SHOT A SWEET GIRL.

A JILTED LOVER COMMITS AN AWFUL CRIME IN WALLA WALLA.

C. A. Martin Shoots Miss Leah Coleman Through the Heart and Attempts Suicide—Leaves Some Letters.

WALLA WALLA, July 3.—C. A. Martin, better known as "Archie" Martin, or Parks, shot Miss Leah Coleman yesterday afternoon with a 38 caliber Smith & Wesson revolver, and then turned the weapon upon himself with suicidal intent, firing two bullets into his body. When the tragedy occurred Martin and Miss Coleman were standing in the door of the Inland Telephone Company's office on Second street. The only eyewitness to the shooting was D. Darveau, a carpenter, who was sitting inside the office reading. The first intimation he had that anything was wrong was when Martin fired the first shot. Almost immediately Martin fired again. One shot passed through the girl's heart, and the other went near her heart. Either shot would have proved fatal. Martin then shot himself—once about two inches above, and again just at the left of his heart. Barely missing it. Both bullets passed through his lungs, and were afterwards removed from his body.

A large crowd gathered quickly. The coroner had Miss Coleman's remains removed to her home, while Martin was taken to St. Mary's Hospital. About 7:30 o'clock he was resting easily, with slight hopes of recovery.

Miss Leah Coleman, the murdered girl, was a step-daughter of J. W. Coakley, a well known undertaker of this city. He is chief ranger of the Foresters of America for the state of Washington, and is also a prominent Old Fellow. Mrs. Coakley, mother of the murdered girl, is a prominent member of the Rebekahs, and all three belong to the M. E. church. Miss Coleman was eighteen years old, and has lived in Walla Walla nearly all her life. She was an unusually pretty girl, and very popular in society. She was also a musician of considerable ability, and played the cornet in Mrs. Irvine's orchestra.

Martin was about twenty-one years of age. He was born in Pendleton, but has lived in Walla Walla most of the time for the past ten years. When the Spanish-American war broke out, he enlisted with Company I, First Washington Volunteers, but was discharged at Angel Island, San Francisco, on account of rheumatic trouble. Since then he has studied dentistry.

From all that can be learned, Martin shot the girl because about three months ago she broke off their engagement. It seems that they have been engaged for some time, but her parents became convinced that he never would amount to anything, and persuaded her to throw him over. Even his own mother told her that Archie had a bad temper and advised her break the engagement. This was last spring, in February or March. He then made threats, saying that he would make them all sorry on account of the trouble. He then went to Pendleton, as stated above, returning to Walla Walla on Saturday evening, Sunday afternoon, about 2:30 o'clock, Martin took dinner at home, but his parents did not notice anything out of the ordinary in his appearance. He is of a cheerful disposition, and appeared in his usual good spirits. He spoke of returning to Pendleton at once, as he was to run in a horse race on July 4, with a team from that city. He left home about half an hour before the shooting, and while coming down town stopped to talk with some friends. He rolled a cigarette and came on down near the corner of Main and Third streets. Miss Coleman passed by, scarcely noticing him, when he called her by name. They stepped in the door of the telephone office, and stood there talking in a low tone of voice about five minutes before he commenced shooting.

When the coroner arrived, Miss Coleman held a photo button with her picture on it tightly clasped in her hand, and it is supposed Martin had just handed it to her. In his pockets were found some letters, and a note addressed to the coroner, which read:

"Coroner—Please leave these three letters with me. As this is the reception I get in Walla Walla, I don't think I will get much worse in hell."
"C. A. MARTIN."

The coroner absolutely refused to divulge the contents of these letters.

AGUINALDO STILL TALKS

A LATE PROCLAMATION FROM THE FILIPINO CHIEF.

Aguinaldo Tells His People to Demand Their Rights and Resist All Attempts to Overthrow Them by the Commission.

MANILA, May 24.—The most important rebel document lately circulated in Manila is an alleged proclamation from Aguinaldo concerning the coming civil commission. The proclamation warns the Filipino people to beware of the commission and their promise of future benefits, and begs them never to give up their arms in the vain hope of thereby enjoying ultimate freedom and happiness.

It states that the commission is appointed by President McKinley and that they have no authority to treat or take any action whatever in the name of the government of the United States, and predicts of the commission headed by Judge Taft the same end as that which attended the peace commission of last year, which Aguinaldo describes as farcical and ridiculous. He dwells at considerable length upon statements to the effect that the commission has no legal or official standing, and begs, implores and orders the Filipino people not to be deceived by them nor to give up their arms upon their representations.

He then goes on to say that if the commissioners visit the smaller towns and provinces of Luzon they are to be received well and with enthusiasm. "Ask them for the kind of municipal government you most desire and be not afraid to speak boldly to them; remember the dark days of Spanish outrages are past and that the Americans allow freedom of speech. In other words, get all you can out of the commission, but put no faith in them."

The proclamation ends with cries for Filipino liberty and independence, is signed by Aguinaldo, and dated May 4, on the island of Polillo, which is situated on the east coast of Luzon.

The bride is a talented and accomplished young lady and well known, and has a large circle of friends in this city. She is a musician of great ability and has taken a prominent part in church and Sunday school work.

The groom is pastor of the Methodist church in Junction City, where the newly married couple will take up their residence, after a few days spent at the bride's home here.
