THE AMATEUR WARRIORS

LAST NIGHTS EXERCISES ON THE PARADE GROUND.

The Full Glory of the Military Display Seen on the Streets of the City.

The evolutions on the parade ground Wednesday evening were at times quite stirring. The troops were formed in battalions facing east, the officers from majors up being mounted.

Then with the two regimental bands they marched around the parade ground past the group of officers at the reviewing stand, where they were reviewed by Adj. Gen. Gantenbein.

The battalion made a brave array as it marched past, the infantry followed by the two squadrons of cavalry, and Battery A with four guns bringing up the rear.

Then there was an impromptu act not down on the bills. The people toward the south end made a break across the parade ground as soon as the battery had passed and were out in the field by hundreds before they were noticed by the officers, who were watching the troops. Then four or five mounted officers detached themselves from the group and charged down the field ordering every one off of the parade ground. There was a grand scattering and the people got off much quicker than they got on.

A few moments later the cavalry and artillery came down the field on the trot and back up the east side, keeping up a fair formation in spite of all the inequalities of the ground. Then wheeling, they came down again on the run and passed the reviewing officers at full speed. This was a decidedly blood-stirring exhibition and was well worth going out to see.

But the most beautiful incident of the day takes place immediately after the firing of the sunset gun. Then the flag is lowered. The officers stand uncovered and the band, drawn up near the flag staff, plays "The Star Spangled Banner" as Old Glory sinks slowly down, to be received in careful hands before it touches the earth. The American who can witness the scene untouched would better discard the name, for he hasn't the seed of patriotism in him.

Chaplain Pratt was in his place, and the way he sat his steed as though plastered into the saddle showed that he is by no means unacquainted with the equestrian part of his duties.

The Street Parade.
The business parts of State and Commercial streets presented a Fourth of July appearance this forenoon. Flags and bunting began to show up about 8 o'clock and by the time the troops arrived nearly all of the business houses were decorated.

People began to gather on the streets by nine o'clock and the sidewalks were soon blocked with thousands of citizens waiting to catch a glimpse of the finest military pageant ever seen in Oregon.

It was about half past ten o'clock when the approach of the brigade was heralded by the music of the regimental bands. The line of march was as follows: coming in on Winter street to Court; east on Court to Capitol; south to State; west to Commercial; north to Chemeketa; east to Winter and back to camp.

The procession extended from the Capitol to Commercial street, a full half mile and was a sight never equalled in this city, and probably not soon to be seen again.

BODY RECOVERED.

Remains of Roy C. Gage Found Several Miles Down the River.
The body of Roy C. Gage, of Portland, of Company C, Third Regiment, who was drowned last Sunday while bathing in the river was recovered last evening about 7 miles down the river.

As the steamer Ruth came up last evening the Captain discovered the body in the water about ¼ mile from Simon's landing and 100 yards above the wing dam. The body was fastened to the bank, and on arriving in Salem General Beebe was notified.

Later in the evening Major Whitney, brigade surgeon, and Captain Clothier, of Company C, accompanied by A. M. Clough, undertaker, drove down with an express wagon to a point near where the body was found, and procuring a boat brought it ashore. The body was brought to this city and now lies at the Rigdon & Clough undertaking establishment.

The father and brother of the unfortunate young man are in the city and they will take the remains to Portland by boat tomorrow morning, for burial.

Coroner Lane after acquainting himself with the particulars of the drowning did not consider an inquest in any way necessary and none will be held.

AT OREGON'S CAPITOL

GOVERNOR GEER AND BRIDE TENDERED A MAGNIFICENT RECEPTION.

A Brilliant Affair Managed By Oregon's Prominent Society People—Military Officers Lend Splendor to the Occasion.

The reception tendered Governor Geer and his bride at the supreme court rooms in the capitol building last evening was one of the most brilliant events in the social history of the state of Oregon. The apartments where the event was held were probably never before so beautifully and so elaborately decorated as upon this occasion, and the magnificent assemblage of guests appeared in a wealth of dress and jewels that would have done credit to the most fashionable centre of our land. Salem has not seen so elaborate a society function in a score or more of years if ever before in her history. The hundreds of guests who were present to do honor to their chief executive and the first lady of the state vied with each other in their efforts to make this the great social event of the hour, and so completely were their efforts rewarded that this fete will go down in the annals of our social history as the greatest of its kind.

The Governor appeared at his best, dressed in conventional black, while the lady at his side was easily distinguishable by her charming presence as the one in whose honor the intelligence, wealth and fashion of Oregon's capital city had come together. Together they were indeed a handsome, stately couple. Mrs. Geer rivals her husband in being tall, and is of excellent figure.

The court room upon this occasion was elaborately decorated with ferns, clematis, jasmine, and some branches of drooping birch were used with good effect. The bar of the court was a veritable bank of conservatory plants, and cut sweet peas of the most delicate shades. Palms lent a stately effect about the room, and all was supplemented with some magnificent bouquets of roses. The thousand or more guests were presented to Governor and Mrs. Geer at the left of the entrance to the court room, ex-Governor and Mrs. Moody having the honor of introducing all comers. They were in turn presented to Secretary of State and Mrs. F. L. Dunbar, State Treasurer and Mrs. C. S. Moore, Chief Justice and Mrs. R. S. Bean, Associate Justice and Mrs. E. A. Moore, Associate Justice and Mrs. C. E. Wolverton, Attorney-General and Mrs. D. R. N. Blackburn, State Supt. and Mrs. J. H. Ackerman, State Printer and Mrs. W. H. Leeds. The south wall of the room, under which the presentation took place, was draped with immense flags, and "Old Glory" formed an appropriate background for the occasion.

Those giving the reception were assisted by Mr. and Mrs. William Brown, Mayor and Mrs. C. P. Bishop, Judge and Mrs. R. P. Boies, Judge and Mrs. B. F. Bonham, Judge and Mrs. Geo. H. Burnett, Judge and Mrs. J. J. Murphy, Mrs. Theodosia Downing, Hon. and Mrs. L. L. Patterson, Hon. and Mrs. Phil Metchan, Hon. and Mrs. Edward Hirsch, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Gray, Mr. and Mrs. Claud Gatch, all of whom rendered great assistance in making it pleasant for the throng of visitors. [The reception continued from 9 to 11 o'clock, and it was midnight before most of the people were out of the building. Sweet music was discoursed during the evening by Geier's orchestra, from the judges' platform.]

After passing through the court room proper, the guests were ushered into the private office of the chief justice, where they were treated liquid refreshments by a committee of young ladies. Misses Edna Price and Carrie Ackermann were in charge of the punch bowl and were assisted by Miss Ethel Knight, Miss Helen Calbreath, Miss Keene, Miss Ackermann, Miss LaBlanche Belle, and Miss Booth, of McMinnville. From this room the guests passed into the corridor.

One of the features lending brilliancy to the occasion, and which might have remained visitors of court life at a European capital, was the presence of a large number of state military officers in uniforms and bearing side arms, all vying with each other to do honor to their commander-in-chief.

All credit and the thanks of the community are due to the ladies who conceived and carried out to its successful conclusion this most charming social function of the declining century.

Mrs. Geer was elegantly attired in a gown of silver gray foulard, trimmed in elegant applique of rich black lace. The waist was decorated with black velvet ribbon, and was cut high. At her left stood Mrs. Z. F. Moody, very stately in black silk. Mrs. Dunbar wore a richly embroidered cream over old rose silk. Mrs. Moore wore black lace draped over silk. The wives of the supreme court justices each wore black silk. Mrs. Bean's dress was trimmed in white satin with black lace. Mrs. Moore carried an exquisite bouquet tied with cerise ribbon. Mrs. Blackburn, wife of the attorney-general, was the object of many admiring words, as she, so lovely in her costly black silk, with her crown of silver hair so proudly stood by her husband's side during the reception. Mrs. Ackerman wore a lovely silk, and lace, trimmed with electric blue satin. The ladies of the reception committee were very fine costumes, all of them, and as they mingled with the uniforms and full dress suits of the officers and citizens present, the whole presented a brilliant scene.
