Japanese Immigrants.
PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., June 14.—According to the reports of the immigration officers, 2441 immigrants have arrived in this district during the month of May, and all of them except two were Japanese; 569 were skilled laborers, the balance being common and farm laborers; 1509 of the entire number remained in this state, while 508 went to California, 208 to Oregon, and the balance were destined to various states of the Union. These immigrants brought with them \$78,500.

Collector Henstis today appointed Douglas Almond a deputy collector of customs at Anacortes.

Steamship Rates Raised.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 15.—The Trans-Pacific lines today advanced their rates from all Oriental ports. From Hong Kong and Shanghai to San Francisco and Pacific coast ports the rate is raised from \$185 to \$225. From Yokohama to San Francisco the rate is raised to \$200; from Kobe to \$207.50, and from Nagasaki to \$218.

From Hong Kong to London by way of the Suez Canal the steamship rate is advanced from \$57 to \$62 in accordance with an arrangement with the representatives of the Suez Line.

The rate from San Francisco to Hong Kong has been \$225 for some time, because of a lack of competition. With the present heavy travel to Asiatic ports, this advance will mean a large increase in passenger earnings of the Pacific Mail and Occidental and Oriental Lines.

A Dramatic Event.
Next Monday evening the College of Oratory will give the first dramatic recital ever given by the student body. It will be under the able management of Prof. Mabel Lankton Carter. Tickets will be a small admission fee of 10c each, charged, which will go toward carrying the stage of the college chapel.

Without Fish Ladder.

There are many who believe the Williams and its branches would be full of salmon if the fish ladder were put in at the Falls of the Willamette at Oregon City.

MAY BECOME A PEST.

A California Opinion About Those Liberated Belgian Hares.

Notwithstanding that some misguided individuals, either through ignorance, or a desire to equivocate, rush in to print to contradict statements made by reliable and trustworthy citizens of Florida, in this district the fact remains that Belgian hares running loose in this district have turned loose and have taken up their abode miles away from the town.

George Cooper, who lives two miles northeast of Florida, stated to your correspondent that about the first part of last March a young man named Schumacher, of Highland Park, was out hunting near his (Cooper's) place, and shot a Belgian hare. The hare was with young eight in number.

Mr. Cooper says that young Schumacher is prepared to verify the statement. He (Cooper) thinks that this was one of the lot turned loose by Smith, of Florida.

It is evident that the statement made in The Bee, some time ago by your correspondent of Florida, that "a rabbit drive will be an event of the near future," is not so fairy or hare as it might appear to the uninformed.

Furthermore, it is not necessary to "read up" in zoology in order to explain the condition of the above-mentioned Belgian hare.

It goes without saying that somewhere in the Tokay vineyards on and adjacent to Mr. Cooper's place, other Belgian hares are at large, and that the rabbit drive picture is not overdrawn.

In connection with this Belgian hare question, and the outcome, a gentleman lately arrived from Santa Barbara County, stated to your correspondent today that in Ventura County and the southern part of Santa Barbara County, Belgian hares were run wild.

Newburg Sugarbeet Factory.
The citizens of Newburg, Yamhill county, have formed an organization under the name of the Newburg Development company for the purpose of starting a sugar beet factory. The company has been incorporated under the laws of the State of Oregon, and have issued stock for securing the industry. The stock has been purchased, by the citizens of Newburg, and surrounding country. The company are using every possible effort to obtain all the information they can about the beet sugar industry. They have sent a representative to La Grande to gather information and in a letter from there written by Mr. J. L. Caviness, he gives his experience in raising sugar beet as follows: Last year I planted and cultivated 125 acres of sugar beets. It cost me about \$28 per acre to produce the beet and deliver them to the factory. Labor cost me from 75c to \$1 per day and board. My beets brought me \$1.47 per ton, making me a profit of \$33 per acre after deducting all expenses, including interest.

The company claim that only about 10 per cent of the sugar consumed in the United States is produced in this country and the producer should not fear over production. The company are making an effort to contract with the farmers to raise sugar beets and are meeting with success. There is no reason why the Willamette Valley should not produce an excellent quality of sugar beets. The industry at La Grande is a paying investment and the Willamette Valley should have several of these factories.

The secretary of the company is F. A. Morris and the directors are Jesse Edwards, George C. Sears, Charles K. Spaulding, F. H. Storey, W. C. Kruger, Clarence Butt, B. C. Miles and M. Votaw.

Soft for Jobay Ball.

If Mahan had denounced the British and exhorting the Boers, it is safe to say that his official tongue would have been silenced instantly.—Sacramento Bee.

BUNCOED WITH A GOLD BRICK

HASTINGS, Feb., June 15.—William Kerr, president of the Adams County Bank, has received word from the Denver Mint that a "gold" brick he purchased from a stranger at Leavenworth, Kan., a few days ago for \$13,000 is made of copper.

The brick was transferred to Mr. Kerr by a man who represented himself to be an old mining partner in California of Albert Kerr, a cousin of the bank president. Mr. Kerr, June 3, accompanied the stranger to Leavenworth, where the brick, held by a companion of the "miner" was drilled.

The sample which Kerr had assayed in Kansas City was found to run \$20 to the ounce. Mr. Kerr returned to Leavenworth, drew on his bank for \$13,000, and became possessed of the brick, which he sent to the First National bank at Denver.

New Cuban Tariff.

HAVANA, June 15.—For some time past the revenues of Cuba have been steadily decreasing. This has been due to the prospective tariff changes, which have caused immense quantities of goods to be imported in bond, the merchants believing that on certain lines of goods the duties of the new tariff, which becomes effective today, would be lower than under the old schedule. The merchandise in bond here, now ready to be taken out, is valued at more than \$400,000. From now on there is expected to be an increase in the revenues.
