OLD SOLDIERS AT LYONS

BEAUTIFUL SITE OF JOHN A. LOGAN ENCAMPMENT AT LYONS.

A Permanent Assemblage Place Has Been Created at the Santiam River.

Comrades Peters, Bennett, Fenton and Miles, under the lead of Capt. Parker, the mayor of Lyons, have fixed up the nicest assemblage grounds for the John A. Logan Veteran's encampment that God and nature and human ingenuity combined can contrive.

It is roofed by the evergreen arches of the overhanging fir. It is carpeted with axminster and Brussels moss a foot deep, all starred with forest flowers and bordered with fringes of rhododendron and azaleas. The finest spring of water on the Pacific coast—the famous cold spring at the mouth of Fox Valley—flows from its virgin bed in the midst of the camp. Permanent roofed speaker's stands, lemonade stands, bowers for dancing, photograph gallery and eating stands are erected on the grounds.

Five level spaces are seated and it is all on such a generous scale that I thought there only about 50 people present when I spoke, when a man who counted the crowd said there were 173 persons. On Sunday there is to be a union Sunday school picnic, with a sermon by Rev. Rounds, of the Methodist church. In the afternoon the Presbyterian preacher, from Mill City, will expound the Scripture. At night the Seventh Day Baptists will hold the fort. So there is a chance for all to be saved with any style of dressing.

All this reminds me of a paragraph from good old John Selden's table talk in 1683: "Religion is like fashion. One man wears his doublet slashed, another laced, another plain; but every man has a doublet. So every man has his religion. We differ about the trimming." I assisted on the evening program. This time my effort was musical. They had no organ at the speaking stand. Capt. Parker put a rope around the organ, ran a pole through it, and I took one end. All said I carried my part well.

The evening program and all the programs are well arranged, and Mr. and Mrs. Parker are entitled to great credit for their enterprise, ubiquitous assistance and lending a helping hand generally. Lyons is destined to be the assembly city of the Santiam Valley. No place has such perfect camping arrangements or picnic provision. Lyons is destined to become a center for such outdoor attractions. Logan camp has not been patronized this year as well by the old soldiers as it deserves. It is a gem of a place for a camping or at a Chautauqua. E. HOWE.
