EAST OF THE MOUNTAINS.
A Traveler in the Inland Empire Gives an Account of Observations.

Ed. JOURNAL:—I will try to give you a short account of our trip across the Cascades from Salem to Eastern Oregon by the Sanitarium route. We started from Salem a little before noon two weeks ago today and after two and a half days of mountain climbing over very good mountain roads we reached Fish Lake and stopped over one day to rest and fish. The fish did not seem very plenty. I had no success myself, but my fellow traveler Mr. C. Royer caught quite a few, and a Mr. Shaw and some others had caught a dish pan full of the beauties and seemed to take pity on us, and gave us all we wanted. So after two good square meals of fish and a night's rest among the lava beds and lofty fire and hemlocks, we started to climb Sand mountain. The road is quite sandy in places but very good and easy for a light 2 horse rig. We had filled our jug at a very fine spring at Fish Lake as we understood it was some 17 miles to the next water, but we had no use for it. After three hours driving we found a small lake on the east side of the mountain and at noon we came to a small stream running down the eastern slope. The timber changes very quick in crossing, mostly bull pine with a little fir on the side and very green, scarcely any under brush. This day's drive found us a little below the State post office in Crooks county passed a school house and a few ranches. Ryer seemed to be their principal crop of grain. It seems to me they are too high to raise wheat and oats. The soil seemed to be poor and sandy. The had a very heavy rain all over the east and as far as we have come. In fact there has been good showers nearly every day since we have been here.

From the Sisters we journeyed east crossed Crooked river and by noon struck the Deschutes river. My attention was called to the bridge being very low only a few feet above the water. On inquiry I learned that the stream only varied a few feet in a year on account of the lake that feed the river being in the lava beds this river is very rapid and clear and said to be very full of fish but we did not stop only to dinner and pushed on towards Prineville.

The timber on this day's drive was mostly juniper and as we pushed on it ran out and by stopping, time found us about 20 miles north east of Prineville at the Lone Pine ranch among the sage brush and jack rabbits. They are so plenty there that they have destroyed a part of their crops. That is the only place we have seen them very bad.

June 17, started north between the Deschutes and John Day River. Passed some very fine ranches, well fixed, and fine alfalfa meadows but the country in general very rough and broken. Lots of hay left over last year.

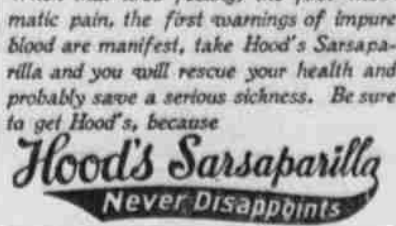
This evening landed us on Trout creek. Passed two new threshing outfits going in the Haystack country. Eighteenth, noon found us at Antelope a very nice little town, well supplied with water from springs. Struck Shaniko by the middle of the afternoon. This is the terminus of the Columbia Southern R. R. Water is scarce through here. The town is supplied with water from a gulch by pipes and steam power. We watered up and pushed on and made a dry camp. June eighteenth struck Sherman county. Land is getting better, more wheat. Passed Grass valley; some very good wheat, but quite a few fields burnt by the East winds. Barley is better than their wheat and seems to be so far as we have come. Nineteenth, passed Moro and Wasco, all wheat, wheat. Crossed the Columbia at Rufus. Had to get away from the river, as the sand was drifting, and the wind howling more than a web foot was used to. Camped a few miles up the river found Hale's early peaches ripe.

Ten miles up the river we turned north. Found the country very rolling, and the land very good, and quite a few farms in what is called the Goodno hills. There, wheat was extra fine, all headed out, and field after field as clean as a pin, nothing but wheat, that is I mean no weeds like we had seen in other parts. Also passed large fields of Bald Barley that was very fine. By noon struck Rock creek. The valley is stony and rough and seemed to be occupied by Indians.

All I could see they raise is a little hay and ponies. Next day arrived at Jim Zimwatta, an old friend of Mr. Rogers from Kansas, he lives between Arlington and Cleveland. This country is very high, you can see all of Eastern Oregon between the Columbia river and the Blue Mountains. They are better supplied with water and timber here than Eastern Oregon. Lots of springs and where they have no spring they obtain water by digging from 5 to 10 feet. Some oak on the creeks, the first we have seen on the western side. The north side of the county has a heavy belt of fine timber commencing at Bickleton and running west to the Cascades, the land through here, like a big part of Sherman county, Oregon, is what is called scrub land and the only way I know to describe it is this:

One day it was all covered with rock and when the soil was put on there was not enough to cover it all. It varies from nearly all rock on some quarter sections to nearly all soil on others. The average is supposed to be one-third rock and two-thirds soil. The soil is very easy worked. One man will farm more acres here than ten in the valley. Quite a large part of their crops is volunteer and seems to be nearly as good as when they plow and sow. Half a bushel to the acre is all they sow. Grain stools wonderfully here and too much seed is worse than not enough. Raw land is selling at \$1.50 to \$10 per acre, improved land from \$5 to \$10 per acre according to improvements and they as a rule are very poor. Two wires for a fence and buildings that men and beasts would perish in a cold climate like Kansas and Nebraska. This is an

old sheep and cattle country and of course like all of the eastern side the grass is mostly killed out, but by fencing and care the brush grass will return. Their cattle here are much larger than our cattle in the valley and fat. Sheep are all driven to the mountains in the summer. Their climate here is much dryer than the valley. The cool west winds seem to be the salvation of the country and all they seem to dread is the hot east winds. To people with limited means that want to farm and raise stock I would reverse old Horace Greeley's advice and say young men go east. I see chances here to get homes and live in ease and plenty. There is not much attention paid to fruit here. They depend on the Yakima valley for their supply and as that is our objective point, I will close for this time.

NEW SACK ELEVATOR
Labor-Saving Device Gives a Trial at Albion.
The managers of all of the grain docks in Portland assembled at the Mutual Warehouse Company's big dock in Albion Tuesday afternoon to witness the working of a sack elevator. The contrivance was invented by Eugene Brown, of Colfax, and has met with considerable favor at some of the interior warehouses. It is a portable machine, and can be moved to any part of the warehouse without any trouble, and will lift sacks so they can be piled 24 high with the same ease that they are piled but eight high. The machine handled 10 sacks per minute yesterday, and certainly saved the expenditure of a vast amount of labor in getting sacks up in the air, and accordingly saving floor space. The power was furnished yesterday by one horse-power electric motor, but for the elevators in use in the interior, where electricity is not obtainable, a gasoline engine is used. The warehousemen who witnessed the working of the machine yesterday were well satisfied with it for use in country warehouses and for handling big lots of the same kind of wheat when there was a jam on the docks, but questioned its adaptability to their requirements at tide water, where frequently half a dozen cars of different grades of wheat for different parties would need to be piled in separate places in the warehouses. Several of the machines are now in use in the Palouse country, and they are in high favor there.

BOER ENVOYS.
Have Issued Forewell Address, Thanking Americans.

The Boer envoys, who have been in the country for the past two months, issued an address to the people of the United States. After expressing regret at their inability to accept many of the invitations extended to them, they expressed their thanks to the American public for the deep sympathy they have shown for the cause of the two struggling republics.

Continuing the address says: "We now feel convinced that the boastful allegation of the Colonial Secretary and the British statesman that the people of this country sympathized with the British Empire in its attempt to crush the liberty and independence of our two small republics is absolutely devoid of truth."

The address then goes on at great length into the history of the relations between Great Britain and the Boers, which is characterized as one of "violated faith and broken pledges, cloaked under the display of magnanimous and irreproachable principles."

Coming down to the discovery of gold in Johannesburg in 1886, the address says: "All forces of land greed and gold hunger, stimulated by the desire to avenge what is known as the battle of Majuba Hill, were let loose."

Then follows a history of the political agitation, which culminated in the Jameson raid.

The broad charge is made that Mr. Chamberlain's revival of the usurpation claim in 1897, his public utterances, Sir Alfred Milner's speeches and inflammatory dispatches and the efforts of the South African League under the Presidency of Cecil Rhodes were all directed towards the ultimate destruction of the two Dutch republics.

The address then takes up the various internal questions which contributed towards the war and discusses them in great detail, making wholesale denials of the English representation. The address declared that at the Bloemfontein conference both President Steyn and President Kruger endeavored to avert the catastrophe by conceding even more than the original demands on the franchise question, but their efforts were fruitless.

It is asserted that the war was forced upon the Boers and the claim is advanced that they took up arms only in self-defense. The address contends that the policy of Great Britain was "designedly shaped so as to compel the Boers to send on the 9th of October what is commonly known as their ultimatum to Great Britain."

Taking up the campaign to date, the address says: "The Boers may be in the end defeated by overwhelming numbers, and may ultimately be forced to surrender, owing to difficulty of securing ammunition and provisions, but the conduct of the present war, as well as the history of the past 100 years, justifies us in saying that they will never be conquered."

The address concluded by saying that the envoys do not ask the direct or favorable intervention of the United States, but a continuance of public sentiment and support. The address is signed by Abraham Fischer, C. H. West and M. D. Wolmarans.
