OUR NEWPORT LETTER.

Camp Life at Yachina Bay Where the Breakers Meet and Fubius Is King.

NEWPORT, July 12.—We came over here on the 10th for a few weeks' outing as has been our custom for many years. There are three worlds, the land and the sea and the other world, and it seems a pity to live within a day's journey of the ocean and know nothing of it. So we pack our household effects that are indispensable, secure a kind neighbor's aid to feed the cats, check the bulldog and the baby wagon, and betake ourselves to Newport, the popular resort for all valley people. The train from Albany runs over in about four hours and after we pass Summit Station, we soon smell the sea breeze and begin to batten on our wraps. At Yachina the faithful little steamer is waiting to take us for a sail down the bay to the city with the grand and aristocratic name.

Our arrival is not heralded by the band. A single toot of the steam whistle brings all the movable population of the town to the landing. A long line has been erected to keep anyone from crowding to the edge of the wharf. The crowd gets up as close as they can, and a few stretch their hands through the fence to greet particular friends, fellow's girl or some man's second wife, cousin, or some one of a more remote degree of consanguinity. My old friend, Capt. Allison, was there, Capt. Ball, and Mr. Whittier, who hailed our baggage to the cottage for a dollar. After we had another man offered to haul it up for 50 cents, but he was not at the dock. My Democratic friend, Healy, the former postmaster, went to Sumpter and struck it rich, having made a fortune in real estate. His predecessor, Mr. Hampton, is his successor, and he is as good a fisherman as he is a salmon-fisherman, or a deep-sea fisherman. The man who can fill a barrel with silver-sides or codfish quicker than Hampton has got to be born that way. He can never acquire the art. By the way, are not all fisherman born? My boys have not yet learned to hold a line with the old man of the family, but are making rapid progress, and one of them skunked me two years ago with fly rod on the Sautin.

It was a great comfort to find our cottage on Olson's Bay all secured as clean as the deck of a man of war, a fire in the stove, the teakettle singing, the housecleaning blooming at the window, a gorgeous bouquet on the front room table and plenty of clean sweet hay for our bedding. We arrive at seven and must unpack, make up our beds, get supper, and ask a great many questions about the neighborhood. A seven story appetite and twelve hour sleep are not wanting. What has happened in two years? We went east for our vacation last year. None of our neighbor cottagers are in yet. The Grossmans of Portland are here, but we cannot find their relatives are to have their cottage. Mr. Bozorth's family, Frank Waters, Mrs. Shelly Morgan, and other Salemites are to be here soon, and we shall not be long in finding them.

There are a number of cottages to be had here, but of course people must know what to bring to enjoy such an outing. Some old scraps of carpet, a few curtains, a few chromes to tack on the wall will help out wonderfully. Olson's Bay addition to Newport is only 10 minutes walk from the steamer landing. It is a sheltered nook, facing southeast, warm and sunny, but protected from the northwest winds that make the unpleasant when exposed to their full force. Here on the bay it is always sunny and pleasant, the semi-circle of hills completely breaking the force of winds. The most delicate flowers grow in flower beds in this protected spot as Mrs. Bailey's and Mrs. Olsen's flower gardens fully prove. The bay is alive with fish on this side. Just outside the ell-glass there we caught this forenoon about forty pounds dressed, of the sweetest fish in the world, flounder, kelp, perch. Later we got, mackerel, rockcod, and the regular bank codfish and silver side salmon. The latter bite a troll. All are delicious eating and will keep several days. We have the freedom of a fine vegetable garden, and such delicious vegetables as grow in this mixture of sand and guano and rotted shells, can be found nowhere else in the world.

The first day we got settled and put up our tent. While the ladies and children prefer sleeping in the cottage, I like the tent for a bedroom. The perforated canvas walls day by day and at night the salt sea air wafts you to sleep. Your foot is of the choicest clover and in bloom, but only a few inches high. From out over the bar comes the booming of the breakers, where the never-ceasing surf is battering away the last vestige of the millions of dollars of jettes and harbor improvements. Only last winter the tramway on piles that reached from the south beach up to deep water on the bay was driven over to the other shore, and is being sold for stove-wood at \$1.50 a cord. It cost the taxpayers a great deal more than that before it became driftwood. High tides have carried away some of the bulk-heads and large slices of the main business street, but the bay remains and fishing is better than ever before.
