GRAND LODGES

A. O. U. W. BODIES MEET AT THE STATE HOUSE.

Attendance Large From All Parts of the State—Laws Fete This Evening.

The grand lodges of the A. O. U. W. and the Degree of Honor met at the state house this morning; the former in the supreme court room and the latter in the senate chamber.

The delegates and visitors have been arriving for a couple of days and the hotels and boarding houses of the city are filled to overflowing, and many are entertained by friends at private homes.

The committees from the local lodges whose duty it was to arrange for the reception and entertainment of the visitors, have been working like beavers, and the result is that everything is working smoothly. The committees were as follows:

A reception committee was also appointed by the Degree of Honor Lodge, as follows:

Among the arrangements made by the committees for the comfort of the visitors, is a wise provision for the daily sprinkling of State and Court streets, adjoining Willson's Avenue, which will make it much pleasanter traveling to and from the capitol.

The lawn fete this evening at the upper end of Wilson avenue promises to be a very pleasant affair. A large tent and smaller booths have been placed on the grounds and refreshments will be served. The general public is invited to come and enjoy the music and social intercourse, and if non-members wish to partake of the refreshments they may do so for the usual charge. There will be a band concert during the evening in the band stand, which was recently removed from its old location to a position further east.

Today's Proceedings. The session opened this morning about 10 o'clock with an open meeting in the supreme court room. A pleasant address of welcome was delivered by J. H. Ackerman, state school superintendent, to which W. M. Colvig, of Jackson county, happily responded. Supreme Master Workman W. A. Walker, of Wisconsin, was present and also addressed the meeting.

After this the grand bodies assembled in a closed session and conferred the grand lodge degree upon such of the delegates as had not already taken it.

This evening the delegates will assemble at Hotel Willamette and will march to Wilson Avenue headed by the Salem coronet band. It is hoped to also have a bicycle parade.

After arrival at the avenue an address of Welcome will be delivered by chairman Frank Davey, to which a response will be made by Supreme Workman W. A. Walker.

The business of the grand lodges will not be concluded before tomorrow night and may require Thursday.

IMPORTANT DECISION.

Indictment by District Attorney Under New Law Held to be Constitutional.

The Oregon supreme court yesterday rendered a decision upholding the law which authorizes district attorneys to present indictments without the intervention of a grand jury. The constitutionality of the act passed by the last legislature on this subject, was attacked in the case of the State of Oregon against Henry Tucker, tried before Judge Robert Eakin in Union county. Judge Wolverton wrote the opinion of the supreme court and in a very learned discussion of fundamental principles of constitutional liberty, holds that a law abolishing or modifying grand juries is not in contravention of the constitution of this state nor of the United States.

It was contended in behalf of Tucker that, having been indicted by the district attorney instead of by the grand jury, he had been denied those rights guaranteed by the constitutional provision that a man shall not be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. Upon this question the supreme court holds that a change in the process is not a denial of the process of law, that so long as the defendant is given proper notice of the crime committed, is given an opportunity to defend himself and to have counsel and witnesses in his behalf, the constitution has been complied with. In this case all these privileges were granted.

It was also contended that the new mode of presenting indictments is not authorized by the state constitution which provides that the legislature may modify or abolish grand juries. It was contended that the legislature neither modified nor abolished the grand jury. The court holds, however, that the change made is in the nature of a modification and is therefore authorized.

This decision of the supreme court will result in a considerable saving of money to the taxpayers in those counties where criminal proceedings are conducted by honest and economical prosecuting attorneys.

ANOTHER RUNAWAY.

Miss Bertha Clough Injured by Jumping From Carriage.

The beautiful little bay team of A. M. Clough ran away this morning, and Miss Bertha Clough was injured by jumping from the carriage.

The team started from the O. R. & N. dock, where Mr. Clough left them for a moment while Miss Bertha, aged 15, and Mona aged 13, sat in the carriage, the latter holding the lines. The boat's whistle startled the horses and they swung around, when Miss Mona became frightened, dropped the lines and sprang out. The horses then ran away, and Miss Bertha jumped out, after they had got under headway, striking on her forehead. She was considerably bruised and was in a dazed condition for some time.

The team ran to State street and followed Sunday to the penitentiary gate where they were captured.

The defendant is therefore ordered to convey to a receiver appointed by the court his said one-fourth interest in said patent, the same to be sold for the benefit of plaintiff. W. H. Hobson was appointed receiver.
