COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

AN EXCELLENT PROGRAM AT THE FIRST M. E. CHURCH.

Diplomas Awarded in Classical, Latin, Scientific and Law Courses. Also the Walter Prize.

The First M. E. church was again filled to overflowing Thursday evening on the occasion of the commencement exercises of the university. The church was tastefully decorated with ferns, arrowwood and ivy, a long festoon of the latter interlarded with the college colors running to the top of the organ and framing the choir loft.

There is some advantage in the fact that the attendance at these exercises overtaxes the capacity of the auditorium; for the people come early to secure a seat and the exercises commence more nearly on time than is usual in this city.

One noticeable feature of these graduation exercises of the university is that none of the graduates take part in the program. All they have to do is sit up straight and look pretty or wise, according to sex. This is considerably easier on the graduates, and perhaps on the audience, but it gives a poor chance to size up the output of the institution. While it may be true that there is always more or less of a summer breeze blowing over the graduates, and perhaps over the graduates, and the forenoon exhibition of the young people who are just starting out to set the world on fire, yet the people rather like to see their progeny and prodigies perform.

A baritone solo, "Queen of the Earth," by Mr. J. W. Bickford, with accompaniment on the piano by Prof. Francesco Seley, was one of the treats of the evening.

The orator of the evening, Rev. Dr. Van Dusen, was then introduced, and spoke very interestingly for 35 minutes. The speaker undertook to answer the question: "What Does the Beginning of the New Century Demand of the Young Men and Young Women?" He thought that one of the essentials for the solution of these problems was good leaders. The people could be depended on, but leaders were needed. These must come largely from the educational institutions, and he thought education in morals requisite as well as education of the intellect. Miss Emma Clark was then called to the platform and presented with the Alvin Walker prize of \$20, offered by President T. M. Gatch, of O. A. G. for the student passing the best examination in constitutional law or Latin grammar. Miss Clark earned the prize by a record of 98 per cent on 32 questions of constitutional law. That the bright little lady is a general favorite was proved by the applause she received on coming to the platform.

The exercises of the evening closed with the singing of "The Christian's Creed" by the quartet, named above, with soprano obligato by Miss Ethel Raymond, which was something fine, Miss Raymond's voice coming out with telling effect.

LINCOLN SCHOOL LIBRARY.

Prof. W. J. Crawford, principal of the Lincoln school expresses himself as follows:

It is a pleasure to state that the library of the school has been in almost constant use for the two years during which I have had charge of it. We have collected in cash \$10.10, paid for printing \$1.75, expended \$7.30, for books, leaving a balance of \$1.05 in the treasury.

There have been added to the library in this time 79 volumes. Most of these have been selected by the teachers of Lincoln school out of the many good books published on natural history and historical subjects. During the present year 470 books have been taken from the library. The previous year about the same number. Some of the books are much worn and need replacing by new ones. Allow me to express the belief that a school library is a very desirable auxiliary to a public school.
