THE MILK IN THE ST. LOUIS STRIKE

COCAINUT.

One factor in the St. Louis street car strike is never referred to in the press reports, and it is really the kernel to the whole problem. That is that the various street car systems of St. Louis were consolidated under one corporation by Brown Bros., of New York, who doubled the capitalization, issued new mortgage bonds on the whole property, and cleaned up \$40,000,000 net profit on the transaction, all in a few months. The lines all passed from local control. The city of St. Louis did not even have a copy of the ordinances which passed a corrupt and truculent city council, that bartered away these franchises on the public streets, with as little ado as they would give a beggar a cup of water, while the recipients of their favors were already multi-millionaires. This is one of the beautiful possibilities of the wonderful gold standard. Every security that can be issued against a public-service franchise can be floated in the bond markets. Every bond that can be issued against a city, county, state school district, or even a quasi-public corporation can be sold. Public men and public newspapers can see no crime in Brown Bros. of New York looting the city of St. Louis of these franchises and making a clean profit of \$40,000,000. But it is a crime when labor organizes and resists the putting on of screws to make the property pay bigger dividends on the fictitious capitalization. The police must be called out to protect the robbery begun by Brown Bros. of New York. Thousands of deputies must be sworn in at public expense to enable them to perfect the lost begun in the name of capital. The governor of the state is asked to call the militia to protect the property of Brown Bros. who are probably nothing but agents of the Rothschilds. To object to these things is to be declared an enemy of capital, an agitator, an anarchist. Unless capital can pursue its own lawless career, it will not do business. It will go into hiding and shut down the mills. Yet there is nothing plainer than that the streets belong to the people, and that public-service franchises cannot become private property. If good wages cannot be paid the men employed on street car lines in large cities, the operation of which must be profitable, and where the fares are in reality a tax levied upon the industry of the masses, where can wages be maintained? The over-capitalization of the St. Louis street car lines, the alien ownership by a soulless syndicate, the fictitious and fraudulent profits exacted to pay dividends to dead capital out of the flesh and blood of the laboring masses of the people, who are the real owners of the franchise—they are the nigger in the woodpile.

ATTACKING OFFICIALISM IN ITS STRONG-HOLD.

That is what the new Democratic district attorney at Portland is doing.
