THE CHINESE PROBLEM.

W. T. Stead cables from London to the Journal and Advertiser. The Pope is said to have remarked as he saw the Italian troops departing for the far East, that this was the first war since the Crusades in which all nations had united to make war for the Christian cause.

The allusion is more apt than felicitous, for the struggle between the East and West, which began when steel-clad Europe hurled itself upon the Pymhordes which defied the Holy Sepulchre, lasted for over 400 years, and at the end of that prolonged death-grapple of continents, the combatants were left face to face, very much as they were at the beginning.

It is to be hoped that we are not on the verge of another 400 years' war, at the other end of the Asiatic continent. The gravity of the crisis in China hitherto has never been realized, even faintly, in Europe. Otherwise England would have long ago patched up any kind of a truce in South Africa, and at the end of that prolonged death-grapple of continents, the combatants were left face to face, very much as they were at the beginning.

The fact is that the white world is face to face with a determined effort, by no means confined to China, on the part of the colored races, to assert their rights to live their own ways, without the perpetual bullying of pale-faces. The colored races have awakened to the fact that the supremacy of the white man is due to no inherent superiority, but solely to the fact that he has superior weapons. Hence the Chinese have provided themselves with the best artillery and magazine rifles, and have employed expert instructors.

Lord Wolsey told me long ago he considered the Chinese the most long-lived material in the world. They were better, even than the Russians, because the Russian soldiers drink, whereas the Chinese are the most abstemious of men. The destruction of the legations, however, terrible as it may seem to be, was nevertheless natural. It was the result and inevitable corollary of the rise of the Taku forts and the massacre of the garrison. Human nature is much the same all the world over, and if we had been in a similar position, the white men would have acted much the same as their yellow-skinned brothers.

Christianity may be stamped out of China as completely as 300 years ago it was stamped out of Japan.

A FAIR STATEMENT OF THE ALLEGED PROSPERITY.

The Dallas Times-Mountain. The claim that the country is generally more prosperous than it has been for years is both true and false. Certain classes have felt the wave of prosperity; the railroads, the manufacturers that are in the combine, and large banking concerns for instance, and also some lines of agriculture are paying well, as a rule the wage earner has not enjoyed the greatest degree of prosperity. Were it so, it would not be possible for the street car lines in St. Louis to at once fill the places of the thousands of strikers. Were laborers generally employed there would not have been idle men to take the places of the strikers.

Lawyers and Laborers Oppose Expansion; Doctors, Preachers, and Merchants

The New York Herald and San Francisco Call have made a canvass of the expansion sentiment in the United States. To make this unbiased and unpartisan fifty citizens from each large city have been interviewed as follows:

Business men interviewed 175; for expansion 95; against expansion 80; non-committal, 16.
Physicians interviewed 124; for expansion 74; against expansion 43; non-committal, 7.

Labor men interviewed 147; for expansion 34; against expansion 111; non-committal, 2.
Lawyers interviewed 146; for expansion 54; against expansion 73; non-committal, 19.

Clergymen interviewed, 116; for expansion 60; against expansion 32; non-committal, 24.
Unclassified interviewed, 18; for expansion 9; against expansion 8; non-committal, 1.

Whole number representative voters interviewed, 726; for expansion 324; against expansion, 333; non-committal, 69.

What is practically the poll of the United States on the question of expansion and imperialism is herewith presented.

Through their correspondents in fifteen leading cities the Herald and Call interviews with five distinctive classes of representative voters — business-men, lawyers, physicians, clergymen, and laboring men. The result shows that businessmen seem to favor expansion. Physicians favor expansion. Clergymen excepting Roman Catholics, who are non-committal, favor expansion. Lawyers oppose expansion. Laboring men almost unanimously oppose expansion.

A slight majority of the whole number interviewed are opposed to expansion; and imperialism as illustrated by the McKinley administration. A fair proportion realizing the gravity of the question, have as yet come to no decisive opinion. Every effort has been made to have the poll in every respect unbiased.

The politics of men interviewed have been left entirely out of the question, for it was realized that there are many republicans who do not by any means agree with the McKinley policy and many democrats who approve of the retention of the Philippines.

It was found that as a class lawyers, accustomed to delving deep into questions before drawing a conclusion, were opponents of expansion. The labor interest too, in many cities was found to be a unit against the imperialistic course of the administration.

Of the friends of expansion a majority are found among business men, clergy men and physicians, but in no case, except in the labor class is the dividing line drawn sharply and distinctly.

The interviews were obtained in the following fifteen cities: Atlanta, Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Denver, Galveston, Memphis, Milwaukee, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Savannah, St. Louis and St. Paul.

Will Search for Andrew. London, July 20.—News has been received here that the polar expedition organized in Switzerland to go in search of Lord Amundsen, the polar explorer, will start from Spitzbergen on July 26. There will be for persons in the party of whom Captain Earnest Andre, brother of the aeronaut, will be the recognized leader. It will take about a year and a half to make the trip.
