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KINCAID ELECTED.
Returns Held Back But the Counting Board
Weakens and Gives Him the Office.
The friends of Hon. H. R. Kincaid
in this city will be glad to know that
the venerable ex-secretary of state has
been declared the next County Judge
of Lane county by a Republican canvass-
ing board after ten days delay and ap-
parently some juggling with the returns.
The official count was made by a Re-
publican county clerk and two Re-
publican justices of the peace. This board
started to make the count soon after
the election but after proceeding for a
time found that the returns and tally
sheets from some precincts were mis-
sing. Kincaid's friends thought that
this delay would result in his defeat and
threatened to take the matter into the
courts, but the canvassing board
finally found the missing tally sheets
and gave Kincaid a fair count and de-
clared him elected.

That veteran fighting journalist and
pioneer Republican of Lane county (not
modernized Mark Hannan Republican-
ism) is elected county judge.

Special from Eugene says: "Hon. H.
R. Kincaid, ex-secretary of state, was
today declared elected county judge of
Lane county by the official canvassing
board. He has one more vote than his
opponent. The contest was very close,
Knox, the Republican candidate, having
apparently a majority of a few votes on
the face of the unofficial returns. As
the official count progressed, however,
several mistakes were found in the
counting as unofficially reported, all
favoring Mr. Kincaid. When Glentena
precinct was reached the tally sheets
were missing and an officer had to be
sent there to bring them and this de-
layed the count. The board is Republi-
can in politics and its official amend-
ment will probably not be contested by
the defeated candidate, Knox. The election
of Kincaid makes the county court
union in politics."

caid will make Lane county an economi-
cally incorruptible official. He has a
heart for the poor, a backbone for the
aggressive elements of society, and the
county government under him will not
degenerate into a mere machine to favor
the dominant powers.

THE GOVERNOR WEDS.
A GREAT SOCIAL EVENT IN
THE CITY BY THE JETTIES
What the Bride Wore—Gifts Representing
a Wealth of Money and Display of
Art—Verses.

Astoria, Or., June 15.—Theodore
Thurston Geer, Governor of the state of
Oregon, and Isabelle Trullinger, of this
city, were married at the First Presby-
terian church, at 4 o'clock Thursday
afternoon, by Rev. Henry Marcotte.
About 200 guests, representing imme-
diate relatives and friends, were present,
including several state officers of Oregon
and Washington, and the governor's
staff. Mrs. Theodosia Geer Downing, of
Salem, attended the bride, while Grant
Trullinger, of this city, brother of the
bride, acted as best man. The church
had been beautifully decorated, but the
ceremony was a simple one.

A reception at the Trullinger resi-
dence followed the ceremony. The gov-
ernor and his bride left on the evening
train for Portland in a private car.
They will spend a few days at the Sound
and British Columbia points, and upon
their return will take up their residence
at Salem.

The bride is the eldest daughter of
Mr. and Mrs. Trullinger, and a highly
accomplished woman. She is especially
noted for her artistic taste, and her work
in china painting has attracted wide
attention.

ASTORIA, June 14.—A wedding of local,
state and national interest was solemn-
ized at the First Presbyterian church at
four o'clock this afternoon when Gov-
ernor T. T. Geer and Miss Isabelle Trul-
linger, of Astoria, were united in mar-
riage.

It was the desire of Governor Geer
and Miss Trullinger as well as their fam-
ilies that the ceremony and the inci-
dents surrounding it should be as quiet
and unassuming as possible but the
prominence of the governor and the so-
cial position of the bride hardly ren-
dered such arrangements possible. The
wealth of flowers that are now bloom-
ing in such profusion in Astoria were
assured by the friends of the bride and
the church was actually a complete
bower of white roses arranged by the
hands of the artist friends of the bride,
as she is an artist herself.

The ceremony itself was a simple one
and was performed by Rev. Henry Mar-
cotte and only in the benediction could
be noticed any deviation from that of a
less important marriage. One feature
of the ceremony was novel to Astoria
but now generally observed at weddings
in the east and is the rejuvenation of
an ancient custom. The strains of a wed-
ding march were not heard. As the
bride entered the church on the arm of
her father Mrs. J. T. Ross sang with ex-
quisite sweetness the first verse of
Bohm's "Still as the Night." During
the ceremony Mrs. H. C. Thompson
played "O Promise Me" on the organ
in muffled tones. As the Governor and
Mrs. Geer left the church Mrs. J. T.
Ross sang the second verse of "Still as
the Night."
