ROOSEVELT THE PICTUREQUE.

Now look out for a picturesque campaign. The nomination of Roosevelt for second place on the Republican ticket is a grand step in the development of the unfolding drama of "destiny." The drama may shape up the ideal of a peaceful republic, a government of, by and for the people, and we may see instead the greatest imperial expansion aggregation ever put on wheels. Roosevelt ought to be at the head of the ticket where he could wave the flag, wear his hat, and occasionally take a drink from a canteen, or mount a wild unbroken bronco. In the mean time the band could play. "There'll be a hot time in the Old Town Tonight," for the effluence of the rising generation. It is not in accordance with the fitness of things that supreme command should be given to a man whose instincts and methods are those of the smooth and oleaginous church deacon.

If we are to sail the ship of state out upon the waters as world-conquering subjugators, to give and receive hard knocks, to take and hold by the strong hand what we may, the man of all others whose place is on the quarter-deck, with his breast bare and a red bandana around his brow, should be Roosevelt. He should not be relegated to a position between decks where his sole power and duty will be to preside in the evening over a highly respectable club of millionaires or their agents, called the United States Senate.

Roosevelt is the Prince of sensation. College dude, cowboy, commander, governor,—he is a picturesque figure, and this quality will be utilized to the utmost during the coming campaign. He will sing the battle song of the "strenuous life," of the glory of war and the beauty of bloodshed. The qualities of the subjugator, courage, skill and endurance, are already being held up to our graduating school children as the supreme attributes of a perfect manhood.

A great nation of peace, with a small army and navy, upholding the Democratic ideals of justice, humanity, freedom, as we have understood them in the past, are already regarded as trumpery for the attic. The only freedom worth striving for is the freedom of the strong to rule over and govern the weak. The cloud Seneca was two thousand years behind the times; let him be

pulled from his pedestal and give way to the Rough Rider. The god of war, the Napoleon lost for empire, is to be re-defined; the brazen effrontery of conquest, is to be cultivated; the statue of Mars shall stand in our public squares forever, the temple of Janus shall be kept open night and day.

This is the greatest nation on earth. It has been following old ideas, now called outworn and false gods, for a hundred and twenty-five years.

We are entering upon a newer and more strenuous age. All is to be changed. We are, as we have in fact been doing for fifty years, just taking our place among the great powers. We are "expanding." Our drumbeat will soon be heard around the world. Soon we may be wiping out Republics. It is not to be supposed that a nation of our strength will stop with a slice of China. We must have a foot hold in Africa. Let the inferior races stand from under.

So look out for pyrotechnics; prepare to be dazzled. If you know anything about music, join a brass band; for this will be a brass band campaign, and there will be no lack of funds with which to pay the performers. Turn the other side of Washington and see those pictures of duffers to the wall or some one may think you are a Populist.

The old doctrine of fundamental Americanism, mind your own business, has been changed to mind everybody else's affairs.

It is not meet that the greatest nation on earth should continue to attend to its own business. There is no god but Strenuousness, and Roosevelt is his prophet. This will be the keynote of the campaign.

SOME OF THE COMPENSATIONS

There are some delicious compensations for the unpleasant task of publishing an independent political newspaper and taking up the battle of the minority in a strong Republican community. The editor of this paper was yesterday waited on and invited by a committee of the goodly citizens of Sublimity to be the orator on the occasion of the great farmer's picnic to be held there on the glorious Fourth of July. He was told it was by order of Rev. Laidick and that nearly cancelled two former engagements, because if there is one foreign potentate The One Cent Daily would bow down to sooner than another it is this same Laidick—may his shadow never grow less! But THE JOURNAL man was already engaged on the third and the fourth at Gates and Lyons. The old soldiers will hold their reunion and eat beans and bacon and trout and roast beef and spring lamb, and swap old jokes and tell new lies. There will be the old boys in blue of Lincoln's armies, and Logan's boys and Phil Sheridan's, and Sherman's and the old Indian fighters and the men who wore the gray and a sprinkling of the heroes who wore khaki in the war with Spain and the Philippines. And all these boys and all these old boys and young ones have got to have a talk that will make them feel good and that life is worth living, and there was no getting out of it, not even for the farmers of Sublimity.

But greatest of all the compensations for the abuse one gets in this world trying to be honest enough to escape criticism, the highest and the richest chunk of reward comes from being invited from the brass band of the town of Gates, way up on the Santiam, to be the orator at the Fourth of July celebration. That is the highest up band in the state. It is farthest up the creek and nearest Heaven and plays all its notes in the purest high-C atmosphere. It is the highest honor that can come to an orator for a hand celebration, and the JOURNAL will on that day suspend publication and let the band do all the blowing. That is a celebration in that little mountain town that we shall always feel proud of and as that and Lyons were promised a month ago it is plain we could not accept Sublimity.

Up there in the mountains we shall feel at home, among the loggers and the miners, for there is where freedom dwells in generous hearts. We hereby order Edwin Stone of The Corvallis and Chittim-bark railroad to run his finest excursion train to the city of Gates. We order the mayor of Elkhorn to come down from his mountain fastness and bring Mrs. Anderson along. Judge Clark and the city marshal of Mill City will be there to keep order. The freedom of the city will be given to all the bushwhackers of Linn county. There is to be a bowery dance and lemonade stirred with a cedar shake in an empty kerosene barrel. Everything will flow free, from patriotic oratory down the line. It will always be the proudest fact of our life that in Elkhorn precinct we got 14 votes out of a total of 19 cast, Judge Clark alone getting a higher vote. The man who can beat Clark over in that precinct don't live in Oregon. There are some of the rich enjoyments of life that pay the editor for the stress and harrowing of soul he has to endure the rest of the year.

The Other Side of Prosperity.

A Redneck Democrat from Illinois asks us to print following editorial from the Warren county Democrat: What a terrible showing Dun's Review makes for the month of May, the year of Wm. McKinley, Mark Hanna, era of prosperity, 1900, to be sure. It says that the number of failures last month was 947, as compared with 581 in May last year, and that the amount of liabilities was \$23,771,151, as against \$3,820,695 last year. The Review further says that the "failures for May this year were not only the largest ever known in that month since such records were made, but of eighty months covered by these returns only six have shown as large liabilities." Another significant fact of this Dun's report is that the returns for the month of May show an unusually large number of small failures. The Democrat has all along argued that the small business concerns of the country were being rapidly driven to the wall, and Dun steps in at this juncture and verifies the statement. Not only are the smaller tradesmen closing up their affairs, but the mechanics and the laborers are also losing their all in this grand and triumphant era of prosperity under the wise and beneficent management of Messrs. Hanna, McKinley & Co. This is no campaign lie. Our readers can verify every statement made about the business condition of this country in May by referring to Dun and Bradstreet. They tell the whole story of the business failures, even if they omit telling about the lock-outs, shut-downs and strikes all over the United States. The people will not be told of these failures in the columns of the republican press, however. About the only news found in the administration organs now refers to a lack of harvest hands in Kansas and the splendid prospect for crops in the corn and wheat belt. FAVOR THE BOERS.

Result of a Plebiscite Taken by the Ministers of Our Country.

Mr. George W. Van Sicken, president of the American Road, whose office is at No. 141 Broadway, New York City, has, after much trouble and expense, just succeeded in probing into the true feelings of the great American public and securing a most reliable expression of opinion on the question whether the American voters, irrespective of party affiliations, favor the United States government to mediate in a friendly way between Great Britain and South African republics with a view to stopping the war now being waged, or whether they are in favor of Great Britain conquering her weaker opponents.

On the eve of the coming presidential campaign, the result of this investigation by Mr. Van Sicken is of great national value, and neither political party can afford to ignore its import.

The result of this vote and the reliability, honesty and impartiality of the method adopted in canvassing the country to secure the desired result, will be readily understood as told by Mr. Van Sicken in his brief and vigorous statement of the matter. Mr. Van Sicken says:

"On May 22, 1900, there was mailed to the clergymen of the United States the following letter:

New York, May 9, 1900.

Reverend and Dear Sir:—Be so kind as to obtain the expression of opinion the vote of the voters of your congregation and of your acquaintance, upon one side or the other of this important question and return both sheets to me by the 31st of May, 1900. Whether your own views be in favor of the British or of the South African Republics please obtain as full an expression as you can of the views of your people.

The answer came to me by the thousand, often by registered mail, from every part of our great country. They are still coming in, and show unmistakably that the great heart of the American people have been hurt by the wrong course pursued by the Government of Great Britain, towards the two small, independent Republics of South Africa.

Whether the sympathy and approval or the condemnation and disapproval of the American people are of any value to the Government of Great Britain, the future will determine.

I have received up to June 12th, answers from about two thousand five hundred clergymen. If the letter had been mailed earlier, there would have been many more answers.

The number of votes returned is in favor of offering mediation 106,830

In favor of Great Britain conquering 1,345

These come from every one of the 51 States and Territories except Alaska, and including the District of Columbia.

The clergymen sign themselves as Methodists, Baptists, Catholics, Congregationalists, Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Reform (Dutch), Universalists, Hebrews, United Brethren, Lutherans.
