THE GRAY FUNERAL.

LARGE ATTENDANCE OF SALEM'S BEST CITIZENS AND BUSINESS MEN.

Masonic and Odd Fellows Lodges Attend in a Body—Stores of the City Closed.

The funeral of the late Geo. W. Gray, which took place from the late residence on State street at 3 p. m., on Wednesday was largely attended. The business houses of the city were closed from 2 to 4 o'clock and all united in paying a last tribute of respect to one who was in life a good citizen and a respected member of the community.

The services at the house were conducted by Rev. John Parsons, of the First M. E. church, assisted by Rev. H. A. Ketchum, of the First Presbyterian church.

Music was furnished by a quartette, consisting of Mrs. Boesch, Miss Lillian Roblin, E. J. Swafford and J. W. Beckford, with piano accompaniment by Miss Carrie Bradshaw.

The honorary pall bearers were: Hon. A. Bush, Hon. G. P. Litchfield, Dr. C. H. Hall, Hon. Ed. Hirsch, Ex-Gov. Z. F. Moody, Prof. T. M. Gatch, of Corvallis.

The acting pall-bearers, selected from the Masonic fraternity, were: Dr. W. H. Byrd, Chief Justice R. S. Bean, Judge Geo. H. Burnett and Hon. L. L. Patterson, Dr. W. D. McNary and Jos. H. Albert.

The remarks of the Rev. John Parsons included a review of the life of the deceased and a polished summing up of the lessons of life and death. With plentiful quotations from the poets and the thinkers ancient and modern who have touched the problems of human existence, and from the Book of books, he described the peaceful closing years of the life just ended, and brought words of comfort to the bereaved survivors.

Salem Lodge No. 4, A. F. & A. M., and Chemeketa Lodge No. 1, I. O. O. F., of which deceased was a valued member were in attendance, and after the services at the house, the former took charge of the remains and the further exercises were conducted with the impressive Masonic rites.

A long line of carriages 23 in number made up the procession to the Odd Fellows cemetery, and three street cars were also filled, two being occupied by the Masons and Odd Fellows.

A plentiful and beautiful array of flowers were brought by friends and neighbors.

HURT IN A RUNAWAY.

REV. W. R. WINANS THE VICTIM—YOUNG WINANS GETS OFF EASY.

Broken Collar Bone and "Slightly Demolished" Neck—Horses Were Old Offenders.

W. R. Winans, the Sunday school man, was quite severely injured in a runaway this afternoon and narrowly escaped something worse. The family had just returned to their home south of town, from a camping trip, and Mr. Winans with his son Eddie aged 14, drove down Commercial street with a pair of horses to a light hack.

A freight train was switching at the freight depot and a carload of lumber stood half way across Commercial street. Mr. Winans forced his team to go by, but the horses broke into a run. Mr. Winans stayed with them until just in front of the brewery they swerved suddenly across the street, throwing out both occupants of the hack.

The boy escaped without injury but Mr. Winans struck on his shoulder just outside of the curb.

O. P. Maury ran to the injured man and with others lifted him out of the street. Dr. Byrd was called, and an examination disclosed a broken collar bone, which with some bruises on the face and a hard shock seemed to be the extent of the injuries.

The team brought up against the electric light pole in front of the dye works, the horses going on each side of it. Beyond a splintered tongue and neckyoke the hack and horses were but little damaged.

This is the fifth time these horses have run away, and it is considered that Mr. Winans is doing well to get off with his life, considering the chances he took.

TOOK THE CARBOLIC ROUTE.

Woman Described in Portland Ends Her Life by Suicide.

A woman who gave her name as Sadie Calhoun, committed suicide in Portland between Monday evening and Tuesday night by taking about three-fourths the contents of a large bottle of carbolic acid. There was found on a table a note which read as follows:

"Fix me decent. Go to Wm. Shaw, 110 First street. He will see that I am decently buried."

Mr. Shaw to whom the above note refers is a real-estate dealer of Portland and says that a man giving the name of G. M. Calhoun and the deceased lady came to his place of business and represented that they were husband and wife and wanted to purchase a farm in the Willamette valley. They stated that they came from Howe, Texas. He appeared to be a man of means and Mr. Shaw aided him in cashing a check for \$1800 and all arrangements were made for the purchase of a farm and the deeds made out when Calhoun suddenly disappeared leaving the woman alone. The sudden disappearance of Calhoun, without the slightest explanation just before the deed for the farm he had bargained for passed is strange. The woman remarked that they had seen a sheriff from Texas and it looks as if Calhoun became alarmed and left and the woman became despondent and committed the rash act.

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.

At her home one mile west of Corvallis, Mrs. Indiana J. Haskins, wife of John Haskins, died Friday afternoon. Deceased was born near Nashville, Tennessee, July 12th, 1831, and at the time of her death was aged 70 years and 8 days. The funeral services were conducted by Dr. Thompson at the Presbyterian church Wednesday afternoon at 2:30.

In October, 1850, she arrived in Salem, Oregon, in company with her husband and Capt. James Bennett, Dr. Belt, John C. Bell, William H. Johnson and others, all of whom have passed away. Mrs. Haskins lived in Salem until April 1852, when she moved to Benton county, which has since been her home with the exception of three years spent in Lane county. There was born to Mr. and Mrs. Haskins nine children, four of whom died young.

The surviving children are, Mrs. Mary Chase, and Alonzo B. Haskins of St. Louis, Mo., Florence E. Haskins, of Eureka Spring, Ark., and Mrs. Iva L. Wilson of Philomath.
