DRAMATIC RECITAL.

Pupils of the College of Oratory Entertain a Packed Audience.

The dramatic recital of the College of Oratory, Prof. Mabel Lankton Carter, instructor, assisted by Miss Florence Tillson and pupils of the college of Music, was, without qualification a brilliant success.

The only drawback was the lack of room, the University chapel being entirely too small to hold the crowd which applied for admission. Every seat was taken before 8 o'clock, and for half an hour afterward people were coming. Some crowded in to stand up, and scores went away, unable to get in.

The first number, a piano solo, Impromptu in A Flat, Chopin, by Miss Florence Tillson, was an appreciated opening for a program, which hadn't a poor or dull number in it.

A monologue, "Behind the Curtain," by Mrs. Burton Harrison, was extremely well rendered, by Miss Laura Thomas, who portrayed the flighty emotions of the young widow, in a way that aroused unstinted laughter.

A soprano solo, "Parla! Ardit," was executed by Miss Ethel Raymond in her usual excellent style.

The dramatic ability shown in the handling of portions of the "Merchant of Venice" was surprisingly good, the work of Misses Lucy Edwards and Edna Hubbard being especially worthy of notice, and the other young ladies acquitting themselves very creditably indeed. Miss Laura Thomas delivered Shylock's speech in Scene I of Act III with excellent dramatic understanding.

The vocal duet, "Come With Me," Compagn, was sung very sweetly by Miss Estelle Hurst and Miss Agnes Gilbert.

J. W. Bickford's baritone solo, "My Dreams," was sung in fine voice.

The comedy of "Six cups of Chocolate," which ended the program, was highly amusing and was handled by Misses Lucy Edwards, Edna Taylor, Edna Hubbard, Sophia Shives, Henrietta Savage, Laura Thomas and Elizabeth Barton.

Miss Lucy Edwards, in the leading part of Adeline Von Lindau, showed talent which it is not flattery to pronounce unusual, without prejudice to the other girls, who all carried their parts well.

In fact the whole recital was of a high order of merit and reflects great credit on the instructor Miss Mabel Lankton Carter, as well as on the ability of the participants.

There was not a dull moment during the evening, and in spite of the discomforts the audience was held until the last and people were standing in all the available room and half way down the aisle at the close.
