GERMANS IN AMERICA.

Professor William Zimmerman Talks To a  
Large Audience.

PORTLAND, July 10.—Professor William  
Zimmerman lectured at Tuna Halle, be-  
fore the Turn Verein, in German, before  
a large intelligent audience. His lecture  
related to the part Germans have played  
in the United States since their early  
settlement near Germantown, Pa.

After some introductory remarks, the  
speaker mentioned in a general way the  
influence which Germans have exercised  
in the development of the country, how  
German music and song have become an  
integral part of our culture and how the  
German-Americans have from the ear-  
liest times been ready to sacrifice  
country and property for their adopted  
country. Among the Revolutionary  
heroes were mentioned General Peter  
Muenchberg, the friend of Patrick  
Henry; Nicolaus Herkheimer, the leader  
of those brave German farmers of the  
Mohawk Valley in New York who, in  
1777, defeated the English in the battle  
of Oriskany, and brought about a  
most favorable change in the affairs  
of the war. Generals De Kalb and Von  
Steuben were also lovingly remembered.  
In passing over to the Civil War, the  
lecturer referred to the hundreds of

thousands of German-Americans that  
fought then on the Northern side, and  
that the loyal Germans of St. Louis, by  
their energy and bravery, kept Missouri  
in the Union, thus preventing a threat-  
ened invasion of the Confederates into  
Illinois and Ohio.

Advancing to the literary work of the  
German-Americans, the speaker men-  
tioned four distinct periods, the first  
extending from the last decades of the  
seventeenth century to the first quar-  
ter of the nineteenth century, compris-  
ing about 150 years.

Like the Pilgrim Fathers of New En-  
gland, the early German immigrants of  
Pennsylvania had left their old homes  
along the Rhine on account of their re-  
ligious faith. The most prominent of  
these early comers was Franz Daniel  
Pastorius (born in 1651, died in 1719  
in Germantown, now a part of the City  
of Philadelphia), scholar, lawyer,  
preacher, teacher and farmer, for  
36 years the leader of the Pennsylvan-  
ia Germans. He wrote not less than  
40 different works in German, French,  
Latin, Dutch and Italian. The German  
books in this country were printed by  
Benjamin Franklin in English types,  
as far back as 1730. But in the year  
1737 Christoph Sauer, in many respects  
a very notable man, established the  
first German newspaper in America.  
Sauer also printed the first Bible (in  
German) in this country, the first Eng-  
lish version appearing fully 40 years  
later. All in all, the Sauer press up to  
1777, issued 140 different German books.

The second period lies between the  
years 1820-50. Among the eminent men  
of that period, Dr. Francis Lieber, the  
great teacher of international law, of  
Columbia College, New York, stands  
prominently forth. In this period we  
find also reprints of some of the works  
of Goethe, Schiller, Koerner, Hauf and  
others.

The third period of German-American  
literature comprises those who had to  
leave the fatherland on account of their  
participation in the revolutionary move-  
ment of 1848-1849. Many of these new-  
comers were men of the highest cul-  
ture and talent. They created here a  
new literature, full of love of liberty.  
Karl Schurz, Kaspar Butz, Reinhold  
Solger, Konrad Krez, Dr. Dorsch, The-  
odore Kirchhoff, Dr. Hans, Herman  
Behr, Dr. Friedrich Karl Castellan and  
many others became the leaders of that  
period.

The fourth period comprises the Ger-  
man-American writers that came after  
1850. There are many noted men among  
them. Dr. Bruehl, of Cincinnati; Ernst  
August Zundel, who is called the poet  
of the Turners of America; Udo Brach-  
vogel, Wilhelm Muller, Conrad Nies,  
R. Reitzel, Rudolph Thomann, Herman  
Glauch and many others.

The speaker's remarks were frequently  
interspersed with the reading of noted  
poems of the different authors, and he  
repeatedly admonished his listeners to  
make every effort to preserve the Ger-  
man language in their families. He  
pointed to the fact that German has  
now become in four secondary schools,  
colleges and universities an important  
study among American students, and  
that in the University of California and  
in Stanford University the respective  
German departments ranked in im-  
portance only after the English de-  
partments.
