Old Scots' Church Site a Memorial.
WICKATUNK, N. J., June 14.—Presbyterians from all parts of the United States are here attending the ceremonies connected with the unveiling of the monument erected to mark the site of the first Presbyterian church in America at the Old Scots' burying grounds near this city. The church was known as the Old Scots' meeting house. At Old Scots' church met the first Presbytery of which any minutes exist. The first ordination of a Presbyterian minister took place there. The revival in the church under John Tennent began there. The monument is constructed of granite from Ireland, Scotland and New England in honor of the men who composed the first Presbytery. On the gables are four bronze historic seals, the seal of the Presbyterian church of Monmouth county, the seal of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America, the seal of the Presbyterian church of Scotland, the seal of the Scotch-Irish Society. There is also on one side a bronze tablet with the Latin inscription which is on the tombstone of John Boyd, who died in 1708.

Chicago Poor Children's Day.
CHICAGO, Ill., June 14.—The annual free picnic for newsboys, bootblacks and poor children is being held at Washington Park today. Seven trains have been provided to carry the children there and back, and there is a larger attendance than ever before. The Salvation Army and other charitable associations have interested themselves in gathering the children for the picnic, the bright spot in the year for many poor waifs. Mayor Harrison has issued a proclamation setting aside today as "poor children's day" and calling upon the citizens "to warmly support the project of giving the poor and unfortunate children of Chicago a happy day's outing among the trees and flowers of one of the city parks, thus bringing into many clouded lives some of the sunshine and gladness so freely enjoyed by children in happier circumstances."

Birthplace of Our Flag.
PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 14. This Flag Day is being observed here today. In many states this day is celebrated as a holiday, and appropriate exercises are carried on in the public schools. Patriotic societies throughout the country always celebrate this day with appropriate ceremonies. June 14, has been set as Flag Day because it is the anniversary of the adoption of the Stars and stripes by the Continental Congress in 1777. Every year, on this date, crowds visit the Betsy Ross Mansion in this city, where the first American flag was designed and made by Mrs. Elizabeth Ross. The building is preserved as a national relic by an association formed from that purpose.

New Tariff for Hawaii.
SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., June 14.—Local warehouses for some time past have been crowded with freight for Honolulu, awaiting the new tariff which becomes effective today in Hawaii. From now on the goods will be shipped to the islands as rapidly as possible. The Honolulu Automobile company has \$60,000 worth of hacks and carriages stored at Port Costa, on which the old duty would have been \$12,000.

SOME NEW BERRIES.
MRS. FRANK KAISER ORIGINATES A SEEDLING FROM CLARK'S.
Salem Can Grow the Best Strawberries in America—The Ideal and the Ruby.

THE JOURNAL has contended for several years that this part of Oregon could grow the finest strawberries in the world for shipping fresh and for commercial canning. Several years' crops confirm this claim fully.

The Clark's seedling of Hood River grown here, and the Saunders imported from Canada, have displaced the old Wilson's prolific as canning berries in the choice of local epicures.

Mrs. Frank Kaiser has this year produced the first crop of a new seedling from the Clark's berry that is a beauty.

Three years ago she sowed seed of the Clark in the hot-house and now has a berry that in some respects is superior to Clark's. It is a dark, blood-red berry, round as a bullet, tart and yet having a high flavor. The seeds shine like grains of gold on the polished glossy surface. The Kaiser is the solidest berry we have yet seen. It will bear shipment to Chicago if any berry will, as it has an unusually firm flesh, a heavy skin and a perfect shape for a shipping berry. Instead of softening after a few days it seems to shrink a little and grow firmer. It is a fine table berry and a perfect canning variety. Mrs. Kaiser can feel proud of this berry, and the Kaiser has a great future if it proves well adapted for field culture and is a heavy bearer.

E. Hofer has produced perfect crops of the Ideal and the Ruby, two new additions to the canning list in Oregon.

The Ideal is shaped like the Wilson, but is darker red, solid, better in size, and does not run out to small berries. The Ruby is a larger solid, bright red, wedge-shaped berry of high flavor and color. If the Ideal holds their color and flavor in canning, and Mr. Allen thinks they will, they are a great acquisition to Oregon.

Mr. Hofer has also grown the McKinley, a large showy berry, but not the best quality. Still it may improve in hill culture. It is a big bearer and a great improvement in color and shape over the Sharpless, Mammoth and other large berries. The Governor Hoar, a Wisconsin berry, is a brilliant red berry, almost a scarlet or salmon red, a perfect shape, hulling as it is picked—a splendid flavor and smooth flesh for shortcakes. Does not take much sugar. Like the McKinley, it has a luxuriant foliage that makes it frost proof, and it is a great bearer. In hill culture, the McKinley and Governor Hoar will produce high-colored, fine shaped, large solid fruit in large quantities for the home market, and like the Tennessee are ideal table fruit, and for the home market.

Another strawberry that all go into raptures over is the Cervara, a Spanish importation. It is a very large berry, dark blood-red all through, sweet and with a rich bouquet, a peculiar fruit flavor. When dead-ripe it is almost black. It is a very large bearer and when sliced with sugar and cream is a dish fit to tempt an angel. We are growing alongside of it a row of the wild Oregon strawberry and will seek to procure by cross-fertilization a scion of the decadent monarchy crossed with our native son. If the qualities of the two could be united there would be found the world-beater in the line of the best fruit that ever grew.
