ABOUT CREATING A FAVORED OFFICE-HOLDING CLASS

A correspondent calls our attention to the following case of apparent abuse of the appointing power, where a senator of the United States has appointed a son of the minister to Argentina to a West Point cadetship without competitive examination. We do not know that the criticism is well taken but we are glad to have the matter called because it reveals a growing abuse, and so we print the communication:

"Some time ago I remember you were opposing Congressman Tongue for appointing sons of politicians and favored friends as cadets to West Point without competitive examination. In a recent issue of your paper I note that Senator Simon has appointed a son of Ex-Governor Lord as cadet to West Point, but so far have been unable to find a criticism thereon in your paper. Now this is a purely political appointment, made to the son of a man who for twenty-five years has been an office-holder in the state of Oregon, and is still one. It seems to me that you might be consistent for just once."

THE JOURNAL is not fully informed about the matter nor about the law in the case. It is either a law or it has been long since a custom that the president and the United States senators, and even congressmen have the right in certain cases to name candidates for West Point and Annapolis, the military and naval colleges, as a personal right, a political and official prerogative, without competitive examinations. We do not know that this has been the case in the appointment of Minister Lord's son. It is probable that Senator Simon had the right under the law to name a cadet to West Point, but he would not have done so, if he had not that right, he is subject to the same criticism that Mr. Tongue was. Mr. Tongue never held a competitive examination until driven to do so by the persistent hammering of THE JOURNAL, and he has never to this day held such an examination openly and free from political influences and had the result announced publicly and without juggling.

To come to the point, all such acts are un-American and would be tolerated nowhere else, and are tolerated nowhere else that we know of. In all other states open public competitive examinations are held to which any man's son is eligible, no matter what his politics, color, or nationality. The result of this examination, which is not conducted by political strikers, but by a non-partisan professional board, is made public and the one standing highest and next highest are named as candidate and alternate. This is American, lawful, customary, and will be the practice in Oregon whenever our people are emancipated from dirty and seamy political methods now prevailing.

At present only the office-holding class have any right to appointment in the United States. Instead of the checks and balances that grow out of the introduction of representatives fresh from the people, there is a constant concentration of power from the class who already have too much, and who are constantly tempted to think the state exists only to feed them and give their children advantages, and if this keeps on from Washington down to our local affairs the common run will be shut out entirely of

TO TEST THE LAW.

Grounds Alleged in the Portland Suit Against Bicycle Tax

In the suit commenced in Portland against Sheriff Frazier by J. A. Ellis, under the auspices of the anti-Bicycle Tax association, the complaint sets up that the act is in violation of the Constitution of the State of Oregon in the sample attempt to grant to citizens and classes of citizens privileges and immunities which on the same terms do not belong equally to all citizens of the state.

It is also alleged that the act is in violation of the Constitution in that said act imposes taxation which is not equal and uniform, that the law is in violation of the Constitution in that it is a special and local law for laying out, opening and working the highways and for the assessment and collection of taxes for road purposes, and that the act pretends to impose a fine for the failure to pay the pretended tax and is unlawful in the County of Multnomah, which by the terms of the act is not such in 23 other counties in the state.

It is further set up that the statute is unconstitutional because it does not provide a uniform and equal rate of assessment and taxation, or enact regulations so as to secure just valuation for taxation of the property of the same class owned by all citizens of the state, but unlawfully discriminates against citizens and residents of Multnomah County and certain other counties of the state, and imposes upon such citizens burdens not imposed upon the citizens of 23 counties in the state; that the act is unconstitutional because it attempts and authorizes appropriation of moneys collected as pretended taxes to private use and the expenditure of such money upon private lands and not upon public highways.
