THE WORM PEST.

Scientists say it is not the Army Worm but the Common Botanical Cane Worm.
 Farmers and gardeners in Western Oregon whose crops have been so much damaged recently by an army of worms, may not be much interested in knowing that the pest is not the army worm, as many suppose, but the variegated cutworm, a pest of no mean proportions; but they will be interested in knowing that its ravages are not likely to be long continued.

Professor Piper, the entomologist of Washington Agricultural college, has been studying this nocturnal depredator, and finds that it is possible to resist it successfully if the farmers are sufficiently enterprising. The most effective way to fight it he says is with Paris green. It may be applied either wet or dry. For plants like cabbage or string beans he recommends the dry process; for all others spraying is best. One part of Paris Green mixed with twenty parts of flour or powdered lime makes the dry mixture. This is to be applied with a box of convenient size, having the bottom finely perforated or covered with a fine wire gauze. This if fastened to a handle, can be used conveniently to sift the powder over the growing plants. It is best to make the application either early in the morning or late in the evening, while the leaves are wet with dew.

For the wet application, one pound of Paris green to 150 or 200 gallons of water is recommended for such trees as apples and pears. Peach and plum trees, and plants with delicate foliage which are susceptible to the poison, should have a weaker dilution of it, say one pound to 250 or 300 gallons of water. A full pail or two of fresh lime water should be added to every 200 gallons of the mixture to prevent the poison from scalding the foliage. In preparing the Paris green should be made into a fine paste with a small amount of water, then strain thoroughly and add the bulk of water. The lime may be added to the paste before straining, in amount according to the amount of poison used, instead of adding lime water to the solution as recommended above. The mixture must be kept well stirring during the spraying. For cabbage, lettuce, cauliflower and other plants which may bring the poison to the table a milder solution than any of those given above should be used.

Professor Piper says the pest will soon disappear, and it is not likely to return again for many years.
 This last will be good news for those whose gardens are now being destroyed by the creeping pests. They are no respecters of persons, and eat up the little kitchen garden of the city dweller with as cool and insolent an avidity as they do the common vegetables of the farmer. They have even had the temerity to eat up the turnips on the asylum farm, devouring their root and branch and from keelson to trunk.
 They work nights, Sunday's and holidays and their greed is as insatiable as that of the most sanctified human benevolent assmulator. It is said that the sound in cabbage patch at night is like that of rain upon the roof, or "the march of vast army, their harness clanging as they march."
 A JOURNAL employe says it is a pity they are not the genuine army worm, for then the music of a brass band would cause all of them within hearing to keel over and die in great agony. The farmer could tune up the old fiddle and go out and put them to sleep to the music of a Beethoven Sonata or the Fisher's Hornpipe.
