THE MYSTERY OF CHINESE NAMES

Ladle's Weekly. The mysterious names appearing in the Chinese dispatches become familiar enough when translated, thus: Tung means east; si, west; nan, south; pei, north; while tain, kin, or king stands for capital or metropolis, as in Peking (northern capital) and Nankin (southern capital). Tien means heaven, so Tien-tsin signifies heavenly metropolis. Ho or kiang means river, so Pei-ho is north river; Sh-kiang, west river. Che means seven, so Che-kiang is seven rivers. Shan is mountain, and Shan-tung, east mountain, and Shan-si, west mountain. Pai is white, and Pia-shan, white mountain. Hai is sea, and kwan stands for gate, so Hai-kwan, the maritime customs, is gate of the sea, and Shan-hai-kwan, mountain and sea gate. Shang is a city, and Shang-hai, city by the sea. Hoang is yellow; Hoang-ho, Yellow river, and Hoang-Hai, Yellow sea. Yang means ocean, and Tse, son; hence, the Yang-tse river is son of the ocean, and Tien-tse, son of heaven, the emperor. Ku or kow is a mouth or pass, and Ta, big or great, so Ta-ku means big mouth, of Pei-Ho, while Nan-kow stands for south pass (from Mongolia). Hu is a lake; ling, a hill; hsiang, a village; hsien, a

tax district. Fu is a prefecture; tai, a governor; too a circuit or group of administrative departments; so tao-tai is a governor of a circuit, and fu-tai is a governor of a prefecture. Chao or kao is a bridge; li, a Chinese mile; pa, eight, and thus Pa-li-kiao is the eight-mile-bridge. Chao or chow is a depot or stopping place; hence Tung-chow, eastern (depot of Peking). Shen is a province, and Shen-si is the western province. Yamen is a police station or official residence, and Hui, a secret society or club. T'ing means pure or clear, so Ta'ing-kiang is clear river, while Ta'ing means great pure (name of present dynasty), and Kwo being a kingdom or empire, Ta-T'ing Kwo signifies the empire of the great pure (China). Ta Mei-Ka is the name applied by the Chinese to the United States, and means great America.

BURNED TO DEATH NEAR SPRINGWATER

OREGON CITY, Or., July 21.—Mrs. Habelt, an elderly woman living near Springwater, lost her life in a burning home yesterday. Two sons returning home found the house burned, and their mother a short distance away with her clothes burned off.

MINISTERS UNHARMED

Such Are the Reports From Chinese Official Sources

INSURGENTS KILLING EACH OTHER TIEN TSIN BEING EVACUATED

Attempt to Seize Vessel Carrying Li Hung Chang-- France Demands Satisfaction Before Mediation.

By Associated Press to the Journal. WASHINGTON, July 21.—The Chinese Minister communicated to the secretary of state this morning two important telegrams. The first was from Sheng, director of telegraphs in Shanghai, and says: "It is fortunate that Conger's reply has come. An imperial decree of the 22d, this noon (July 18) states that all the ministers are safe. The insurgents are fighting and killing each other."

TIEN TSING IS EVACUATED. According to an edict of the 22nd this noon (July 18), all the ministers, for whom strenuous efforts are being made for protection, are unharmed.

TRYING TO CAPTURE PRINCE LI HUNG CHANG

By Associated Press to the Journal. SHANGHAI, Friday, July 20.—The British cruiser Bonaventure left Woo Sung this morning. It is reported, to seize the steamer Au Ping, with Li Hung Chang on board.

WHAT ENGLAND THINKS ABOUT IT

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, July 21.—The announcement of the British cruiser Bonaventure's departure from Woo Sung, as alleged in pursuit of Li Hung Chang, comes somewhat as a surprise, but confirmation of the news will meet the approval of a large majority, as Li Hung Chang's present attitude is regarded as being characteristically dubious.

TERMS OF MEDIATION NAMED BY FRANCE

By Associated Press to the Journal. PARIS, July 21.—At a council of min-

isters today Delcasse read the telegram from the emperor of China asking the mediation of France with the foreign powers. The reply given by Delcasse was that the request be considered only on absolute knowledge that efficacious protection and absolute freedom of communication has been assured between the French minister at Peking and his colleagues of the diplomatic corps and their respective governments.

TROOPS TO MOVE ON PEKIN AUG. 15

By Associated Press to the Journal. WASHINGTON, July 21.—The secretary of the navy received a message from Admiral Remy, this afternoon, in response to instructions to urge every effort for the relief of the ministers at Peking. It is understood that Remy says a strong expedition, composed of representatives of all powers, will start from Tien Tsien on August 15, for the rescue of the foreigners imprisoned at the Chinese capital.

Brig-General James H. Wilson, who is now in Cuba, has been ordered to report to General Chiffre for duty in China.

BRAVE FRENCHMEN RAN AWAY

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, July 21.—The Daily Express has received the following from Tien Tsien, dated July 18: "The casualties in three days fighting before the native city of Tien Tsien exceeded 1000. It is now certain that there were several Russians and Frenchmen fighting on the Chinese side. The Chinese killed their own women by the wholesale to prevent them falling into the hands of the Russians. Yesterday the whole native city was in flames, and the stench of the burning of thousands of corpses was unspcakably horrible."

UNITED STATES OUTLINES A POLICY

CHICAGO, July 21.—A special to the Times-Herald, from Washington, says: As a result of several cabinet meetings the policy of the United States concerning the great world's crisis in China is fully and definitely decided upon. The substance of this policy is as follows: 1. The United States will under no circumstances join in the partition of China among the powers.

FURTHER PROOF OF DUPLICITY

By Associated Press to the Journal. SHANGHAI, July 21.—According to Sheng, administrator of telegraphs, most of the telegrams received previous to the one from Conger to the state department at Washington, took a week in transmission from Peking. The date of Conger's message is therefore regarded here as a further proof of the Chinese duplicity.

Burning of Tien Tsien. New York, July 21.—A dispatch to the World from Che Foo, says:

It is reported that after the allied armies recaptured the native city of Tien Tsien last Saturday, their shells set fire to the town. The Chinese, before they fled, killed all their own wounded, it is reported, in order to prevent their falling into the foreigners' hands.

Native Chinese here state that there are in and around Peking at least 300,000 Chinese troops and that the Boxers are armed with the best and most modern weapons. From all sources come the same tidings, that the Boxers have enormous supplies of modern arms and ammunition.

Special stress is laid by Tuan's Generals on the opportunity the troops will have of seizing women. The story receives the fullest credence of the Europeans here.

SILVER FUSION

THE THREE PARTIES GET TOGETHER IN IDAHO

Populists and Democrats Agree on Apportionment of Officers--Populists Virtually Accept the Terms.

By Associated Press to the Journal. POCATELLO, Idaho, July 21.—Indications now are that the proposed fusion between the three Silver parties will be effected. The populists this morning instructed its conference committee to meet again with the others. Though the ultimatum was not received when the Democratic convention met its committee offered the apportionment of officers which the Populists rejected. The convention instructed the committee to stand pat. The Populists demand two more pieces, but have abandoned the plan to secure control of the state boards.

CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

By Associated Press to the Journal. TACOMA, Wash., July 21.—S. Z. Mitchell, general manager, and F. L. Dame, general superintendent of the Tacoma Street Railway company has been formally charged with manslaughter as a result of the Fourth of July street car accident in which over 40 lives were lost.

FOUR SURVIVORS OF THE PILOT BOAT

By Associated Press to the Journal. SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—The steamer Wellington today brought into port a crew of four men from the pilot boat Bonita, which went down near Farallones this morning, as a result of being struck by a whale last night.

TWO FRENCHMEN FIGHT A DUEL

PEACEFUL IN CUBA

More Troops Will be Withdrawn Soon.

UPRISING WHICH DID NOT COME

Secretary of War Receives Proof of Plot for Seizing Manila in June--and Seizing Arms and Ammunition.

By Associated Press to the Journal. WASHINGTON, July 21.—General Wood, Governor General of Cuba, had a conversation today with the Secretary War with the result that it was determined to keep a force of about 5,000 men in Cuba for several months yet.

General Wood says that peace and quiet is prevailing in Cuba, and troops are kept there simply for moral influence.

The secretary of war has been furnished with copies of documents which contained details of the plot arranged, evidently early in June, to excite an uprising in Manila. The plan contemplated an attack upon the force in city and seizure of arms and ammunition.

FISHERMEN AND STRIKERS FIGHT

Fifty strikers followed in small boats, attacked the patrol tugs and engaged in a hand-to-hand fight with the officers. No one was armed, but the fish-
