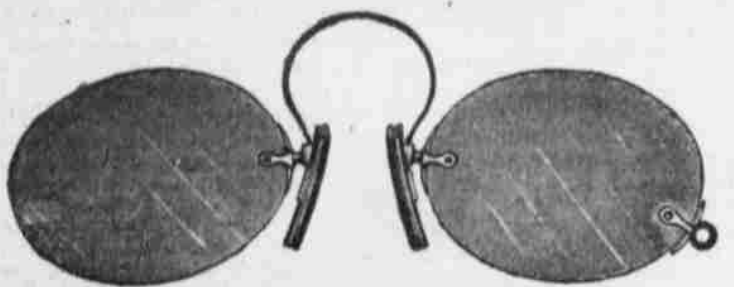

A SUCCESSFUL AFFAIR

THE WILSON AVENUE ENTERTAINMENT OF THE A. G. U. W. VISITORS.

Grand Lodges Hard At Work Today. City Full of Visitors From All Over the State.

Nearly two hundred delegates to the grand bodies of the Workmen order beside a great number of visitors drawn hither by the meeting gives the city the appearance of being full of strangers. The hotels are over-taxed. The huge Willamette is full to overflowing, and Landlord Staiger and others have been rustling for rooms wherever they could find them.

Tuesday's proceedings put the bodies in running order and a great amount of work has been cleaned up today. D. C. Herren, P. G. M., was yesterday elected to the vacancy in the office of grand overseer. Wm. J. Clarke, of Gervais, was appointed reading clerk of the grand lodge.

The ladies' branch of the order did business yesterday in the Senate chamber with a facility equaling that of the other body.

Nellie Folsom was appointed reading clerk, Carrie Shaw document clerk, and Mrs. Kate J. Young press reporter. Routine business was transacted until 5 p. m., and adjournment was taken to 9 a. m.

Tuesday Evening.
The entertainment of the visitors Tuesday evening was unique in conception and very successful in execution. About 8 o'clock the delegates gathered at the Willamette hotel. The Salem band furnished several pieces of music and Albert Shaw gave an exhibition of trick bicycle riding.

A procession was then formed, with the band in the lead, the lady delegates of the Degree of Honor next, and the Workmen following in a double column. Marching up State street to Willson Avenue the crowd dispersed itself over the lawn and in the large refreshment tent. Many hundreds of the general public turned out, and there were probably a thousand people on the ground. The band played and the delegates filled up the tables in the tent and were served with ice cream, cake, etc., by the ladies of the Salem lodge.

Then the assembly was called to order by Frank Davey, who in his usual happy style, welcomed the visitors on behalf of the Salem lodges.

He introduced Supreme Master Workman W. A. Walker, of Wisconsin, who responded in a manner which highly pleased his auditors. He knows how to give taffy, and he spread it on with a trowel, not but what his encomiums on the Oregon grand lodge, the city, the climate and the beautiful young ladies were fully deserved. He also knows how to toot the horn of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, and he did it in a humorous but earnest manner, and without saying anything in the least disagreeable about any other order or system of insurance. He was liberally applauded.

Chairman Davey then introduced Mrs. Mamie Briggs, of the Dalles, Past Chief of Honor who made an extremely pleasant little talk which was received with every evidence of appreciation by her audience. This ended the formal program. The tent was thrown open to the public, and many availed themselves of the opportunity to partake of the delicious refreshments served by the ladies. Outside booths had also been arranged where soda water, etc., was sold.

A general social time was enjoyed by the crowd until a late hour. The weather was very pleasant, and the grassy lawn was an excellent place for visiting. And there were plenty of heavy shadows for the young people.

The active lady members of the Salem lodges in charge of the tent and refreshments, as usual, did careful, excellent work, and a vast amount of it. Their efforts are never in vain, and they are always put forth with a free heart and hand.

The forenoon's session of the grand lodge was principally taken up with general discussions of the questions coming up for decision. No revolutionary action of any kind was taken. The Workmen have raised the per capita tax on subordinates lodges from \$1.75 to \$1.80 per year, payable monthly. The Degree of Honor left the per capita tax at \$1.

Election of officers was set for 2 p. m. today, too late for this paper to publish results.

ALL ABOUT NOME CITY

A BREEZY INTERVIEW WITH A RETURNING VICTIM.

Uncle Billy Wright Tells What He Saw Up There, And It Was Anything But Good—Glad to Be Back in Oregon.

Wm. Wright—better known to every man, woman and child, and dog in Salem, as "Uncle Billy," has returned from Cape Nome, and to say that he is happy wouldn't half do justice to the job. He smiled clear around to the back of his neck, and almost cried for joy as he related his wonderful tale. It's a plain unvarnished tale, by the way, that will interest everyone who wants to know the facts about the new North country.

The party had a good trip up on the steamer Nome City. It was crowded, but treatment was pretty good everything considered. They were three days in the ice, "the finest refrigerator I ever saw, and a cooler atmosphere than I expect to find either side of eternity," remarked the facetious Billy. The steamer reaped two wrecks going up, and enjoyed the privilege of being rescued from a similar fate on her return.

Billy only spent nine days at Nome, "long enough, too," as he expressed it. At home by the way, Uncle Billy spends his time grinding scissors, selling horse radish, and otherwise sharpening up the tools, wits and appetites of the natives. He regretted very much that he didn't take along a good supply of horse radish, for it was about the only thing there wasn't plenty of unless it was gold, and his fortune would have been made. The beach is lined with white tents for sixteen miles, the length of Main street, and as much further as you care to imagine. All the way up the sailors and men employed on the steamer talked up the wonderful gold prospects enthusiastically that the sailors and other employees were worked up to fever heat to get a grab at it, and all decided to quit, but most of them learned so much in a few days there that they were glad to be taken back for return trip. Billy says he looked with all his might for nine days for opportunity to improve his fortunes, and then was glad to be able to get return passage without having to mortgage his shirt. As the Nome City was about to pull out on her return trip, Billy accented the captain.

"Cap, I'm here without money and want to get home."

"Just put on your truck and come along," was the unexpected response, and Uncle Billy worked his passage home, as wiser if not wealthier man.

When he left the steamer at Seattle the Captain bid him good bye, and told him if he were ever about when the Nome City was about to take a trip to consider his passage as good as paid. Mr. Wright is about \$125 out, but thinks the experience was cheap.

He says there are thousands of the best people in the world up at Nome, and some that are not so good. There is good order everywhere, unless you go into the tough neighborhoods, and there they register about a murder a day. The better class there help each other like saints and try to make the best of their luck. He estimates that fully a million dollars' worth of machinery of all sorts is piled up on the beach that will never be used for anything, and that it will eventually sink in the sand.

He estimates that over a hundred preachers are up there, but very few of them are making any use of their religion, or working at their trade, as it were. He says that he needed all that he had, and brought back what he had left. When asked "What did you learn, Uncle Billy?" he responded: "I learned that I was a d-d fool, and that's worth a good deal to a man, but you don't use it to feed the babies."

He says the water is fairly good in summer, very cold, right off the ice, but they claim it is poisoned by the moose roots as soon as the rains begin.

He reports the Salem boys doing as well as the average, but that is mighty poorly. He saw John Kaiser out with his pan working a few hours before he left, well and happy. Gun Kaiser had a touch of fever. Thomas Holman was well. He had just taken a sea bath, the coldest on record, and said he enjoyed it. Holman will return this fall. Charley Wolz was fat as ever. John Morelock had been sick, but was well when Wright left. Mrs. D. L. Fiester was in good spirits, and expected to make a fortune in the restaurant and laundry business. Mrs. Nichol's hospital has a good location, and some patients.

worked, and worked again, while on the creeks the ground has all been staked for miles and miles, and probably has some rich spots. On Anvil Creek Mr. Wright saw four men clean up \$3480 after fifteen hours' work, and he had the gold in his hands. He made application for work there, and was offered \$5 a day and board, but refused it, as it will not pay to work for less than \$10 and board. The best beach digging he saw was \$9 for a half day's work. Mr. Gwynn and two others took out 17 pennyweights in one day, worth about \$16. Beach digging, he says, will yield all the way from that down to nothing, but mostly the latter.
