THE LOGIC OF EVENTS.

The two great parties are before the country with their declarations of principles and the political campaign is on. "Man proposes but God disposes." The logic of events during the next four months will have more to do with the determination of politics than platforms. Crops will be a factor. The absence or presence of labor trouble will count for something. But more than all else the progress of events in the world at large. The present is portentous with future developments. What will happen in China and what will the administration do? What will happen in the Philippines? What will happen in some new quarter of the globe? The political parties have said the issue is to be on money and expansion. Providence may make it something else.

The world is traveling rapidly now and much may happen in four months. The unknown future and its complications must be taken into account and he would be a rash man who would venture a serious forecast.

A Little Oregon Political History.

The writer was raised a Republican and held offices in Iowa, and while there saw men like J. A. T. Hull, who as a state official practiced unblushing nepotism even into the third generation and including his own wife and father-in-law, sent to congress and then made chairman of the military committee and provide places for his own sons in the reorganization of the army. In Oregon the writer sat in the legislature and had a relative of full of pearl McBride thrust a peck measure man handled pen-knives under his nose to take him a drink, and another relative bring him an armful of cods and law books.

Under this man McBride as revenue officer of the state abuses multiplied and taxes ran up until in the closing year of his glory twelve hundred thousand dollars were taken from the people for state purposes and for the branch systems and normal schools were springing up all over the state. To close his career, he supported J. N. Dulph for senator with the loyalty of a digger Indian and walked off with the senatorship in his pocket. On the committee of commerce he has been able to get millions for the private harbors of great corporations, but not a dollar for the little harbor at Yachima. Bay that alone stood between the farmers of Western Oregon and the confiscation of their wheat crops. Under him as senator corporations are taking millions of acres of the choicest timber lands in the state in lieu of forest reserve, locations that never cost them a cent.

If we had intimated that we would

vote for such a man we might have gone to the legislature. He may be as good as Dolph in these respects. He may be as good as Mitchell or Scott, or any other Republican who may be elected, but if we live to be as old as Methuselah, and our brain shrunk until the skin of a wild gooseberry would require a peckering stroke to make us a nightcap, we will never vote for Mr. McBride or any of his ilk. He stole the office before by forcing the members of the legislature to vote for him or go home without electing a senator, a political crime capable of being committed only by a political smart aleck, and for perpetrating which he can look no honest man in the face. We repeat that Mr. McBride belongs to a school of politics which ought to be extinct, but unfortunately the state is full of his breed, for he has been educating them in this kind of smartness and quack-corruption for two generations.

Pinhead politicians and crumpickers may admire these traits, but the days of McBride-Mitchell statesmanship ought to be at an end in the coming century. The Donald Mackay-Corbett faction in the last legislature had their faults, but they were the conservative force in the senate that killed the \$200,000 sugar beet graft, the branch asylum graft, and hundreds of thousands of dollars of other grafts and rackets that had been aided and winked at by the group of pen-knife and clerkship politicians. Those men are retired and the political miscreants headed by Mitchell-McBride-Patterson et al. are to the front as reformers. It is the death-struggle of this element that shaped Oregon policies of high taxation and bad laws; the looting of the public lands and scattering of our school funds, the prostitution of our public schools and institutions of learning to the book-trust, and caused the making of nepotism a patriotic practice and standing in a public virtue.

The discussion of these matters is called personal abuse. It is not so intended. Personalities are the most potent object lessons. The people have a right to know these things. No one need fear hurting the feelings of the stripe of politicians here discussed. They have an assurance case-hardened by long practice. When McBride was defeated and retired as secretary of state, with sublime effrontery he occupied his offices in the state house for months until he went on to Washington. When he was not a public official, he once the general appropriation bill of 1895 with as much sang froid as though he were a member of the legislature himself. He was the only man who could be trusted by Patterson et al. to perpetrate all the grafts and reward all the beneficiaries of the biennial loot. He was given a gold medal for this and no doubt wears it with honor and pride. Of such is the Republican heavenly kingdom. Others would rather lie in the outermost corner of a despoiled and forgotten minority hell than wear the jeweled emblems of questionable success. The men who are catering to corruption, who are building up officialism, who work at unjust appropriations, who say what is the constitution
