TO AMERICA AND BRITAIN.

More Taggart in the Springfield Republican. What are you doing, ye American people, in the far off islands of the sea, while your bells, sweet pealing from tower and steeple, breathe the anthem of the free?

Spilling and pouring out blood like water, fighting like beasts, in centuries gone; Spain has been humbled, and yet the slaughter and cruel slaying and strife goes on.

For ye hunt and butcher our poor brown brother, with bullets ye slaughter the great and small; While here, as there—maid, wife, and mother are crying and praying alike for all.

What are ye doing, ye hosts of Britain, in corries of one great contingent, while in another your fever-smitten perils in millions, man and woman?

O Liberty! thy torch uplifted! Shake it to all the maddened skies, and show the nations, to ruin drifting, how dear life is in heaven's eyes!

BLOODSHED WILL FOLLOW THE USE OF ARMS.

While the millennium of peace may not be realized in our age, it is certain that the maintenance of an armed state by a nation or an individual ultimately calls for bloodshed.

Out of all hurly-burly of wars the past two years still the noblest appeal to humanity was the Call's call for a peace conference.

So surely as our government persists in building up a powerful army and navy, so surely may we expect to be involved in wars and to be engaged in the shedding of human blood. The goddess of war is today beckoning us on to follow in the footsteps of all the cruel monarchies of the past, that sacrificed the best blood of their growing generations in spilling the blood of weaker nations.

THE DANGER OF POSSESSING FIREARMS.

That was a remarkable shooting affair, the case of Dr. Holmes and wife of Island City, both shot through and probably maimed for life by the accidental discharge of a pistol. The number of accidental deaths from shooting, and the number of injuries, caused by shooting of persons and animals because of unnecessary possession of guns and pistols and even airguns, is too large to boast of our high intelligence as a people. To

To make plain our understanding of the situation in China, I might carry out the simile and call the Chinese sick men. Our effort, therefore, is to cast out the evil from them and restore them to normal and healthful conditions.

It is also understood these thought-currents will so increase the sincere love and charity which Mrs. Conger, as a Christian Scientist, entertains for the Chinese that this love and charity will subdue the powers of evil that encompass her, and turn the thoughts of her enemies from rapine and slaughter and murder.

The fact that there is no disease, and that people only suffer from hallucinations or beliefs of their own minds, would tend to show that dangers and calamities are nothing but imaginings of mind."

THE WOMEN OF CHINA.

In view of the probability that China is soon to be involved in a war with the great powers of the earth, a war which will, in all likelihood, forever settle the question of Eastern or Western supremacy, civilization is beginning to ask what part the women of China may be expected to take during this great struggle. With any other nation the question might be easily answered. One could predict with certainty that the women of Russia, England, France, Germany, the United States—aye, even the gentle-souled, half-émancipated little women of Japan—would grip the swords of their husbands and lovers and send them out to battle with brave smiles and hidden tears, then courageously take up the work they lay down at home and do their best to fill the gap left by the departing warriors, contriving to send many comforts to the troops in the field as well as last dispatching Red Cross nurses to care for the sick and wounded on field and in hospital. The extraordinary service rendered by the homely, dull, unlettered Boer women has been the most impressive feature of the contest in the Transvaal. The question as to what the women of China will do can only be answered with an interrogation point.

Difficult as it is to comprehend the character of the yellow men, industrious, superstitious, thrifty, cunning, vindictive, skilled of hand, narrow and prejudiced, who make up the greater part of China's population, the women of China are a deeper riddle. Their social and domestic relations. As a rule illiterate and uneducated, wretched drudges among the poorer classes and the crippled playthings of the rich, always reckoned as inferiors and held in strict subjection to men, there seems nevertheless a delicacy of sentiment, a depth of maternal devotion, a gentleness of disposition characteristic of Chinese women which is like the blossoming of a flower struggling in sterile soil and unfolding its petals in the darkness. The wonderful individuality of the Empress Dowager, herself a child of the people and enslaved in youth, whose keen intellect, indomitable will and executive ability have enabled her to cross swords successfully with the foremost statesman of the day in her empire, suggests the possibilities of development innate in the Chinese woman were she to be freed from the thralldom in which she has been bound for centuries. MINISTER CONGER.

Christian Scientists Claim to Be Exerting Themselves in His Behalf. From the Chicago Inter-Ocean. That Minister Edwin H. Nor are the Congers the only magnets that draw them; they are directed toward all those in peril at the hands of the Chinese. Nowhere is this thought current stronger than from Chicago, for here the Congers are known and loved by the Christian Scientists, and here family ties strengthen the bond. Mrs. McConnell and her family are members of the First Christian Science church, Drexel boulevard and Fortieth street. Mrs. Conger is also a Christian Scientist, and is known and admired by those of that faith in Chicago. Last winter the Congers visited the McConnell's and Mrs. Conger attended the First church and took part in the services.

There will be no public services of any kind and no united or concerted action by the Christian Scientists in relation to the Congers. Christian Scientists do not believe in such a course, except where the goal of the faith is in question. Each thought current will therefore go on its separate way to form a part of the great whole.

opened an opportunity for the study of Chinese femininity under most adverse conditions, intelligent observers have been surprised at the originality, independence and force of character developed in girls rescued from lives of infamy, and it is a singular fact that these women, marrying their own countrymen under the protection of the Stars and Stripes, almost invariably assume the mastery of their households.
