THE DIVINE RIGHT OF BOSSISM.

Oliver Cromwell and George Washington struck death blows to the divine right of kings, and the sacredness of the institution known as aristocracy. It remains for latter-day partyism, as enunciated by political bosses, to again set up the cult of a superior class, and seek to establish a political aristocracy.

All the poor devils who are not in the sacred circle of modern Republicanism might as well understand that they are off caste socially and politically. The man who doubts the wisdom of the gold standard, who has qualms about a high protective tariff, whose conscience ever has a spasm at swallowing expansion or all that Mark Hanna says and does is an outcast and can never enter the heaven of prosperity and dwell within the golden gates of modern high-class politics. You Democrats and Populists and Socialists and Prohibitionists come back into the fold or you and your children will be damned forever. You and your families have only one way to be restored to full-fledged respectability and that is by becoming Republicans. "The king can do no wrong" is revived in "the party is always right." Taxes that are higher than the net income of property, millions of acres of the best timber lands stolen by corporations, increasing the power of financial syndicates, multiplying trusts, and legalizing fraud and wrong on all sides, so long as it is done in the name of party is beneficent intelligence and supreme morality. Those who gag, or spew out a single one of these propositions are cast out into the outer limbo of darkness where dwell popocrats, greenbackers, flatulists, Bryanites, Zulus, mongrels, spotted-tails and Hottentots.

STOLEN REFORM IDEAS.
Public office is a public trust, and every private snarl in Marion county's affairs must be jarred loose by the new administration.

In the jarring loose of some of the grafts on Marion county there is going to be a lot of reaping. But they must all go—and not little by little, but all at once and completely. The plagues are out, and they must not be violated. When a dog's tail has got to be shaved, it is no mercy to the dog to cut it off a little at a time.

The above paragraphs appear Sunday in the Salem organ of the spoils faction of the Republican party. The confession that "some of the grafts in Marion county" are to be in fact must be, will be "jarred loose," will be refreshing news to the tax-payer. On the campaign his vote was secured on the theory that Marion county now has a reform administration.

The votes of the Republicans were held by parading an alleged reduction of \$48,000 in county expenses in two years, while the men who brought about reductions were kicked out of the convention. The county clerk who had trimmed off such robberies as primary election tickets at \$600 to \$1000 and had them done at \$75, was fought by the spoils faction, and has been called a Populist ever since.

Now the same spoils gang cry "cut off some of the graft." Had it been admitted before election that there were any grafts, the result might have been different. It is an interesting admission now that there are grafts in existence. Confession is good for the soul and such confessions come better late than never. It will be a shock to Republicans, however, who believed that what was told them during the campaign about the absence of all but reform administration for the past two years. We are now to have reform. The county is to be run on \$40,000 a year. "Low taxes and good roads" is to be the slogan in Marion county for four years. It may be unkind but not impertinent to remind those reformers that they are still running a political pawnshop and dealing in stolen property. In 1908 they stole the Union platform to reduce salaries \$9,000 a year. This year they again steal the Democratic Club platform and sell into power on borrowed capital. Stolen reform ideas come cheap. It takes only gall and cheek to appropriate the ideas of others. If they are carried into effect the taxpayer will get some benefit. But political pawn brokers dealing in stolen property are not an enduring basis of self-government by the people.

The Hon. Wm. Egan will read the Declaration of Independence in a scholarly and eloquent manner, but a great many prefer the natural-born oratory that plain Mike Egan puts into that immortal document.

After fattening at the public crib for 25 years, an Oregon office holder is going to sell all he has and leave the state. Oregon is full of political non-residents who emigrate the minute their graft is cut off.

Liberty and State streets should be made model driveways, freed from loo e rock, thistles and grass and sprinkled so as to be free from dust. Have the intelligence and enterprise to co-operate to secure this result?

A man who will work a team all the week until they are baked over with a crust of dust and sweat, and then turn them out hobbled Sunday without being cleaned while he goes to church, will never prosper in this world or the next.
