WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF A WAR WITH CHINA?

Germany has some cause for war with China. The German minister has been killed, but even that may have been no overt act of war by the Chinese government. He may have been killed by a lawless mob, rioting in the streets of a Chinese city, and utterly beyond the control of all the authorities. But the German emperor has spoken. The imperial flag of Germany shall float over the capital of China. He has spoken. He is the vice-regent of God in his own mind. He has invoked the name of the Prince of Peace and will wage the war of the Chinese capital, if necessary, through a sea of blood.

The consequences of the emperor's speech will be felt by the whole world. He says he joins with the powers for civilization. Armies shall teach China to keep the peace, to respect other nations, to not murder, to become civilized. Yet it was not always so. The Armenians were murdered in Turkey and Germany and England did not cry for blood and revenge. Now the emperor wants justice.

What will be the effect of teaching China the art of war? A few years ago little Japan was able to whip China at land and sea. But that war taught China a great deal. Her navy has been increased. Her coast is better fortified. Her army is increased so that the Europeans must meet a force of 140,000 armed troops to enter Peking. Modern armaments render even the Chinese hostiles capable of resisting trained soldiers and a little handful of British sailors, or European marines cannot march anywhere they please. European equipments and drillmasters have been rapidly converting the undisciplined mobs of pillagers into mobilized forces. The Chinese are an inimitable people, descendants of the warlike Tartars, a natural bent for warfare, cruelty, bloodshed, and an almost insane contempt for death. The object lesson of the war with Japan has not been lost upon them. The final great effect of the present war will be to convert China into a military power.

The nations of the world may well hesitate before pouring armies into the Chinese empire. The presence of modern armies there will be the schooling of the mongols in the arts of modern warfare. Once they learn the destructive power of a modern rifle and gun, the world may well stand in awe of a nation of practically unlimited numbers. Awakened China, military China, means a readjustment of world powers, a readjustment of the civilized nations.

If the result of the war with China is an arousing of the savage dormant Tartar and pirate instincts of the mongol race, the Powers will regret the day they began military operations in the Orient on a large scale. If the Chinese learn the art of war, as they will be forced to in the dear school of experience, it means that all civilized races must keep large armies, large navies, and fortify their coast to resist an invasion from a sun-burned foe at home on both land and sea.
