EVANGELIST UDKIKE.

SNAPSHOT INTERVIEW WITH THE GREAT TURNER CAMPMEETING EXHIBITOR.

He Declares the Secret of Success is to Advertise, Advertise, Advertise, in All the Papers.

Evangelist Udkike, the man who is considered the greatest Evangelist of the Christian church, and one among the best in the world, as he sat pleasantly conversing at the camp-fire of an old friend, told of himself and we give it to you almost as the brief story fell from his lips. He said:

"I was born in Selma, Mercer county, Ohio, Jan. 23, 1850, and I was raised a fatherless boy. I owe a great deal to my mother, and the lovely Christian teaching of my grandmother. I was converted in 1867, and commenced preaching the same year. Was for many years called the 'Boy Evangelist.' I have a dear wife, four children and six grandchildren. My oldest son is a preacher, as is also my son-in-law. I have been pastor of a number of churches, among them Fort Wayne and Valparaiso, Indiana, the latter having the largest membership of any of our churches. I am not content as a pastor. I am an evangelist. I can be a pastor of a church just so long as they keep in a revival and when they get out of that I must go on. If I was not in a continuous revival meeting, I would backslide. I am a Dutchman by birth. My mother was Marie Lincoln. My grandfather Lincoln was a brother to Abraham Lincoln.

I have been five times on this coast. I think it a wonderful and a beautiful country. I wish I could take it home with me. I have been in every state in the Union. I have had many requests to go outside the United States to preach but our country needs the work.

I have had 30,000 added to the church during my ministry. I have some years 2000. In fifty-nine meetings I held, I had over 14,000 additions. I believe a preacher must make people glad. A man that laughs may be trusted sooner than he who does not. I got my gift of 'gah' from my mother. My father was a 'Yankee.'

This is in part the story of the birth and parentage and ancestry of this man who can command the love, respect, and attention of the scores of preachers and teachers wherever he goes. Tuesday afternoon he conducted 'A School of Methods' for preachers, on 'Evangelism.'

"One thing," he says, "is a necessary requisite to a successful meeting: 'Advertise, Advertise, Advertise,' in ALL your city papers. You can't advertise too much. If a church will follow the printed directions I send out, in advance of my coming, there is no doubt but a great meeting will be the result."

Large crowds will no doubt attend the meetings on Saturday and Sunday, and with the unexcelled singing of Mr. Webb and wife, there is no doubt a great work will be done yet, before the meeting closes.
