osterhoudt was born in Middletown, Delaware county, New York, November 23, 1823. Emigrated to Illinois with his father's family in 1841. In 1846 he was married to Miss Eugenia Reed, who died two years after the marriage, leaving one daughter, Mary A. Osterhoudt.

On April 24, 1851, he was married to Mrs. Caroline M. Moats, with whom he removed to Oregon in 1850, locating in Marion county, where he has since continuously resided, leading a quiet, peaceful life, loved and respected by all who knew him; none being more upright and honorable in their dealings with their fellow men than he.

Mr. Osterhoudt was taken very suddenly and alarmingly ill on April 24 with neuralgia of the heart. Dr. Ransom, of Turner, was called and gave him temporary relief, and he rallied sufficiently to be up part of the time, but at times he suffered from extreme pain, until June 8th, when he passed away while sitting in his chair without any premonition whatever.

On June 10th he was laid to rest in Pleasant Grove cemetery, where a large number of friends and neighbors gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to the deceased and extend their heartfelt sympathies to the bereaved. Many beautiful flowers were laid on the grave by kind hands.

The services were conducted by Rev. Hushaw, of Marion. His words were appropriate and full of christian hope and consolation. The Marion and Pleasant Grove church choirs sang some very sweet songs.

Prof. Geo. W. Jones, superintendent of schools for Marion county, has issued a notice to the teachers of Marion county, calling an institute for June 27th, 28th and 29th. The notice reads as follows:

"The regular Marion County Institute will be held in the East School, Salem, Oregon, beginning Wednesday, June 27th and continuing for three days. The morning sessions will be devoted to discussions of methods of conducting class-work in the school room and the afternoon will be given to lectures on topics of general interest to teachers. Excellent corps of instructors and lecturers have been secured and it is hoped that a large number of our teachers will be present to assist in making the institute a success."

The lecturers for the institute will be State Supt. J. H. Ackerman, President W. C. Hawley, of Willamette University, and President P. L. Campbell, of the Monmouth State Normal school. The instructors selected are:

Prof. W. C. Hawley, History and Civics; Prof. D. A. Grout, Reading and Grammar; Prof. W. D. Yoder, Arithmetic; Miss S. J. Evans, Geography.
