The two new songs by Mrs. Hinges were highly appreciated, and as is usually the case a persistent encore brought the lady back with a simple little love song, in which the touching sweetness of her voice found full expression.

Mrs. Holland's voice was heard at its best in the lullaby song, which was very sweet.

The recitation by Miss Constance Holland was simply charming. Her imitation of the spinning wheel was perfect, and her gestures were most graceful and appropriate. She should be heard oftener in Salem.

Dr. Epley's songs were up to his standard, and everybody knows that is a high one.

In fact the entire program was enjoyable. It should have drawn a larger house, and doubtless would have done so if the last ten days had not been so full of entertainments.

The graduating exercises of Dr. Parvin's pupils include three public recitals besides last night's concert. One of these recitals was given Tuesday afternoon, another this afternoon and the last at Unity church this evening, to which all are cordially invited by the talented professor.
