THE NEW OPERA HOUSE.

Propositions for the furnishing and leasing are under consideration.

The matter of the furnishing of the new opera house and the leasing thereof is now under consideration by the Odd Fellows' building committee, consisting of A. N. Moore, J. W. Young, the third member of the committee, Till Ford, being absent.

Propositions have been received from Portland, Seattle, San Francisco and Eastern cities for the seating and furnishing of the new play-house, and a number of agents are in the city with samples of their goods.

Several offers for the lease of the opera house are also under consideration. Patton Bros. are among the bidders, and their experience with the old house places them in a position to know about what they can do with the new one. Salem people will continue to cater to the theatre-goers of the city.

Both the furnishing and lease will probably be decided at the regular meeting of Chemeketa lodge, next Wednesday evening, when the committee will bring in its report and recommendations.

The iron girders for the ceiling over the opera house, for lack of which the work on the building has been delayed for several days, arrived last night from the Albany Iron Works, and the Salem Truck & Dray Co. are moving them over today. There are three girders weighing six tons apiece. Each is in two sections weighing three tons each, making a bulky and heavy piece to handle, but Mohney and Heckman are equal to the task.

When these girders are placed in position the third story will be pushed to completion.

DOCK STRIKE ENDED.

The Men will All Their Demands. Get 40 Cents An Hour.

Dock strikers at Portland went to work Thursday morning upon four of the principal docks at 40 cents an hour. This ends the strike in favor of the men. It is only a matter of time until the other dockworkers "cave" and they will probably pay the advance by tomorrow.

The docks which put men to work Thursday morning are the Victoria, Sibson & Kerr, Irving, G. W. McNear, Columbus No. 2, Allen & Lewis, Montgomery and Balfour, Guthrie & Co. It is understood that the Elevator is also paying the advance.

The men quit work about a week ago. They were allowed 30 cents an hour for loading vessels and handling grain in the warehouse. They maintained that was too little pay compared with the character of work they were required to do and struck for 40 cents an hour regular time and 50 cents overtime. Only the truckmen were interested. The weighers, scalers and others who work alongside of the truckmen were not included in the strike. Because of the reticence of the dockworkers it was impossible to learn definitely the exact terms of the agreement by which the men returned to work. It is not known if the men will receive 50 cents an hour for overtime, but it is reasonable to suppose they will get extra pay for overtime. At any rate the men have won their cause in securing a 40-cent-an-hour schedule for regular time.

THE POWERS TRIAL IN KENTUCKY

GEORGETOWN, Ky., July 27.—Walter Bronston, a Lexington attorney, was assisted in the arrest of Caleb Powers and John Davis, at Lexington, was the first witness in the Powers trial yesterday.

Powers and Davis were disguised as soldiers, and were both armed. Witnesses identified them to the police officers. After a forcible arrest, Powers was taken to jail, where the pardon granted him by Governor Taylor and \$1300 in money were found in his pockets.

W. H. Mayner gave sensational testimony against both Powers and Yontsev this afternoon. He said he was in the Secretary of State's office a few days before the shooting, and a man whom he did not know, referring to Goebel, said: "Somebody ought to kill the d-n rascal."

Yontsev said: "I have made up my mind to do that myself."

Saturday evening before the shooting, Caleb Powers said in conversation: "If we could get the head of the ticket to act, we would do so. If he does not stand up, I intend to expose the whole d-n business."

Perry Tandy, assistant secretary of state, produced the executive journal kept by Governor Taylor. The journal did not show an order calling out troops after the assassination. The orders issued to Powers, Finley, Culton and Davis were recorded.

The prosecution wanted to show the pardons issued by Governor Taylor to mountain men who had been fined in the Frankfort Police court for carrying pistols, but the court excluded this.

COLON REBELLION BROUGHT TO AN END

Colon, July 27.—The Liberal rebellion in this department has ended after a sacrifice of more than 500 lives. The Liberals have been the greatest sufferers, while the wounded numbered many hundreds.

Dr. Mendoza representing the Liberals and General Alban arranged yesterday for a cessation of hostilities, the liberals to surrender their arms and being guaranteed freedom from prosecution and retention of all political rights.

GERMAN TROOPS SAIL FOR CHINA

BREMENHAVEN, July 27.—Part of the German expeditionary force for China sailed today on board of three transports.

Little Telegrams.

The famine situation in India is growing worse instead of better.

Jeffersonville, Indiana, manufacturers have orders for 110,000 garments for our soldiers in the orient.

Bryan positively declines to make any public talks on Sunday, religious or otherwise.

The postmaster general has ruled that after August 1 the drop letter rate of 1 cent will not apply within rural free delivery limits.

One hundred additional medical officers are wanted for duty in the Philippines and China.

E. G. Prout, a millionaire stockman of Deer Lodge, Mont., has died from heart disease at St. Joseph, Mo.

Mortimer D. Shaw, who conducted the telegrapher's strike in 1883, passed away in the city hospital at St. Louis.

The British arms are victorious in a great battle with a tribe of Ashanti savages.

In the British House of Commons Lord George Hamilton commends the "patience, resignation with courtesy" with which 52,000,000 people of India are starving to death, and finds "certain compensating advantages in the shape of what the revenue year closed."

More Soldiers for Manila.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 27.—The remaining companies of the Fifteenth Infantry which were left here when the first division sailed, left this port today and will follow them to Manila. It is believed here that these troops will not be landed at Manila, but will remain on the ships and be forwarded to China for service in the campaign against the Boxers. It is argued that the situation in China is of so serious a nature that these troops, together with all that can be spared from the Philippines, will be rushed to the front there as early as date as possible.

Injured at Dallas.

H. M. Brown, the P. O. liverrman received a telephone message from Dallas last evening stating that an old gentleman by the name of Cottler, had been badly injured in a runaway accident and asking Mr. Brown to notify his son who was in Salem on business. The young man was promptly notified and immediately started for his home. No particulars are available.

Dr. V. Fink and sons A. W. and V. E. Fink of Dallas, were in the city today. Mr. Fink is engaged in the prune and hop business and reports every thing in Polk doing well.

MILITARY PRISONERS TO BE SET FREE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27.—Under instructions from the War Department, General Shafter has appointed a board of officers which is ordered to meet on Alcatraz Island today to examine all general prisoners in confinement at that station and submit recommendations looking to the release of such prisoners as deserve clemency. The board is instructed to make careful inquiry into the merits of each case, so far as can be done with the light of the records on file. When possible the statements will be taken of any witnesses, be they prisoners or officers, cognizant of the facts.

The report of the board is to be rendered as soon as possible and in the recommendations special consideration is to be given to the conduct of prisoners since confinement, and to cases of young men convicted of purely military offenses. There are about 500 military prisoners on the island, many of them, it is said, having been convicted of trivial offenses.

NEW YORK, July 27.—The fleet of the Corinthian Yacht Club of Philadelphia, according to orders issued by Fleet Captain Charles H. Brock, rendezvoused last night at Glen Cove, Long Island, and started this morning on its annual cruise. The yachts will race to Oyster Bay, they will race on Monday, the 30th, to Morris Cove, thence on Wednesday to Shelter Island, from which on the following day, they will go to New London. Friday, August 3, there will be a race from New London to Newport, where the cruise comes to an end.

Will Talk About Education.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., July 27.—One of the most elaborate programs ever prepared for a gathering of educators in this state, is being carried out here today, and the meeting will not adjourn until the evening of the 29th. The occasion is the annual convention of the State Association of Superintendents of Education, which is being held in connection with the State Educational Association. Representatives from all parts of the state are present, and the most popular talent in Alabama occupies the stage in the convention hall. The delegates were welcomed to the city by the mayor.

Educators Meet.

CLEAR LAKE, Iowa, July 27.—The leading educational event that has taken place in this section of the country for many years, is the Epworth assembly, which opened its first session today and will continue until August 10, inclusive. Bishop Galloway will deliver two addresses to the assembly—one this afternoon and the other this evening. Among the features scheduled for discussion before the meeting closes is a debate on imperialism between Hon. Champ Clark and Hon. C. R. Landis. The visitors in attendance number fully 7,000.
