PROSPERITY STATISTICS

The Journal is in receipt of a little pamphlet all the way from Washington, D. C. It is "Dinner Pal Document No. 5," entitled, "Facts vs. Theories. Why oil, cotton, wool, iron, paper and wages have advanced in prices," and it is a Republican campaign document. It professes to enlighten the voter on the subjects mentioned, by presenting the "facts," so that he will not be misled by false theories. The argument made is that neither trusts nor the tariff are responsible for the rise in prices of the articles mentioned, and it is not intended for circulation in Eastern Oregon. The Standard Oil Company is not responsible for the rise in the price of refined coal oil, because the rise in the price of crude oil, barrels, chemicals and labor has been practically the same as the increase in the price of the refined oil. Marion county consumers will now cheerfully contribute the extra cost for increased cost of barrels, while they read this by the light of oil that never saw a barrel since it came out of the ground. The 50 per cent dividend recently declared by the oil trust is not a robbery of the people; it is simply the exceptional profit of an exceptional concern. It is this way: There are some small refineries which can barely make a reasonable profit at prevailing prices. If the Standard Oil Company should lower its price below the 50 per cent dividend mark, it would ruin all these small refineries. It is the latter who really fix the market, not the Standard Oil Company. Of course Mr. Rockefeller's religious convictions would not allow him to contemplate except with horror the idea of running all those small refineries by putting down the price of oil. It is the same way with the cotton and iron trades. "The Southern people are getting the price that the New England people are forced to have, just the same as the Standard Oil Co. is getting the price that the small refineries are forced to have, and Carnegie is getting the same as small mines and mills are forced to have." The above "facts" are actually presented at considerable length and with the greatest solemnity by this enlightener of the faithful. It is very simple, you see? It isn't the trusts; it is the small fry who are putting up the price; and the poor trusts are forced to accept enormous profits to avoid running out the small fry.
