STORY OF TSI AN.

THE REPUTED TERRIBLE WOMAN WHO RULES THE CHINESE EMPIRE

Rises From the Position of Concubine to a Dictatorship in the Oriental History.

The Dowager Empress of China, Tsi An who is charged with bringing on the crisis now impending in her empire, is the daughter of a Manchu noble, who, becoming bankrupt when she was a child, sold her to a wealthy merchant of Canton. When in 1848 Emperor Hien Fung issued the usual proclamation requiring eligible Manchu maidens to present themselves for examination as candidates for imperial concubines, Tsi An went to Pekin with others, and was among the first ten chosen. That she had brains as well as beauty is proven by her success in soon securing the especial attention and favor of first the emperor, and then the empress.

Being of the Manchus, the empress is hated by the majority of the Chinese. She has directly murdered many, and it is supposed that she helped to foment the Boxers uprising, not only to rid the country of the hated foreigners, but to create an opportunity to kill off a large number of her enemies. Tsi An is not an altogether lovable old woman, but her history makes an interesting study.

A Terrible Woman.

Tsi-An who at present defies the world, bids fair to become one of the notable figures in history. She is already remarkable, having ascended from the position of a concubine to that of ruler of four hundred millions of people. She promises to be still more remarkable from her present attitude, which bids fair to not only wreck her own empire, but possibly set Europe and Asia ablaze with the torch of war. This woman, headstrong, self-willed and lacking the womanly graces, seems destined to play a more important role, weighed by the calamitous results than any woman in history, and compared with which Cleopatra's rule and the ruin that followed were a bagatelle. The whims of this vindictive woman at the present time are the subject of most profound concern in the cabinets of Europe, and in Japan and the United States, and the result is hard to foretell.

Her Enemies All Die.

The private life of this woman has been as atrocious as her public acts. Every person who opposed her or stood in the way of her schemes has died suddenly, with the well founded suspicion that she was the instrument of their taking off. Her husband, Hien-fung, died suddenly in the prime of life, as did the succeeding emperor, Tung-she, and his widow, Ah-lu, who would have borne an heir to the throne. The associate regent, Tsi-Tai; Prince Chung, father of the present emperor, Kwang Hui, and his colleague, Marquis Tung, all were victims of her ambition, which may more than make up for her in her way. It is generally believed that the life of the present emperor, who is a mere figure head under the rule of Tsi-An, is threatened.

This is the vindictive, ambitious and narrow-minded woman whose career has been one of intrigue, one of violence, and bloodshed, not for the benefit of her people, but to gain her own selfish ends, who threatens to destroy the Chinese empire and perhaps plunge Europe in war.

Some of Her Traits.

The traits of Tsi-An may be gathered from her acts and edicts, even without personal knowledge of her. She has risen to her present position by successive steps of violence or intrigue from her former humble place as head of the harem of Hien-fung, overriding every obstacle and making successive emperors and their ablest advisers the creatures of her will or favor. During three reigns she has been the strongest and leading personality dominating them all. All the acts of this woman have been disastrous to her country, and the final result, yet to be seen, may be disastrous not only to China, but to the world. For forty years she has been the power behind or on the throne, during all of which time there has been no progress nor advancement, but rather retrogression and disaster. From the time of her flight with her imperial consort during the Anglo-French advance on Pekin in 1860 to the outrages of today the influence of the empress has been on the side of reaction and disaster.

Old Li Her Only Match.

It is possible that the matchmaking of Li Hung Chang, who has a better knowledge of European and American policy than any other Chinaman, may be able to avert the danger now threatening the Chinese empire and bring this self-willed and badly advised empress to a realizing sense of the situation. But even with this much accomplished it will be a difficult matter to control the hordes of Chinese fanatics who have been allowed dangerous latitude: with the aim of driving out the "foreign devils."

Whether the Chinese government has not allowed the people to get beyond its control is a serious question—as serious as the future policy of that government.

Few living Chinamen, outside of the palace eunuchs, and only one living white man, have ever seen the face of Tsi-An. That man is Prince Henry of Prussia, who has confessed that the inscrutable Tartar empress baffled his curiosity and turned the tide of his questioning upon himself. The personality of the woman is concealed within the pink walls of the prohibited city and even her favorite, the powerful and astute Li Hung Chang, at his infrequent audiences, speaks to her only from the farther side of an impenetrable screen.

Some of Her Work.

It was an important event in her life when the empress being childless, Tsi An presented the emperor with a son; for in consequence of this she was proclaimed Empress of the West. Emperor Hien Fung died in 1860, and Tsi An's

son became emperor as Tung Chi, the government being conducted by a regency, consisting of the two empresses and the boy's uncle. In 1874 Tung Chi, then 19 years old, sought to control affairs himself, and his mother promptly had him poisoned, as well as his wife and child. Kwang Su, a child four years old, was then proclaimed emperor, and soon after Tsi An removed her co-empress, Hien Fung's widow, by poison. Thus she was in complete control of the whole empire, East as well as West. Kwang Su grew up and assumed nominal control as emperor, but as soon as he began to exercise authority in fact, and contrary to Tsi An's wishes, he was dethroned and put into prison, where he still remains, though why the dowager did not murder him is not explained.

The End of China.

Ralph Platt, at Tacoma, recently from China, was interviewed and said: "Yes, they understand that it is to be the final result, but they don't care. The Chinese are not a patriotic people, in the sense that the Japanese are. They are a very religious people, while the Japs have really no religion. The Mohammedan, Shinto and Buddhist are so in a clash there that they really have no religion and consequently their energies go to patriotism. The Japanese are the most overestimated of any nation on earth. The Chinese, on the other hand, are very much underestimated. Nobody every saw in this country but very few representative Chinamen. Nearly all in this country are Cantonese. You never saw a Chinaman from Fuchu, Amoy, Lingpo or any of the principal provinces of China in this country. The Chinese are very superstitious, and conservative but they are an intelligent people, and great in a commercial way and great money-makers.

Mr. Platt left Pekin on May 27, after holding a conference with the emperor at the Palace. This morning he received a cablegram from the emperor or some of his party, but its contents he did not disclose further than to remark that it was safe to state that the emperor was at the present time well and had not been murdered as had been rumored.

The Pink Palace.

"In Pekin," said he, "there are extensive palaces in a large system of gardens, surrounded by walls and forts. In one section the empress dowager and her party are holding court, while the emperor and his party are keeping up another establishment, though at present the empress dowager's party is largely in control.

"Anyone who attempts to approach the palace is met by guards and soldiers at every step, and has to pass through numberless gates and sentries, some of them carrying old blunderbusses and cutlasses of an age long past, and dressed in all kinds of uniforms. It would be an utter impossibility for a foreigner to enter succeed in getting through this cordon of sentries and soldiers, and a difficult task sometimes for even high Chinese officials. I had no trouble, however, as my credentials were such as to admit me to an audience with the emperor at once. The emperor is a man of a good deal of ability. He is well educated, progressive, and of a good deal of force of character, and struck me as being a man who would come to the front. I had a long conference with him regarding matters with which I had been entrusted, and left almost directly for the United States.

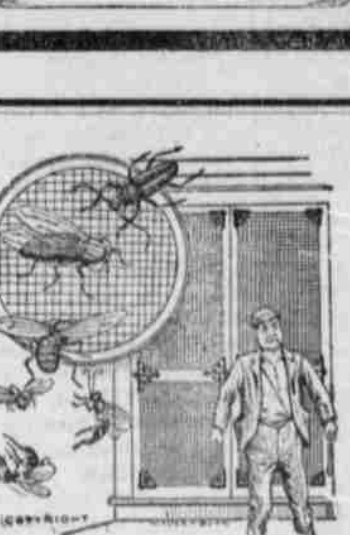
