#### MR. OTTENHEIMER'S ADVICE TO THE HOPMEN.

The local agent of the firm of hop factors, Lillenthal Bros., of New York has given the hopmen a few columns of advice, and volunteers the generous information that if it hadn't been for the blue mold striking the hops controlled by the Oregon Association, Oregon hops would have sold readily at 8 to 10 cents a pound immediately after the Association was formed, and in working order. On top of this statement of an otherwise bright and scintillating intellect, Mr. Ottenheimer has the cheek to make this proposition:

"If the hopgrowers of Oregon, Washington and California will reduce their output 25 per cent this year, we will guarantee growers 15 cents per pound for all of their hops that are of good quality."

The destruction of nearly 90 per cent of the Oregon crop by that "destructive pest" the blue mold, in the year 1899, did not advance the price of hops to any perceptible degree. Then how can reducing the acreage 25 per cent raise the price to 15 cents a pound? If the blue mold had destroyed all the hops in Oregon it is difficult to see that it would have any figure in the price, and so far as the operation of the law of supply and demand goes, that Mr. O. lays so much stress upon, as being the cause of low prices, if Oregon did not raise a hop the growers in Washington and California would not be better off, because the destruction of 90 per cent, as Mr. O. says in 1899, in this state, which grows at least one-third of all the hops on the coast, did not advance prices in those States. If destroying the competing crop in Oregon did not raise prices, and it was one-third of the total coast product, how will restricting the acreage 25 per cent enable all the Lillenthals in the world to pay 15 cents a pound for the remaining 75 per cent of the crop?

All Mr. Ottenheimer says about improving the crop has been said a thousand times. But there is no way but the survival of the fittest and most competent to keep out incompetent people and prevent lowering the quality. When a business is profitable a great many will rush in and reduce the output in quality but increase it in volume. This is all ancient and well-known stuff and is

#### MACREADY ON THE STAGE.

#### The Sense of Taste.

That the intensity of one sense is increased by the action of other senses is a fact which is well illustrated by the sense of taste. A cold cold feels heavier than one that has been slightly warmed by being carried in the pocket, and what is true here of touch is just as true of taste. Warm vinegar, warm sugar, warm solutions of salt taste less sour, sweet or salty than when cold. If you put a slight solution of salt or quinine into a sugar solution of a certain sweetness, the sweetness will seem much greater. Cooks and confectioners are well aware of this fact, for they always add to sweet confections some bitter substance, just as the perfumers put into perfumes of all kinds at least a little musk.

The cook tries to "lift" or "fill" the taste, as they say, just as the perfumer tries to do with the sense of smell, and as in aesthetics the bass drum or bass viol forms a kind of background for the tone of coloring. On the other hand, if a mixture is made too sweet, without any contrasting elements, the quality of sweetness is lost, something like Milton's "darkness from excess of light." The effect of cold in reducing the intensity of sweetness is well known to any one who has manufactured ice cream at home. If you don't make the cream a little too sweet before freezing, it will not be sweet enough after the freezing process.

#### A Coward.

## A CELEBRATED ROAD ENGINE

Took Two Years to make a Journey of 320 Miles, from the Dalles to Silver Lake.

SILVER LAKE, OR., June 27.—Standing by a blacksmith shop at this place is a huge piece of machinery, patched and wrapped and mended until scarcely a bolt or rod is intact as originally completed. It is called a traction or road engine, and is a huge one at that.

Securing freight in this country is the object of every merchant's life. To the Dalles, a distance of 320 miles, over rough mountain roads and desert sands, is the nearest point to the railroad or water navigation. It takes a long time to make this trip with an ordinary freight wagon and team, so long that many goods that are fresh on starting out become stale before they reach their destination.

F. M. Chrisman, a leading general merchant of Silver Lake, was persuaded that a traction engine was the thing, and he invested in one and determined to revolutionize the freight business between The Dalles and Silver Lake. More than two years ago he started out from The Dalles with his big traction engine, with a train of wagons loaded with freight attached.

The roads, at the start, were favorable, and the engine worked like a charm. Up and down the long grades leading out from The Dalles the train moved with the ease of a railroad train, if not with the rapidity of one. In fact, the start was so propitious that Mr. Chrisman on the very start wagged \$1000 that he would be in Silver Lake in 30 days, thinking at the time that he would make a trip in half the time. But in an hour afterwards the trouble began. A rod broke and he had to send back to The Dalles for repairs.

In another hundred yards another break occurred and the blacksmith at The Dalles had to be employed. Then water gave out and the ranchers' wells were drawn upon. Wood became an object through the barren country and the ranchers woodpiles were bought at their own price. As they progressed, sometimes a mile in a day, some days a hundred yards, and some days not a foot, the thing consumed all the wood and water for miles in every direction. But Chrisman was undaunted. He said that he would land the thing in Silver Lake. He established movable blacksmith shops, carpenter shops and shanties for the men to shelter under and the traction engine and its train of wagons and the shops and shanties were an odd sight as they moved along the mountain and desert roads.

A big crowd accompanied the train most of the time, as the ranchers of every particular neighborhood and their families came to see the novel sight, and followed along, when it moved, for hours. As they reached the more sparsely settled communities famine was left in their wake. Wood, water and fuel were completely exhausted. The combined efforts of the ranchers could not keep the thing in wood, as in many places fuel had to be hauled for many miles. In a few weeks' time some of the goods in the wagon began to get stale, and these wagons were detached and taken on to Silver Lake by means of the old-time power—horses. Then hills were reached where the engine could not ascend, and all the horses for miles around were employed to pull the machine and the train to the top. From morning to the night the shouts to the horses, the swearing workmen, the axes of the woodhoppers and the hammers in the blacksmith and carpenter shops kept up a din.

But this was pastime compared with what was to follow. Out in the desert water and wood had to be hauled for 50 and 40 miles. Days were spent without moving an inch. Privations and sufferings were endured. The wagons were all cut loose and taken to Silver Lake, drawn by horses, but Chrisman said that the traction engine had to go through. It finally comes to the point where wells had to be dug along the route for water and temporary wooding
