DETAILS AT WORK

PREPARING THE CAMP AND GROUNDS FOR THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The Dust Has Been Laid and the Officers' Horses Will Have to Be Recaptured.

There will be no dust on the state encampment of the Oregon National Guard and 35 officers' horses are stuck on a sand bar in the Willamette river. They were shipped on the steamer Ruth, from Portland, and may have to be swum ashore to arrive in time for Saturday, when the encampment is to open.

General orders from the Brigadier-General disclose the fact that the encampment headquarters that the Third Infantry Regimental band, from Portland, and the Fourth Infantry Regimental band, from Eugene, will be present during the encampment.

The Details arrived at the camp grounds today to put the grounds in order and do all the preliminary work, such as putting up tents, and providing fuel and bedding. Sgt. Judson and privates Rose, Jones and Clark, of the Salem company, were detailed by Capt. Lyon.

Four enlisted men of Co. A., and three enlisted men each of companies B, C, D, E, F, and G. Lieut. Strain, of Portland has charge of all the details. The two regiments will be here Saturday, the Albany company arriving first, followed by the Portland and Eastern Oregon companies on a special train.

R. S. Greenleaf is the officer designated to lay out and plot the camp. A general order prohibits bucksters or sales of liquors, wines, ale, or beer on the grounds, or anyone being there after 10 p.m. The weather promises to be everything that could be expected during the rainy season in the tropics.

LATEST NEWS

FROM NOME

SALEMITE ARE DISCUSSED AND SOME WILL RETURN SOON.

Ex-Alderman Thomas Holman Writes Under Date of June 19th.

Ed. JOURNAL.—We arrived June 19th at Nome on steamer "Nome City" after a long and exceedingly tiresome trip. The Captain did not seem to care how soon or how late we arrived. We left a number of steamers at Dutch Harbor, which came in here, were unloaded and left again before we arrived, and it made us sick. We want no more of the "Nome City." The weather, however, after leaving Dutch Harbor was delightful the remainder of the trip.

Nome is greatly overdone. The beach has been worked over two or three times already, and there is nothing left for anybody.

I find the beach diggings never have been half as rich as represented, but there are plenty of rich claims up the creeks. Everything is in such mad confusion. There will be quite a number of Salem people go back in the next two or three weeks.

The beach digging giving out, has disappointed thousands of people.

I believe this is the hottest camp ever known. There has been three or four men shot since I landed. Some are going crazy through disappointment, others are broke and cannot go back. Many hundreds are going back disgusted.

People jump property and claims, it seems that possession is the only law here. Everything is very high. Lumber is \$150 per 1000 feet, and a good deal of building is going on. Things are about three or four times as high in price as at home.

Mr. Ward and myself are camped about half a mile from town. Our freight is not yet unloaded and will not be for three or possibly four days yet.

Gov. Fletcher has been and still is sick with fever, but not seriously.

Frank Kaiser is very ill with brain fever and not expected to survive. He is delirious and knows no one. He was sick the entire passage.

Mr. Morelock has been sick but is now better.

I saw Joe Cavanaugh last evening, he came from Dawson here. Mr. Wilds from Salem is selling his outfit and going to Dawson.

I have a very severe cold, otherwise feel first-rate.

The rush for mail all day long is terrible. Yesterday I waited two hours to get inside the office. The amount of mail to handle is tremendous and the post office force inadequate.

I have taken quite a number of kodak views which I will send home.

MORE NEWS FROM NOME.

W. H. Helms, of Salem, reveals some startling facts concerning the Metropolis of the Frozen North.

The following extracts are taken from a letter written to Mr. Jay Bishop, of this city, by W. H. Helms, dated Nome City, June 21st:

"With thousands and thousands of others, I have been wonderfully deceived in coming to this county. There are probably 50,000 people here now, and still they are coming by the thousands. Millions of dollars worth of produce and machinery are on the beach that will never be used. From one to three suicides are reported daily, and hundreds of men are broke, who would be glad to work for their board. What will become of them the Lord only knows. There are one or two men shot daily, and there is general disorder and confusion.

"Titles to all town lots are in litigation. The country is all staked out for 100 miles around, lying there for sale. They won't let a man prospect before buying. A few claims on the beach are being worked and are paying well. The beach mining paid well last fall for a few miles and was worked out. Early this spring the crowd from Dawson reworked it, but there are still some spots left that pay small wages. However, the men who come out whole on the trip will be the exception.

"I hauled my stuff up to camp with my cart, and then sold it for \$30. I bought a small boat, paying \$80 for it, and have commenced to move my stuff further up the beach. I will put in the summer if there is any show for something. There are hundreds of men going home on every steamer. Every branch of business is overdone. It is very hard to get acquainted to sleeping in daylight. It is as light at midnight as at noon.

"We were thirteen days on the water from Astoria. We spent three days fast in the icebergs from 20 to 30 feet thick. As far as the eye could reach there was nothing but ice. Several vessels were wrecked, but no one was lost that I can learn of. The Ohio came in a few days ago with smallpox on board, and was not allowed to land, being sent to St. Michaels.

THE ENCAMPMENT.

OREGON NATIONAL GUARD WILL BE WELL PROVIDED FOR AT SALEM.

Contributions to the Fund Nearly All Collected. Big Excursion Next Sunday.

The total amount of subscriptions secured by the committee recently appointed by the chamber of commerce to raise funds for encampment, is \$516. Of this amount nearly all has been collected, W. A. Moores having been appointed for that duty.

An abundance of straw, lumber, wood and water has been provided for, as well as lights, and the camp will have "all the comforts of a home."

Salem is fortunate in securing this encampment which will be the greatest yet held. It will draw thousands of visitors from all over the state to this city. Elaborate preparations are being made by the hotels, restaurants and boarding houses, for the proper accommodation of the expected crowds and visitors will have no reason to complain of their treatment.

On Sunday next, the second day of the encampment, the popular excursion of the Foresters of America will bring at least 3000 people to Salem, to visit the camp of the O. N. G., and an outdoor entertainment will also take place at the fair grounds.

The encampment will continue eight days and should be visited by every one who can possibly avail himself of the opportunity.

THE GLORIOUS FOURTH.

Passes Off Quietly at This City—Weather Spills Picnics.

The quietest Fourth of July seen in Salem for many years has just passed. But for an occasional firecracker or bomb touched off by a small boy, and the flag flying over Bush's bank, the traveler on Commercial street would have found nothing to remind him that it was the anniversary of the nation's birth.

As the shades of night fell a few rockets were sent up from different parts of the city by youngsters whose dads had been liberal with the spending money.

Many of Salem's people went to the outlying towns which were celebrating the day, and others went on the excursion down the river. Still others had all arrangements made for private picnics to different pleasant spots in the country. These were all disappointed, many ways wended their way to the weeping skies from the young people who had been indulging in such bright anticipations of a day's outing and summer flirtation in the sylvan glades of Marion county.

The day was free from any serious accident. A Chinese bomb, fired by a small boy on Commercial street, threw a pebble through a 400 plate glass window into Stone's drug store. In another instance the small boy was fired by the Chinese bomb. The bomb had been placed under an inverted keg after the fuse was lit, and the boy illustrated his "courage, skill and endurance" by sitting on the keg until the thing "went off." The keg was resolved into its constituent elements, and the boy came down again after awhile, without sustaining serious damage.

While a superabundance of water, in the form of rain, prevented the private picnics, the lack of it proved disastrous to the M. E. Sunday school excursion and picnic down the river. The crowd went down on the Altona and started back on the Ruth. But in crossing the bar near Wheatland the bottom of the river was too near the top, and the steamer went around hard and fast. There were 60 excursionists on board, mostly children, and they were obliged to put in the night on the boat, without their nightgowns. At last accounts the vessel was still aground, but the passengers will be brought up on another boat, probably the Madox, due between 5 and 6 p. m.

Little Boys All Right.

The boys of Company F, O. N. G., who visited Dallas on the Fourth to assist in the celebration, won warm expressions of approval from the Dallas people for their soldierly and dignified bearing. The boys do honor both to themselves and the organization to which they belong, by conducting themselves like gentlemen.

SOME PERTINENT FIGURES

MAYOR BISHOP SHOWS THE CONDITION OF THE CITY.

Financial Status of Salem Better Than It Has Been in the Past Ten Years—Council Proceedings.

Salem's city council met Tuesday evening in regular session, all being present except councilmen Allen and Gesner.

The petition of the A. O. U. W. lodges for the use of Wilson avenue Tuesday evening, July 17, during grand lodge, was granted.

A new hydrant was ordered placed near the Woolen Mills, and the old hydrant at the corner of the property occupied by the Salem hospital was ordered discontinued.

The monthly and quarterly reports of City Recorder Judah, the quarterly report of City Treasurer John Moir, and the quarterly report of J. P. Feizell, street commissioner, and the semi-annual message of Mayor C. P. Bishop, were read.

THE MAYOR'S MESSAGE.
"To the Hon. Common Council—Gentlemen: I beg to submit to you, herewith, my semi-annual statement of the financial condition of the city, as required by the charter.

"You will remember that in December last the following estimates of revenue and expenses, for the year 1900, were ordered by your honorable body:

REVENUE.
From general taxes \$18,000 00
From saloon licenses 6,000 00
From fines and fees 350 00
From rents city property 700 00
From shoe licenses 200 00
From vehicle licenses 90 00
From street assessments 1,250 00
From misc. receipts 300 00
Total \$27,000 00

EXPENSE.
Salary account \$ 7,115 00
Water account 1,419 00
Lighting account 2,500 00
Interest on bonds 11,020 89
Total \$22,055 49

"These estimates left, for current expenses, over and above the fixed charges enumerated above, \$4,944 51.

"The receipts to date are:
From general taxes \$ 3,423 42
From all other sources \$ 4,110 89
Total \$7,534 31

"This total includes the sum of \$3875 received from the sale of the Wilson Avenue postoffice site, and taking this from the income derived from sources other than general taxes, the current receipts for the past year would be \$4,358 89.

"Relying upon the estimated revenues ordered by your body of \$27,000, there should be received, during the second half of the year, (from general taxes) the sum of \$14,575 58; (from revenues from fines, fees and licenses, etc.) \$4,358 89, total, \$18,934 47.

"The expenses to date are:
For interest on bonds \$ 5,510 44
For current charges and fixed expenses 6,560 73
Total expense 12,071 17
Total revenue 11,834 31
Deficit 236 86

Warrants called by the city treasurer, for the half-year, \$6,629 19.

"Estimating the revenue of the city for the second half of the year, at the above sum of \$18,934 47.

And the expense, fixed and current, at the same sum expended during the first half, namely, 12,071 17.

There will remain to the credit of the estimated income of the city, to be applied in the call and cancellation of warrants by the treasurer, the sum of 6,863 30.

"I am advised that a call for warrants will be made forthwith by the treasurer, for the outstanding warrants on December 31, 1899.

"I commend these figures to your careful scrutiny, as indicating that, with your customary conservatism in public affairs, the city will be well within her income at the end of the present year, with, perhaps, her entire floating indebtedness wiped out, a consummation of exceeding value to the taxpayer, as well as most honorable to yourselves as the trustees of the municipality.

The proposition from Company F. O. N. G., to lease the upper floor of the city hall building as an armory, not to be used on nights on which the council meets, for a period of two years at a monthly rental of \$30, was rejected by a vote of 4 to 2.

The carpenter who constructed the staging on State street for the Quaker doctors, was given 48 hours in which to remove the improvised stage.

A petition from property owners asking that cross-walks be established on High and Church streets, at the intersection of Leslie street, was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

Two bids had been submitted for the construction of a sewer in block 61, between Clematis and Center streets, as follows: D. S. Bentley & Co., \$347 25; Bernard & Dunford, \$275. Upon the motion of Riggs, the contract was awarded to Bernard & Dunford.

Upon the request of Councilman Riggs, the Christian Peoples of this city were given the privilege of erecting a through Wilson Avenue for the purpose of holding a series of revival meetings.
