THE COUNTY CANVASS.

A Few Echoes of the Late Marion County Political Battle.

THE JOURNAL prints two letters that are somewhat personal but have a bearing on the late Marion county battle of politics.

CAPT. DIMICK WRITES, from his farm home at Hubbard, on the Pudding River as follows, dated June 17, 1900:

"DEAR SIR AND FRIEND: Accept my most hearty congratulations for the way the friends of the editor of the One Cent Daily stood up to be counted as friends on last election day. I should like to take all who were associated with me on the late Democratic ticket by the hand, and say WELL DONE. But as you are aware I am quite busy making up for my two weeks absence from the farm home at Hubbard, on the Pudding River as follows, dated June 17, 1900:

"We have sounded forth the trumpet that shall never call retreat," and whether any of us are again on the battle line in 1902 or our banner be put in more worthy and braver hands, that banner will never be faded until wreathed with the garlands of victory. I am in receipt of many letters of congratulation from friends in different parts of the county, and from some from out the county. They all say this, we are entitled to congratulation and not condolence. Our friends did well, considering the odds against them. I shall ever feel truly thankful for such good and true friends, and can safely promise them for the whole Union that they need never regret that they failed to stand up and be counted as their friends. Yours for the war.

ANOTHER LETTER
is published below, just to complete the history of the late campaign and to correct some misrepresentations, — a remarkable campaign in some respects. The letter was written to a prominent Populist who afterwards took a place on the ticket, but it was misdirected, and returned to the writer. It was as follows, dated April 26, 1900:

"Dear Sir and Friend:—Prof. Jory was up yesterday and spent the day conferring with Democratic leaders to try to get them to accept the Populist call for a Citizens' mass convention at Salem, May 5th. He said he was willing to leave out the clause about each party running one man to register the party strength. Dr. Jory said that was all they took exception to, but said he would not go to such a convention and did not believe you would. Later he said they (the Democrats) would run their ticket just as they had made it, etc.

"We shall print Saturday a verified exposure of Marion county finances and Linn county side by side as it has never been done, and enough to convince any honest man that Marion county needs something besides party machine methods, and the people are as ready for it as ever, and will accept it as quickly as ever when stripped of party, clapnet and buncombe. Three good men, who will take hold of the thing as it stands and push the facts and push for the straight thing, can still carry a straight Citizens' ticket, Saturday, May 5th.

"I know you are disgusted and busy at work, but the situation remains the same. The people will not endorse old-fashioned partisan politics in the name of a reform movement. It is an out of date as the hand churn or the wooden trencher.

THE HOMEOPATHISTS.
The Annual Convention in Session in Washington.

The American Institute of Homeopathy is at Washington, D. C., holding its annual session. Dr. Charles E. Walton, of Cincinnati, presided. The chief feature of the annual convention will be the dedication and presentation to the government of a beautiful statue of Dr. Hahnemann, on the east side of Scott Circle, Thursday afternoon. The president will attend the dedication exercises and addresses will be delivered by Attorney-General Griggs and other well-known men. The same evening the president will give a reception to the members of the convention at the White House.

President Walton, in his annual address, earnestly advocated uniformity of medical laws in every state in the union. He said the right to practice medicine in one state should carry with it the right to practice in every state.

Dr. George B. Peck, of Providence, presented a paper on "The Condition of Homeopathy in the United States." He said there are 9,000 regular homeopathic physicians in this country, of whom 1158 were women. There are now 21 homeopathic medical colleges, with 13,120 alumni.

Florence N. Ward, of San Francisco, was among the delegates who read papers.

OUR DEPENDENCIES.
Rights of Filipinos and Cubans Discussed by the Democratic Candidate.

In a recent letter addressed to the editor of the Knoxville, Tenn., Sentinel, Mr. Bryan says about the Filipino Cuban subject:
"I believe that the rights of the Filipinos and the rights of the Cubans are identical. The recognition of the rights of the Cubans by resolution did not create these rights. They existed before. 'If the Filipinos have a right to their independence, the fact that they fought for it does not justify us in carrying on a war of conquest. It is no more humiliating for a nation to recognize the rights of an opponent than for an individual to do so.'"
"We would have had the same trouble in Cuba if we had treated the Cubans the same as we treated the Filipinos. We would have no trouble in the Philippines if we had treated the Filipinos as we treated Cubans. If we are going to give the Filipinos their independence we ought to say so at once and thus avoid further bloodshed. How can we justify the sacrifice of American soldiers and the killing of Filipinos,

merely to show that we can whip them. "The Bacon resolution received the support of nearly every Democratic Senator, and was adopted by a Democratic caucus in the House. This resolution promised independence. If it had been accepted and acted upon when it was introduced there would have been no Filipino war. If it had been adopted at the time the vote was taken, it would have stopped the war."

SPEAKER HENDERSON
The Iowa Military Head of the House Has Made Some Enemies.

At the close of his first term as speaker, General Henderson finds himself divested of a good share of the popularity which he had when he began. A number of things have contributed to this result. In the first place his efforts to defeat the \$35,000,000 appropriation for the St. Louis celebration of the Louisiana purchase centennial antagonized a large number of people who were interested in securing it.

The fact that it was finally passed in spite of him by taking it to a senate bill, does not soften the feeling against him. Others were antagonized during the Porto Rican tariff fight, when a used oppressive methods to coerce members; and at the same time Speaker Henderson aroused the indignation of the entire senate by writing a public letter calling them cowards and insinuating that they are corrupt.

Not yet satisfied with this, Henderson affronted the President and the secretary of war by telling them to their face that he was opposed to the bill for the promotion of Generals Miles and Corbin, and did not propose to allow it to become a law. This happened at a conference at the White House called by the President to request Henderson's assistance in passing the bill. In this case also the measure was put through in spite of him. These are a few of the causes which have contributed to make General Henderson less liked than he was.

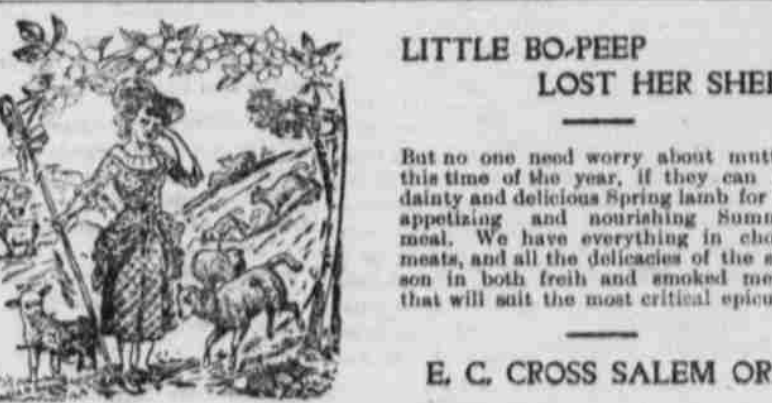
