SCHOOL LOAN

Nearly Two-Thirds Taken Before 2 O'clock Today.

Over \$6,000 of new subscriptions for the popular 4-per cent school loan had come in today up to 2 p. m. If any one wants a slice of this loan he would better not put it off. FLETCHER CASE DISMISSED.

Not Responsible for the Death of Mrs. Hatch of Forest Grove.

At Hillsboro, last week the demurrer to the complaint in the case of John Hatch, a minor, against S. W. Fletcher, of McCoy, for \$8000 damages, was argued in the circuit court. This is the case which resulted from the death of Anna C. Hatch, of Forest Grove, and the plaintiff contended that Fletcher was responsible for her death, and he had been actually damaged in the sum of \$8000, and asked for \$6000, additional, as vindictive damages.

The attorneys for Fletcher contended that no cause of action existed; that if any wrong was done to Mrs. Hatch, it was with her consent, and that in such cases the law does not provide a right of action in an heir or administrator. It is claimed that if any cause of action existed it abated with the death of Mrs. Hatch, the court sustained the demurrer, and stating that the case did not admit of amendment, dismissed the action. Fletcher, voluntarily appeared in the action.

The Gray Funeral.

The funeral of the late Geo. W. Gray took place from the residence on State street at 3 p. m. this afternoon, under the auspices of Salem Lodge No. 4, A. F. & A. M., Chemeketa Lodge No. 1, I. O. O. F. also attending in a body. The attendance was very large. The honorary pall bearers are A. Bush, Prof. T. M. Gatch of Corvallis; Ex-Gov. Z. F. Moody, Geo. P. Littlefield, Ed. Hirsch and Dr. C. H. Hall. The acting pall bearers are Chief Justice R. S. Bean, Dr. W. H. Byrd, I. L. Patterson, John Alberts, Geo. H. Burnett and Dr. W. D. McNary.

The stores of the city were closed from 2 to 4 o'clock p. m. out of respect for the ex-mayor and highly respected member of the community. A more extended notice of the funeral will appear in tomorrow's JOURNAL.

EXPLOSION AND FIRE IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, July 25.—An explosion occurred in a five story building at 125 Dearborn street. In a few minutes the building was a mass of flames. It is feared several lives are lost.

NEW YORK, July 25.—The National Republican Campaign headquarters for the eastern states were established here today in the St. James building, Twenty-sixth street and Broadway, Manhattan.

Joseph Mauley, of Maine, and Frederick Gibbs, of New York, are in charge. The headquarters are divided into two branches, oratorical and literary, and speakers will here be assigned to the several states.

FIRST RACE CONGRESS MADE.
MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 25.—The first national race congress in the history of the negro opened here today and will continue up to and including July 27.

Matters of interest to the race that have been agitated for a long time will be discussed in all their phases by men of national prominence, among them Bishop Turner, Booker T. Washington, and Prof. Council. All sections of the country are represented.

NAVAL MILITIA TAKING A CRUISE.
CHICAGO, Ill., July 25.—The United States ship Michigan arrived here this morning and took on board the Illinois Naval Militia for a seven days' cruise, under command of Lieutenant-Commander W. Winder. The first stop will be made at Milwaukee, and from there the ship will proceed to Mackinac Island, in Lake Huron.

IN DANGEROUS CONDITION.

Footwalk On the Big Steel Bridge Full of Holes and Rotten Planks.

The foot bridge across the Willamette is in a dangerous condition and should be repaired immediately or the use of it discontinued. In many places on the folk side large holes have broken through the walk and a good sized child could fall through. A well-known citizen, who has had considerable experience in bridge work in this county, remarked this morning that it was unsafe and should be condemned until repairs are made. There are also some bad places on the Marion county side that need immediate attention. If this matter is not attended to in the near future, some accident may occur that will make a large damage suit against Marion and Polk counties.

Improvement Notes.

John Murphy, proprietor of the Murphy Tile Works, is making a substantial improvement at his residence in North Salem in the shape of a water tower and system of fire protection. The tower is 75 feet in height and will be surmounted by a large windmill and a Redwood water tank of 4000 gallons capacity. This will give a good pressure and an ample supply of water for all uses about the place as well as for use in case of fire. Griewold and Chase are doing the work.

Street Commissioner Frizzell has several men at work at the crossing of Commercial and Ferry streets. He is putting down cement cross walks across each street from the Willamette hotel corner, which will be a great improvement over the old wooden ones. A cement sidewalk is also being put down by the street commissioner in front of the property on the corner, belonging to Postmaster Ed. Hirsch. The street commissioner is doing this work for Mr. Hirsch, and to Mr. Frizzell's energy and good management, is due the fact that the two jobs are being done at this time.

Mr. Aunsner is just completing a large hay barn on the five acre tract in South Salem recently bought from Mr. Finch.

Sheriff Frank Durbin is having his residence of the corner of Court and 15th streets remodeled and greatly improved.

Company's boats Altona and Pomona make regular runs each day between Salem and Portland. Freight is running light at present.

A mammoth elevator burned at Buffalo, N. Y. last night. Loss, \$750,000.

A regiment of militia was called out yesterday morning to protect the non-union fisherman on Fraser River, nearly 4000 of whom were prevented from working by 600 union strikers. No violence was offered in the presence of the troops, and the strike is regarded as broken.
