GRAND OFFICERS ELECTED

There is already a sentiment among the eastern members in favor of Portland, and it is hoped that the meeting can be secured.

The Degree of Honor did not reach the installation of officers before the noon adjournment, and the ceremony was set for 1 o'clock.

OREGON EDUCATOR DEAD.

Prof. J. M. Powell, of Monmouth, Passes Away After Short Illness.

J. M. Powell, professor of mathematics at the State Normal School, Monmouth, died yesterday morning after an illness of three days. Professor Powell had been a resident of Monmouth for 20 years and a teacher in the Normal School since its establishment.

He was well known all over the state and was at one time a teacher in the State Reform school. He was in Salem last week in his usual health, but was taken sick on Sunday.

He was a member of the Odd Fellows, Woodmen and Fraternal Union. He leaves a wife and two children.

The funeral was held this afternoon, and was attended by a number of Salem acquaintances of the deceased.
