FROM CAPE NOME.

MRS. ANNA M. NICHOL AND JOHN MORE. LOCK WRITE OF THEIR TRIP.

Arrived in Good Order and Landed Freight Without Mishap—25,000 People There.

From a letter, dated June 16, just received by Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Lockwood from Mrs. Anna M. Nichol, formerly manager of the Postal Telegraph office here, The JOURNAL is permitted to make the following extracts:

Here I am sitting in a tent about 300 feet from the water's edge with temporary quarters that are so much more comfortable than many of my fellow travelers in this vale of woe, that I am hourly congratulating myself. Well, to begin with we had a safe though tedious voyage.

We left Seattle the 21st of May, got into Dutch Harbor the 1st of June, stayed there the first week of the month then started on and were ice bound most of two days and not exactly ice bound but we would slip through a gap between two floes and then another would confront us but our Captain was a good one and seemed to smell his way through, and landed us off the promised land the 12th of June. We had beautiful weather to get our stuff ashore and not one piece wet or lost. We formed a company on board the boat of six people four gentlemen, including the Captain of the Aberdeen and three men from Tacoma, one a practical oil miner and the other three were to help us and our two selves, we are to help each other and we are to help each other.

By doing the cooking for a gang of men, in the meantime we will establish the hospital and have a fine lot already bought for only \$200 that I am satisfied will bring us \$500 and about \$2000 more when the tents are up on it, but we will hang on to it until we know that the mining proposition will pay better. We have the tents in the course of erection today and will be ready for business by tomorrow night. We can let all the beds for two dollars per night and can get a \$1.50 per meal for bread, potatoes or beans and bacon and coffee so we will serve meals while the rush lasts and then turn it into a hospital.

Talk about people! The beach for three miles is piled with baggage, people and tents, freight and everything you can think of, and still coming. Of course, there will be many who will go back soon, disgusted and broke, but I think the one who can get a foothold and stay with it will be all right. I, however, think all occupations will be overdone, and do not advise anyone to come here.

The beach is pretty well worked out by the common miners and his appliances, but a large company with proper machinery can get lots of gold out of it. I think the country is rich, and one can believe about half the reports that they see published in the home papers.

Saw Fred and Ben in Dutch Harbor, but they are not in yet. I think Ben will be ready to go back soon, for he was sick nearly all the way, and his boat is going to be so late that all the snags will be gone.

It was rather rough on sea yesterday and last night, but it is nice to today again, and I don't believe the climate is going to be so very bad, after all. The water is very bad, but we are boiling all we drink until we can get at the still, when I am sure we can make the cost of that in selling water.

Lots of the Yukon miners are just coming in and did not beat us so very much, you see, for the Aberdeen went to St. Michaels, for a load after landing us. We saw the big boat, Tacoma, go grounded out at sea, and were within ten rods of her, but our crew knew their business and didn't rush heading on as they did. The big boat was quarantined and sent to an island, with her 800 passengers, on account of smallpox.

I think it is a chance if we get a mail for a month, as the postoffice is a little 14x18 building, and is equipped accordingly, and handling the mail for at least 25,000 people. I think I will advise Ben and Fred to go to work there.

J. Morelock writes under date of June 17, in part as follows:

Well we are in Nome at last. We are waiting for our freight which we expect today. We are camped on the beach, and it is very cold today and I am anxious for our stove. There is a perfect jam of people on the beach and in the town. Men and women all mixed up together scrambling for their freight. There are twenty-seven steamers here unloading now. The steamers are unloading into big lighters, two miles out and towed into shore by small tugs. Each lighter holds about seventy-five tons!

We are about one mile from the landing place and it is bad walking in the sand. There are tents stretched along the beach for ten or fifteen miles and in every direction, in fact it is a city of tents. Messrs. Fletcher and Duncan are camped with us.

I am feeling pretty good now, have a slight cold yet but expect when we get our stove up and live at home to be perfectly well in a short time.

Get at Newberg. A committee of the Sugarbeet rustlers of Newberg came over and took Geor. Gear to live town on the morning boat, where he is to address a meeting of farmers who are interested in the sugarbeet industry. The Governor is to return this evening.
