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HUMAN ODDITY

DIES IN OHIO

Christian Schlottbeck Lived Sixty-five Years With a Bone in His Heart.

In spite of the fact that a bone had grown in his heart and that other bones were growing in his lungs and liver Christian Schlottbeck of Dayton Ohio, lived to be 65 years old. He had been afflicted with heart disease for forty years, and at times his heart would stop beating for a full minute. He died suddenly in the course of one of these attacks.

The circumstances of Schlottbeck's disease and death were such as to cause Doctor May Morgan, a woman physician, to determine upon an autopsy. This was held with the assistance of Doctors Mattos and Scott, and it was then that the discovery was made that Schlottbeck had a bone in his heart.

The general condition of the heart was most peculiar. The bone was not a foreign particle projected into the heart by reason of a fracture or anything like that. It was a substance that had grown inside the cavity and become ossified. It was also found that one of the ventricles or posterior cavities of the heart was connected with the right auricle in such a manner as to make one long cavity without any division. A part of the bony or granular substance had become ossified and was as hard as a stone. The lungs and liver were also discovered to be affected and the granular or bony substances were found in these organs as well. A knife blade tapped on the foreign substance produced a metallic sound.

How the patient lived with these conditions prevailing is puzzling physicians. The case is regarded as remarkable. The deceased was a well known business man twenty-five years ago.
