BIG AFFAIR AT GATES. COLORS FLYING AT CAMP GEER

IN SPITE OF SHOWERS THE CELEBRATION WAS A SUCCESS.
A Bandmaster Who Was With Dewey at Manila Led the Band.

In spite of showers that set in early and kept up all the forenoon, the celebration at Gates was a great success. The Cascade Cornet band met the train as it pulled in and a crowd of excursionists got off.

The rains set in early on the morning of Fourth. At 8:40 a big excursion train pulled into Lyons from Albany and a large number got off to celebrate there. The rest of the excursion was headed for Detroit, and the outlook was dismal enough. The farther up the valley the train went the deeper the banks of clouds, the denser the fog, the heavier the showers. But by noon all was cleared off and the program was carried out at the town hall instead of the grove.

August Oppiger, leader of the Gates band, was a cornet player in the naval band at the battle of Manila Bay, and afterwards was band master six months on the Baltimore. Mar. 25 they sailed from Honolulu, reaching Yokohama April 10 and on the 21st of April at Hongkong. On their arrival they found the navy all wearing the bottle-green war colors and knew there was trouble ahead.

Forty-eight hours the Baltimore lay in drydock and when she came out her bottoms were cleaned and she wore her fighting paint. On the 24th they sailed and seven vessels went to Manila Bay. On the 25th the Olympia and Baltimore joined them. On the 28th Consul Williams came aboard and at 3 p. m. they sailed for Manila, arriving in the Bay on the morning of May 1st, when the battle took place. During the engagement hands did not play, but were employed handling up ammunition for the Hotchkiss guns. The first music was a concert on the evening May 1st on board the Baltimore and Olympia. The program opened with "A Hot Time in The Old Town Tonight."

Mr. Oppiger was three years in the service and was discharged at Mare Island Mar. 13. He has been visiting a sister in Idaho, and is now the guest of his brother Jacob Oppiger of Mill City. The brothers are Swiss Germans and expect to buy a farm in Marion county and make their homes. Mr. Oppiger speaks in the highest terms of Admiral Dewey and is the proud wearer of a Dewey medal to which he was entitled as one of the 1865 men who were at the battle of Manila Bay. The Gates band played their best and had reason to be proud of their leader, as no other celebration in Oregon was honored with such a distinguished bandmaster on this patriotic occasion.

But the enterprising business men of Woodburn used their effort and have granted further time.
